1. ENEMY a. During the entire period the Battalion was out of contact and engaged solely in military government activities, screening civilians and rounding up stragglers. One (1) Ortsgruppenleiter, one (1) Gestapo informant, seven (7) SS members and 142 PWs were turned over to the CIC and FW Cage.

b. The population appeared rather docile at the beginning of

the occupation and no overt acts were committed after the cessation of hostilities. One enlisted man was, however, wounded by an unknown person on 030210B at KASSIECK (543497).

c. Only scattered instances were noted in which civilians failed to turn in weapons after being notified and there seemed to be no organized effort to build up caches in the Battalion areas for possible future use. No "Werewolf" activity was found, but what looked like a fresh grave in the cemetary at EILSLEBEN (375000) produced arms and ammunition.

At opening of period the entire Bn. was conducting Military Government in assigned area. Bn. CP located at LINDSTEDT (574504); Co. A at KASSIECK (543498); Co. B in HEMSTEDT (504474); Co. C. CP at HEMSTEDT (506474) and two Plats. in TRUSTEDT (551467), 3rd Plat. Was located at airport (513507) performing guard duty; Ron. Co. in ALGENSTADT (513507) see overlay #1).

The Bn. searched area by kilometer squares finding small amounts of alandoned clothing and abandoned equipment, all unserviceable equipment destroyed, uncrated Panzerfausts and hand

grenades destroyed by Pioneer Platoon, Ron. Co.

On the 2nd of May during search of area, 30 German field pieces were found at (553445) most of which had been burned or completely destroyed, and all were absolutely worthless. Also reels of wire cable were found and turned into 102nd Division collecting point.

At 0210 on the 3rd of May a guard of A Co. was shot while on a road block, by an unidentified person. A complete sweep of towns and area was made by all companies but no results were obtain-

ed .

The Bettalion moved into newly assigned area on the 4th of May, clearing old area at 0830 and closing in new area at 0900.



All Bn. evacuated Russian and Tolish DPs to GARDELEGEN DP Camp 496429) from D. Camp at CALBE (470570) on May 5th.

102nd Division YPs relieved C Co. of responsibility of Radar

Station (480576) which was to be used as FW Cage.

On 6th, 7th, & 8th of l'ay En. continued screening and searching, picking up FWs in uniform and civilian clothes and evacuated them to Bi Cage. Road control posts on main roads had been established.

A Co. assumed responsibility of guard at Luftwaffe hospital at WERNETEDT (437552) on Pay 9th relieving guards of 9th Army MFs.
Areas of responsibility of companies were changed (see overlay #3).

All road control posts established radio communications with

their respective Co. CFs.

The 548 AAA relieved A Co. of guard responsibility on Luftwaffe hospital at WERNSTEDT (437552) on May 10th at 1500. Bn. evacuated 319 Russian IVs from camp at BERKAU (546556). C Co. uncovered dump containing telephones and wire equipment and posted

guard on dump at WINKELSTEDT (423595).

On the 12th of May the Battalion had four installations under guard: Telephone supplies (424594); DF Camp (German WAC) (473572); Aircraft engines (398575); Signal supplies (526674). During the day the companies evacuated 213 DIs plus functioning as military government, continuing screening and searching of area. penies made an inventory of foodstuffs within their area of reaponsibility.

Inventories of output of bakeries in sector were made on May Some maintenance work was being performed. 18 Russian DPs were evacuated to KLOTZE (320530). A warehouse containing helmets, switchboards, gas and gas equipment was discovered by C Co. at (515546) and was put under guard.

On May 14th 122 DEs were evacuated by companies. Recon-

naisance was made of new area to be occupied in vicinity of EILSLEBEN (383604).

Sattalion assumed responsibility of area in vicinity of EIISLEBEN (see overlay #4), relieving the 823rd TD Bn, at 1200 May 15. A Co. taking over guard of synthetic gas and Diesel plant at (303989) and mine and brickette factory at 303989. Rcn. Co. posted guard on salt mine and German ammo dump at 293102, and Bn. Hq. took over responsibility of sugar refinery 384002 and 20 locomotives in EILSLEBEN (384003). Location of Bn. CF - EILSLEBEN (384003); Rcn. Co. CF BEENDORF (293102), lst Flat. ERXLEBEN (397082), 2nd Flat. IVENRODE (386140), 3rd Plat. Gr. BARTENSLEBEN (305102).

A Displaced Fersons Camp at BEENDORF (293102) was being cleaned and made ready for occupation on May 16th. Banks operational and non-operational was submitted to 102nd Division artillery.

A warehouse containing radio and Radar equipment was located by C Co. at (251961) on May 18th and put under guard. Seventyfour Western Europeans were evacuated to HESSLINGEN. On May 19th a German Ammo warehouse was located and guards were posted. 330 Toles were evacuated to DF Camp at BEENDORF. May 20th, 21st, and 22md the Battalion continued Military Government and evacuation of DIs with a total of 1354 being taken to camp at BEENDORF.

May 22nd a brick kiln containing Radio and Radar equipment located at (261912) and put under guard by C Co.

On the 23rd of May atthorough search of sector disclosed a sugar factory (326069), containing 2200 tons of sugar and 12,000 burlap bags by A Co. All companies checked area for sawmil: 457 Folish Drs were evacuated. and lumber.

While checking the railroad yards at EILSLEBEN (387006) Lt. Kane of Hq. and Lt. Crowell of Tioneer Tlatoon of Rcn. Co. discovered two (2) carloads (500) machine guns (German) and 10 carloads parachute silk, guards were posted from Pioneer Flatoon.

The following two days besides Military Government functions

area was checked for air raid shelters and all found were destroyed by civilian personnel (by orders).

Preparation was being made on May 27th to turn over assigned sector to British. All installations being guarded by Bn. were turned over to British forces May 28th. British also relieved Battalion of all Military Government functions.

The balance of month entire Battalion was performing maintenence and general preparations were being made to move to newly

assigned area.

Seven (7) destroyers and crews (C Co. 6; A Co. 1) were moved to new area (998745) by tank retrievers May 29th. Six (6) destroyers (C Co.) and one T-2 (Co. A) were moved to new area (998745) May 31st.

Bn. forward CP opened at TUNGEDA (998745) at 2200 May 31st, Bn. in process of moving to new area and in preparation for assumpt

tion of responsibility (see overlay #5).

g. Status of Supply

At the close of the period, the units of the Bn. were engaged in making complete physical checks and inventories of all personal clothing and equipment and organizational equipment.

Several items have been and continue to be critical:

One Carriage Motor, M-36 with 90mm gun has not been

replaced from battle loss, as of april 1945.
At present the Bn. is located in an area infested with flies, mosquitos, and other disease carrying insects; and the issue of insect control items (screen, DDT powder, mosquito netting; fly residual and paper) has been found to be far from adequate.

The lack of parts has practically brought to a standstill all maintenance work, except first echelon. Both general purpose vehicles and tanks are deadlined because of this

lack.


