Upon learning that one of his tank destroyers had received direct anti-tank fire into one of its tracks rendering it immobile, Lt O'Gorman immediately went forward to the position of the vehicle. Without evocation of the destroyer's immediate need, rather than allow the enemy to possibly totally destroy it, Lt O'Gorman directed the repair of the track in spite of the incessant mortar, artillery, and small arms fire. In the process of repair, at this time Lt O'Gorman raised above the burning vehicle the enemy responded with a hail of small arms fire. In order to end the situation in repairing the damaged vehicle, thereby allowing it to immediately return to action, reflects great credit upon himself and his forces.

SUMMARY OF OPERATIONS: 1 September 1944 to 30 September 1944.

(Note: All coordinates listed are found in the Nord de Guerre grid system the 500 Km square.V. The letters preceding coordinates designate the 100 Km square within the above mentioned area.

Review of latter Days of previous period:

- 26 Aug 44 Crossed Seine River in vicinity of TILLY (T 170088).  
27 Aug 44 Crossed the Marne River vicinity of TRIPORTE (T 495510).  
30 Aug 44 Crossed the Aisne River in vicinity of VILLERS (T 942977).

On 30 Aug 44 the Battalion was still attached to the Third Armored Division. Assignment of elements of the battalion to units of the division were as follows;  
With C Comd "A": Co "A" w/1st Plt Ron Co attend.  
With C Comd "B": Co "B" w/3rd Plt Ron Co attend.  
With C Comd LEONE: (Div Res) Bn (-A & B Co's).

On 31 Aug 44 Div FO No. 12 directed that Bn (-A & B Co's) detached from C Comd SHOTR and would follow C Comd "A" in the center of the Division Zone of action and would be committed only on Division order. This field order contained instructions for the Division to attack at 010700 Sept 44 with MONS, BELGIUM as the final objective.

Bn (-A & B Co's) was in vicinity of RUBIGNY (S 462274) where we were coiled for the night.

1 Sept 44. Bn (-A & B Co's) moved out from vicinity of RUBIGNY north to vicinity, south of LANDOUZY LA VILLE (O 368460). From this area the Bn S-3 Capt Self, accompanied a Ron Plt, whose mission was to investigate a civilian report that there were German troops in the vicinity S.E. of BUCILLY. At (O 390479), this force was fired upon by small arms and automatic weapons, from the vicinity of the bridge to the N.W. In the encounter that followed, Capt Self was seriously wounded and his driver was killed. When our Ron Plt returned their fire the enemy force withdrew. Six of the enemy were killed and some wounded by machine gun fire from our armored cars. One MG and one Mortar position were also destroyed. The Ron Plt returned to the assembly area to continue the march to the objective. The column marched through WIMY (O 318519) at 2000 hrs, and coiled north of that town (O 329562). The march was resumed at 2300 hours, until we coiled off the road at 020015 Sept 44 vicinity of ROCQUIGNY at (O 313667).

1st Plt, Co "B" reported destroying a heavy ammunition truck in vicinity of LA CHAPELLE DE PARPE (O 233596), expended 3 rounds 3" APC. 3rd Plt, Co "B" destroyed two Staff Cars in vicinity of LA CHAPELLE (O 262605), this action required expenditure of small arms ammunition only. An enemy General Officer was wounded in this action, he was captured and evacuated. At 2230 hours a platoon of Co "C" was employed as road block in vicinity of CLAIETAINNE (O 3060). One enemy ammunition truck and five men were destroyed.

**2 Sept 44.** The march was resumed at 0845 hours. Column osiled off road to allow a platoon of Co "C" to provide a road block at vicinity North of MUSARIES (O 555767), at 1050 hours. This column was broken due to report of enemy on our front and left flank. The march continued at 1130 hours, progress was again halted at 1205 hours, when a report was received that enemy tanks and anti-tank were in vicinity of BRUC (O 555756) to protect left flank of the column. One enemy tank was sighted and fired upon but did not hit, but not destroyed. It moved back into good cover and did not reappear. From the platoon firing, there positions were easily spotted by enemy observers. Heavy artillery was reported to fall within vicinity of the platoon, however there were no casualties. A few minutes later an enemy motorcycle was destroyed by small arms fire. At 1500 hours the road block was reinforced by troops of the 1st Inf Div. After the above action had taken place the remainder of the unit had continued the march, finally arriving, at 1800 hours in vicinity of St VIT VILLE, 10 miles N (O 549998), after refueling and reorganizing in this position. It continued the march at 1900 hours and arrived at vicinity of ACVIN (S 319098) at 2205 hours. At 2100 hours they reported their location at 2200 hours, in vicinity of St VIT (S 319100). At this location was unknown at end of period, however it was noted that all units of the division were closing on their objectives. A unit of 50 "T" reported destroying a KVK tank during the night.

**3 Sept 44.** At 0800 hours, T-38 No. 18 was moving and since it was time immediately to prepare for the attack to continue, with the town of ACVIN, Blandas as the objective. The scheduled time of attack was 060000, but due to lack of fuel, it was impossible for the column to leave to jump off. It was decided for attack to start at 070000. It first started to move at 0400 hours. It reached ACVIN at 0700 hours established a road block in the town, and engaged the enemy tanks which were firing in the area with the 105mm howitzer to the west of town. The platoon was armed with 105mm at 0400 hours from 100m distance. The vehicles were followed by each other along track and four (4) guns opened up at once. Four guns at 100m, 1/20m range, eight (8) gun 105mm. Vehicles were destroyed in a short time, but the platoon did not move forward. The first truck left in Co. C, attempt to break the stop, for about 300m and the column, (horse-drawn) and the 1st Inf Div, first column was destroyed. The second (Co), horses were 100m away destroyed.

After the destruction of the first (Co 100m) and failure of the leaders of Co 100m to pull forward, and follow the column, the column stopped. About fifty (50) enemy trucks, seven (7) tanks, three (3) anti-aircraft positions and one (1) plane destroyed. 40 enemy tank-purge vehicles, w/3 105mm or 100mm howitzers, 10 150mm G.M. Artillery and 100mm (Co 100m) destroyed on (1) anti-aircraft truck. The truck was operating correctly, but it stalled, so most of the horses could not move forward. The truck was 100m yards from the column, and the horses, 100m east of, from the column. No horses or drivers of truck had been killed, vehicles for better observation. This destruction was previous to the last column of the column, which was to cross the road to the right. Orders, "Break through and go on to the right" were given. The 1st Inf Div, 100m east of the column, traps were fired in the direction of the 1st Inf Div, traps were fired in the direction of the 1st Inf Div. The 1st Inf Div, 100m from the column, and the 1-1/2 ton truck which was to drive in column. The 1st Inf Div, 100m east of the truck ~~XXX XXXXX~~ was destroyed and demolished. The driver of all destroyers and for the "other" side of another section with security on about 100m and returned to a position on the left front. They were more busy with the other section and never observed the threat on his right - he was destroyed on short order.

2 Sept 44. (cont'd)

Back at the Bn CP, word was received that the attack as scheduled would be delayed until 1200 hours on the 4th. Ron Co captured two (2) Germans attempting to sneak home about 2400 hours.

3 Sept 44.

At 0145 hours, the guards in the Bn CP area intercepted 5 Germans trying to break thru to rejoin their forces. Four of these men were wounded and evacuated the fifth was turned over to PW Coll. Unit. Co "B" reported destroying 10 enemy vehicles just before daylight. They also took numerous prisoners. "A" Co, 2nd Plt, destroyed 10 more German vehicles at about 0500 hours. Ron Co took 50 prisoners at 0100 hours in the vicinity of Bn CP. The Division began the attack in the afternoon and our column moved at 1710 hours. A Platoon of the 23rd Armored Engr Bn were attached to this unit, to provide security on road blocks to be established enroute for column protection at close of period the column was still advancing.

2 Sept 44.

All units of the overt during period. Co "A" arrived vicinity of H-Hill (J312120). Co "B" was out of radio range and no contact could be made. Bn (-A & B Co's) pulled off road in vicinity of Hill T 100 (J 710092). The Bn C.R. held a meeting of all Commanders and Co. Commanders, at 1400 hours, and disseminated information concerning objective and assignment of assembly areas. Column moved at 1430 hours and closed in assembly at 1915 hours in vicinity of Hill 100 (J 394152). On biv res order, road blocks were set up by Co "C" with personnel from 36th Armd Inf Regt. to insure security for the M-10's. At close of period there had been no contact made w/ Co "B". At about 2330 hours a few bursts of small arms fire was heard off to the north in the vicinity of one of Co "C" road blocks. Upon investigating it was found to be friendly unit that knocked out a command car towing a howitzer. Six of the occupants had escaped and were subsequently captured by the men on our road block.

Mortar fire

At 0100 hours, the vicinity of Bn CP was under heavy enemy mortar fire. The mortar sound was though it was at a very close range, but it was not. Lt Paulson, of Co "B", at his road block was able to determine the mortar position by the flash and called for fire support. As there was no wire communication, he called his platoon leader, who called the Bn C.R. by phone. The Bn C.R. in turn called Div Res and was connected directly with the 18th Field Arty. Bn liaison was general support for Div Res. The fire support crews retreat further away. Lt Paulson sensed no recoil or smoke fire for effect. The mortar was silenced and after a short duration, in daylight, it was found that the mortar had been abandoned along with three ammunition and supply carts (ammunition).

On 2 Sept 44, H-Hill (J312120) was received. The 18th Field Arty seized the town of Baelen, Belgium. Support Command "A" to the right, Support Command "B" on the left, Divisional Reserve to the left, and Command "C".

Co "A" Co's reported no contact w/ the enemy during period, and came out with their respective forces. Bn was out of radio contact with Div command at close of period. The division (Div Res) moved out at 1820 hours and at close of the period was still advancing.

7 Sept 44.

Column halted and coiled in vicinity of LAVOIR (K 138199) at 0300 hours. At 0950 hours the Bn Adjutant, Capt Beacham, who was traveling with the Div CP Group, reported that Co "A" was in the vicinity of WAZZE (K 185185) and that Co "B" was in vicinity of HUY (K 2216). No other word was heard from these companies during the period. At 1053 the column again moved out. We coiled in vicinity of AMBSIN (K 275182) at 1500 hours. Lt Livengood, the liaison officer to Div Res, reported that our route to the objective had been changed. At 1750 hours the march was resumed. At 2015 hours, a section of TD's from Co "C" with the 2nd Plt of Rcn Co were sent ahead of the column to set up road blocks, if necessary, to provide protection to the column. At 2400 hours the march was advancing without incident.

8 Sept 44.

0045 hours found us at our assembly position in vicinity of DIERIN PATARD (K 396297). One section of the 3rd Platoon of Co "C" was taken from the column and established a road block in vicinity of TILLEJU (K 4326), this block was set up at about 0100 hours. At 0800 hours, Co "B" reported their location as the vicinity of LIEGE (K 496206), they had undergone only normal events. At 1030 hours, Co "C" set up two more road blocks in vicinity of LIEGE at (K 377288) and (K 376276) with a section of TD's at each position. Another section was alerted to reinforce a road block of Div Res at (K 454331). This section moved out on order of Div Res and reported in position at 1030 hours.

At 0930 hours, Capt Cole, Co "A" C.O., reported that Lt Jann, an outstanding Gun Comdr, of "A" Co, had been killed by enemy small arms fire. Remainder of period was spent in maintenance of vehicles and equipment and resting.

Local defense plans were set before dark. Period closed without further event.

9 Sept 44.

Div Operations Memorandum No 9, was received at 0730 hours. This memo instructed the attack against VILVIE (K 8725). Combat Commands were to attack at 1100 hours on this date, Div Res to follow to assembly area on Div Order. Co "A" reported no unusual incidents during the period. Co "B" reported that they destroyed six enemy Gen supp vehicles and two heavy trucks, also captured two motorcycles. Co "C" continued to maintain road blocks previously indicated. Two F.W. 190's flew over Bn CP at 1500 hours. They were fired upon by this unit and surrounding units but no hits were scored.

The Bn C.O. received route of advance to assembly area, and disseminated this information to subordinate commanders at 1730 hours. Movement to VILVIE was initiated by our column at 1818 hours. The head of our column crossed the ROUSSE RIVER at 1930 hours. At close of period column was progressing without incident.

10 Sept 44.

Column continued march until 0100 hours, then the column off to the north, vicinity of MANTHESAY (K 532267). At 0210 hours, Co "A" reported their position in vicinity of VILVIE (K 87263). Orders were received from Div Res to move out at 0800, and the column moved out at 0900 hours. At 0930 hours, Co "A", Co "B", and Div Res received orders. These were the orders we had been wanting to see for so long--at last we were to cross the defenses of the SIEGFRIED LINE. The division objective was the town of ISCH EILER (K 9548). Column coiled in vicinity of BLINDENF (K 554157), at 1130 hours and resumed the march at 1300 hours.

10 Sept 44. (cont'd).

We arrived at the assembly area in vicinity of S.W. of VERVIERE (K 674203) at 1646 hours. At 1700 hours orders were received from Div Res to post road blocks in vicinity of VERVIERE at (K 669198) and (K 675198), security for one road block was lacking, and one squad from 36th AIR was assigned to provide the necessary security. At 1730 hours the Bn C.O. held a meeting of subordinate commanders to discuss plan of coming operations and problems that would arise with the civilian population.

11 Sept 44.

Objective was changed to vic of WALHORN (K 8033) at 110001 Sept 1944.

Bn C.O. disseminated information at 0900 hours on attack to ESCHWEILER and placed the subordinate units on a 1/2 hours alert status. There were no unusual events, except that the Div QM issued some very fine cigars to all units. At 1630 hours the column moved out and reached the high ground in vicinity, one mile NE of VERVIERE (K 688250), where we coiled at 1830 hours. In this location orders were received to march on a different route to vicinity of EUPEN, where we were to assemble. During this period Co "B" reported destroying one (1) A.T. Gun and three Gen purp vehicles. Column moved at 2015 hours arriving at Assembly area in vicinity of EUPEN (K 783266).

12 Sept 44.

Enemy mortar fire fell thick and heavy at 0830 hours near Bn CP. There were no casualties however. A civilian showed the Bn C.O. where enemy gun positions were along the German border. This information was relayed to Div Res. At 1000 hours there was small arms fire to our south and a Ron Plt (2nd Plt) was sent to investigate. About 40 enemy prisoners, some wounded, was the result of this action. Co "C" had set up a road block at (K 774262), the 1st Plt of "A" Co 26th Inf Regt was assigned to provide security for this block. At 2100 hours we learned that the various Thai forces of the Third Armored Division had probed the defenses of the Siegfried Line in the vicinity of LINT (K 8633).

Message of 2400 hours this date from Div Res NCS announced that Task Force Lovelady of C Corps "B" had crossed the MUSSEL LINE at 1930 hours. This force is believed to be the first unit of the American Armies to cross these defenses. The 3rd Plt, Co "B" with Lt. Hauptf. Silve in command, which was attached to Task Force Lovelady, was the first element of this battlegroup to pass the line and is believed to be the first DD unit of the American Armies to do so through.

13 Sept 44.

Arrived in vicinity of WALHORN (K 8033), at 1815 hours, and remained until 2010 hours. Co "C" reported their 3rd Plt to be across at K 802212, Germany (K 909239), 3rd Plt 2nd Plt (K 774262) and 1st Plt (K 774267). BATT CO reported their forces across (K 774261).

14 Sept 44.

Arrived in vicinity of EUPEN, and began marching to vicinity of LINT (K 8633), (K 774261), (K 774262), (K 774267) and (K 820310).

Task Force Lovelady's moved to vicinity of LINT (K 8633), and became the first division of the Siegfried Line at 1545 hours. Co "C" was advancing at 1615 hours and reached it at 1715 hours, at K 802212 at 1815 hours. Road blocks were established at K 802212 (K 909239), (K 774262), (K 774267) and (K 820310) at 1830 hours.

S-E-Q-R-E-T

16 Sept 44.

At 0825 hours there was quite a lot of small arms fire to the NW of the Bn CP. A force of the 83rd Armd Regt was moving in the clean out the town of BUSBACH. One section of Co "C" fired on the church steeple in support of this attack. This section also fired on ~~six~~ pill boxes in the vicinity of the attack. Results are unknown. At 1100 hours "B" Co reported their location as 3rd Plt (K 962412), 1st Plt (K 939385), the Co Cr (-1st & 3rd Pts) at (K 912378) vicinity of B. "I" Inf. The 3rd Plt of "B" Co had one M-10 destroyed by AT fire in vicinity of (K 939385). Casualties 2 EM KIA, 4 LWA, 1 S/L. At 1345 hours word was received that a platoon of 11" TD's were to support a Panz-Inf Team in cleaning out BUSBACH. The 2nd Lt of Co "C" with Lt Austin in command, ~~this platoon~~ moved out immediately; another section of TD's was alerted to move as if necessary to support this attack. At 1700 hour the 1st Plt of "C" Co reported they had knocked out 3 pill-boxes, but it was learned that the enemy had hit after three or four rounds hit the pill box--though it is doubtful that a penetrator could have been made at the ranges they were fired upon. At 1955 hours "B" Co reported they had knocked out one enemy tank-type vehicle and one house containing many civilians. The 1st Lt of "C" Co reported their outputs: one M-10 (K 972409). The 3rd Plt, Co "C" carried for extra security and the 1st Lt of "C" Co and men of "C" Co provided this platoon.

17 Sept 44.

The 3rd Lt, Co "C" reported at 0950 hours that the 1st Lt of mortar had opened gun fire to their right flank. Co "C" re-alerted their 3rd Plt who under intense mortar fire, had a LWA killed and one wounded. At 1445 hours 3rd Plt "C" Co, now reinforced on their mission with the Panz-Inf Team were reported to the Company assembly area. Casualties were also received at this time for one Plt of TD's to fire indirect on Busch Hill (K 9648). 1st Lt of "C" fired the main gun from their road block position. The fire was progressive after registration on battle point. 3rd Plt Co "C" was ordered to establish road blocks at (K 912390) and (K 912395) at 1500 hours.

18 Sept 44.

3rd Plt, Co "C" was still engaged in road blocks in vicinity of BUSBACH to support the 3rd Inf Regt in cleaning out this town. There were no unusual activities throughout the day until 1700 hours, at which time 3rd Lt Co "C" reported that one (1) M-10 had been destroyed by AT fire. Casualties 1 EM with 81mm burns.

19-20 Sept 44.

No unusual events.

21 Sept 44.

Co "B" passed their last M-10 destroyed two (2) days ago, knocked out two (2) pill boxes, and one (1) known to be known name of enemy infantry killed. 3rd Lt Co "C" reported in BUSBACH, 83rd Armd Regt Bn CP received a call from 1st Inf Regt, 3rd Lt "C" to stop some miscreants from crossing the river. 3rd Lt Co "C" estimated a road block to be established in BUSBACH (K 948412).

22 Sept 44.

Moved at 1200 closing in new assembly reg at 1520 hours in vicinity of BAUTING (K 938378). At 1410 hours Co "C" reported the first and second platoons were moving toward (K 948432). The company suffered casualties; 1 Cpl R.H., 2 EM KIA. Co "C" established road blocks in city area.

23 Sept 44.

3rd Plt Co "C" moved to vicinity of VENWEGEN (K 923356) for indirect firing mission at 1530 hours. Harassing and Interdictory missions were fired on ESCHWEILER. All units of Division in period of rest maintenance and rehabilitation.

24-27 Sept 44.

No unusual events---all units rotating platoons and section so all men will receive an opportunity to clean up and rest.

28 Sept 44.

3rd Plt Co "C" relieved of Indirect Mission replaced by 2nd Plt, Co "C" with same mission.

Co "D" reports their disposition:--1st Plt vicinity of BREWINIG, (K 932331), 3rd Plt (K 950418), CP and 2nd Plt in vicinity of BREWINIGERHEIDE (K 912378).

"A" Co with all units in vicinity of SCHULTZHEIDE (K 929387).

29 Sept 44.

2nd Plt, Co "C" relieved of indirect fire mission at 1200 hours and returned to Company assembly area.

30 Sept 44.

This battalion was issued eighteen (18) 90mm Gun, Motor Carriage M-36. These are to be test fired in next few days. Six (6) M-36's were issued to each gun company--and further broken down one (1) per section. All crews are looking forward to test firing of the 90mm Gun.
