PREFACE

On December 15, 1942 the 701st Tank Destroyer Battalien was activated at Port Knex, Kentucky, with Lt. Colonel Chauncey C. Bensen in command. The destration was, upon activation, attached to the 1st Armered Division. The particulation was, upon activation, attached to the 1st Armered Division. From March 1st to April 1st the Extelliginary particulated in problems staged on the Fort Knex Military Reservation, and on the 1st of April the Battalion was alerted for neversent. Movement orders came, and with the 1st Armered Division, the Battalion wheeled wehicles left Fort Knex on the 6th of April for Fort Dix, New Jorsey (track wehicles by train). The everland trip last four days and the period was marked by continuous rain, high winds, and extremely cold weather. The most two months were spent in range firing and in preparation for everseas movements.

The Battalien entrained on the 31st of May for Jersey City, erossed the river to the Fort of New York, and there leaded on the U.S.S. Themas H. Berry. The transport sailed in convey for Northern Ireland via Halifax. The trip was marked by many cases of diarrhea, acute sea-sickness, and a "12 on 12 off" deck shift. The arrival, on June 11th, at Belfast was greated by shouts of the deck workers clamering for American digarettes and candy. Upon debarkation the Battalian was split up and the companies sent to separate bivenue areas: Recommaissance Company to Gressgar; Bn. Bl., Bq. Company, "G" Company, and Medical Detachment to Ballykinlar; "A" Company to Howeastle; "B" Company to Downstrick - all in County Down.

On the 18th of June Major Harrison King assumed command of the Battalion.

A demonstration for the King and Queen of England was fired on the 25th
of June. Corporal Stema, later killed in action in North Africa, performed
in an impressive manner as gummer.

RESTRICTEL

From the 6th of August to the 8th of August the Battalien participated in the problem of Defiance along with the 3rd Battalien of the 13th Armored Regiment. The Battalien was attached to the British 61st Infantry Division under command of Brigadier Hawkins, and maneuvers were held around Ballymure and Ballyelaire morth.

On the 3rd of October Companies "B" and "C" and one plateon under Lt. Smith of Recommaissance Company left their respective stations in Northern Ireland for destination unknown via Macclesfield, England. Battalion Headquarters, Headquarters Company, "A" Company and the Medical Detachment remained in Northern Ireland.
