In compliance with paragraph 10, change 4, AR 345-105 and above subject letter, Headquarters, III Corps, dated 23 November 1944, the following report is submitted for the period 1 December 44 to 31 December 44 inclusive:

2. ENEMY:

a. Identification:

(1) 1 Dec - 4 Dec METZ Sector:

Enemy was holding out in number of surrounding forte. Enemy troops consisted of remnants of 20 or 30 units previously identified.

b. Summary of enemy operations:

(1) Dec 1 - 4. Metz Sector. A nice collection of remnants of many units held out in the forte surrounding METZ until supplies were exhausted.

(2) Dec 5-30. Resistance during the first part of this period was scattered and varied from heavy to none at all. In general it consisted of delaying actions combined with a maximum use of road blocks and demolitions but few mines. A few tanks were used but never more than three or four at one time. Artillery fire was scattered.

In the SAARLAUTERN area enemy resistance stiffened until in the city of SAARLAUTERN it developed into a house by house fight. Many houses were fortified pill boxes of the SIEGBURG line. Artillery fire in the SAARLAUTERN bridgehead was the heaviest ever encountered. The enemy troops were inferior, maximum use was made of the fortifications and existing terrain. A few tanks were



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used as assault guns or to dominate main roads and streets. There were several minor counter attacks by small groups of selected troops held out for this purpose.

In the LUXEMBOURG sector enemy resistance was at first very light N of ALENCON where contact with enemy patrols was first made. Heavier resistance was met at HANDBUCK and GRUSSOUE where the enemy launched a small counter attack. Heavy resistance was first encountered at BINCHE then remained moderate to just S of WILZI where very heavy resistance was encountered from dug-in Infantry and a few tanks. In this sector enemy troops were of better quality, and there were increased numbers of tanks and other armored vehicles encountered. These were committed usually in groups of 3 to 6 tanks with armored half tracks. There were used mostly in defensive and delaying actions. There were no large counter attacks.

c. Enemy losses - as a result of action of 518th TD Bn only - all figures are confirmed except enemy casualties which are estimated.

d. Prisoners captured 15.

e. Enemy morale and status of equipment:

(1) In METZ area morale of troops was reported to be low after they were surrounded and they were prevented from surrendering only by their officers.

(2) In MAARLAUTERBACH area, enemy troops were of poor quality, poorly trained and organized into small groups without much coordination. Most troops were replacements or recruits. Most were old, young, or previously classified as unfit. Morale was reported by PW's to be fair to poor. Ammunition was plentiful, food was insufficient in some cases, mostly because of supply difficulties. There seemed to be plenty of all small items of equipment but a decided lack of transport, prime movers and tanks.

(3) In the LUXEMBOURG sector, enemy troops were of better quality and morale was reported good. Troops were well equipped and there seemed to be more transport available. However, there was a decided lack of artillery, there were reports of food and gasoline shortages because of supply difficulties.

3. OWN OPERATIONS.

a. Forces engaged: From 1 Dec 44 to 1 Jan 45 the Bn was attached to 5th Inf Div, assigned to XX Corps, Third Army. From 21 Dec 1 Jan 45 the Bn was attached to 26th Inf Div, III Corps, Third Army. Until 10 Dec 44, 2nd Regt, 5th Inf Div with Co A, 518th TD Bn remained in via METZ with 57th Inf Div in immediate vicinity. Remainder of 5th Inf Div during that period had 25th Div on left and 90th Div on right, which was relieved by the 8th Cav Group. From 17 Dec 44 to 21 Dec 44 the 90th Div was on the left and 25th Div was on right. From 21 Dec 44 to 1 Jan 45 the 90th Div was on our right and the 4th Armd Div on our left. During that period 25th Inf Div relieved elements of 4th Armd Div on our left.

b. Reserves: TD Co's normally had one platoon in reserve. Co A had one platoon on secondary mission at METZ doing indirect fire on Forte Bryant and Jean D'Arc. From 9 Dec 44 - 17 Dec 44, Co's A and C in reserve in division zone and Co B 502 TD Bn had one pl in Div zone at WIEDEKIRCH. During period 17th Dec to 21 Dec 44, 507 TD Bn attached to Div protecting MAARLAUTERBACH bridge. The organic AF guns of the 5th Div gave additional support to the operations. When battalion was attached to 26th Div, one company was kept in reserve under Bn control. TD Co's in line with Inf Regts had only two pl's under their control. The other pl's were attached to Div Rq and 26th Regt troops. The organic AF guns of 26th Div gave additional support.

c. Summary of Operations: From 1 Dec 44 to 4 Dec 44 Bn (-Co B) was in via of METZ securing the city and investing Forte Bryant and Jean D'Arc. Co B was attached to 10th Inf Regt and at the start of the period was in via WIEDEKIRCH Q150058 then moved to YARNSBERG. On 4 Dec 44 Co B pl's moved E protecting approaches across German border from FORST INN HAMMERBACH MARKT. Co C in general support with

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Inf Regt moved to via YANKEE 413004Z. Rec Co under BN control moved to assembly area via GRUNDTAL. Bn CP moved to YANKEE 413004Z. Co A remained in via MEC attached to 2d Inf Regt. On 5 Dec 44 Bn CP moved to GRUNDTAL 074107Z. Co C attached to 11th Inf Regt and moved to positions via HINDE 020204Z. Rec Co established CP's providing AF warning net in Div zone. 2d pl assisted in clearing obstacles from road running NNE 020105Z through HINDE 020105Z. On 6 Dec Co A moved in support of 10th Inf Regt attack towards Saar River, to DIVERTER 020017 and 2d pl fired 77 rds HE and 3 rds APG at enemy troops and a building, obtaining good effect. Co C continued with advance of 11th Regt to E. Co A via MEC fired 100 rds HE indirect at Forte Jean D'Arc and Brient. On 7 Dec 44 Co A fired 13 rds HE in direct support of 2d, 3d, 10th Regt. 2d pl cleared obstacles from road between WISSEM & LUDWIGSHAFEN. Co A fired 168 rds HE indirect on Forte Jean D'Arc and Brient. Other Co's no change.

On 8 Dec Co's A, B, C held from attack to 07 A under BN control to provide anti-mechanized defense of Div zone. Rec Co pl's running CP's at HINDE 020717, SCHATTENAUER 020722, 020718, and 020656 providing an AF warning net and directing artillery fire on enemy. On 9 Dec Bn CP moved to WISSEM 014017 and Co A moved to 020400 and placed in reserve to do maintenance. All other Co's no change. From 10 Dec to 16 Dec 44 the 8th Div front lines were along Saar river in its zone and action was limited to patrol work. All Co's remained in same positions providing anti-mechanized defense of Div zone. Rec Co manned CP's and directed artillery fire on enemy targets. On 17 Dec 44 Co A was attached to 2d Inf Regt and Co C was attached to 11th Inf Regt. On 17 Dec 44 8th Div (less 10th Inf Regt) held 90th Inf Div in KIRCHBERG bridgehead. Co A & C moved to via HINDE 020017 crossed river and relieved pl of 807th TD BN. Pl in direct support of Inf Regt in houses to house attack on the enemy. Co B in direct support of 10th Inf Regt in via of HINDE 020017. 2d pl Co B fired 18 rds HE and 3 rds APG direct, at enemy CP in tower 2400 yards distant and CP was destroyed. On 18 Dec Co A & C in direct support of Inf Regt on assault in house to house fighting - no action. One pl Co A held in reserve. On 19 Dec, 2d pl Co A fired 18 rds APG and 3 rds HE at a pill-box in support of Inf. Pill box was not neutralized. 1st pl Co C fired 14 rds APG & 10 rds HE at a pill box. The pill box was neutralized, obtaining penetration with 2nd rd of APG; 7 on hillside & 3 taken PW. 2d pl Co C destroyed houses and CG being used by enemy with 13 rds HE and 4 rds APG. 1st Pl Co C fired at an tank which was part of small counterattack. Visibility was very poor and gun crew unable to tell results but believe tank was hit. This pl later fired 8 rds APG and 10 rds HE into house held by em and house was demolished. Rec Co established CP's in HINDE 020017 providing AF warning net. During morning of 20 Dec, 2d pl Co C fired 37 rds HE and 26 rds APG on an 80° slope in and around houses in HINDE 020017 and in all, destroyed 6 30 nests.

On alerted to move to via HINDE 020017 on offensive. It moved to assist in repelling the large scale German counter offensive on afternoon 20 Dec 1944. Bn moved to assembly area via KIRCHBERG 0200 hrs 20 Dec 44 Bn was relieved from 8th Div and attached to 28th Inf Div, III Corps. On 21 Dec Co B (-2d pl) was attached to 104th Inf Regt and moved to positions via 020424Z. 2d pl attached to 28th Div Arty. Co C (less 2d pl) was attached to 328th Inf Regt and moved to via FRANCHE 020602Z. 2d pl attached to 28th Div HQ and moved to via WISSEM 020602Z to set up positions for defense of Div CP. Co A (less 1st & 2d pl) placed in Div Rec under BN control and remained in KIRCHBERG 020017. 1st pl attached to 27 A and moved to via 020424Z. 2d pl attached to 28th Div Rec Tr and moved to via HINDE 020602Z. Rec Co remained in assembly area at KIRCHBERG 020017 under BN control. On 22 Dec, the 104th and 328th Inf Regts attacked to the north meeting only slight resistance, mainly s/a fire. 2d CP moved to HINDE 02074210. Co A 1st pl with 28th Rec Tr moved to HINDE 02074210. 2d pl moved to HINDE 02074210 to aid in covering roads around Div CP. Co B 1st pl fired 13 rds HE and broke up small em counterattack at HINDE 02074210. Co C 1st & 2d pl moved to HINDE 02074210. 1st pl fired 8 rds APG and 2 rds HE and destroyed one enemy SP gun and later fired 8 rds APG at enemy the but poor visibility prevented seeing results.

On 23 Dec 44 Co A 1st pl was relieved from 27 A, attached to 27 RAMILSK and moved to via RAMILSK at 020440Z. 2d pl destroyed an em tk HE 17 and one half track at F445237 with 2 rds APG and 6 rds HE. Co A (less 1st pl) was attached to 104th Inf Regt. Co B 1st pl fired 78 rds HE at enemy packeta X and XII of FRATEZ inflicting many casualties. 2d pl attached to 28th Rec Tr and moved to via HINDE 02074210. 3rd

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pl moved north in support of Inf attack and fired 9 rds HE destroying an enemy full track light armored vehicle at P710420. 5 en troops were killed and 5 taken prisoner. Later pl fired 18 rds AFC and 3 rds HE and destroyed one en tk Mk IV. Co C moved in support of 238th Inf attack to WAKL P665300. Rem Co placed on 24 hr road and bridge patrol within Div zone, and also manned OP at GRODNOUS P729379. On 24 Dec Co A 1st pl in support of HAMILTON attacked to the north and moved via KIRKHOV P702423; 2d pl moved to KOTYKOVKA P624303; 3d pl to via ROTHM P624303 - POLSKHETZ P655300. Co B 1st and 3d pl moved to via KIRKHOVKA P727448. 2d pl with 26th Rec which was protecting N Flank, moved to ROTHM P624303. 3d pl fired 6 rds HE and destroyed one enemy vehicle. Co C 2d pl fired 7 rds AFC & 3 rds HE at en tk VI and left it burning, and from position at P665300 fired 7 rds HE causing 12 en casualties. Rem Co continued on road and bridge patrol and manning OP. On 25 Dec Co A supported 101st Inf Regt in attack on KIRKHOV. HAMILTON dissolved and let pl relieved. 2d pl Co C was placed in protection of Div OP under Div control. Co B supported 104th Regt attack to north on KIRKHOV. Co C 1st pl from position near ANTHOR fired 32 rds HE into house and barn in ARDOR. House was a fuel dump as it exploded. Estimated 30 en troops in building. Co C placed in Corps Reserve and moved to via GRODNOUS P729379. On 26th Dec, Co A 2d pl fired 22 rds HE at en infantry at P605410 and destroyed 1 MG nest 4 killed, and later knocked out an enemy mortar, killing 4 of its crew. 1st pl moved to GRODNOUS P729379. Co B moved to via KIRKHOVKA I KIRKHOVKA P730420 in support of 104th Inf Regt.

On 27 Dec 44, Co A moved in support of 101st Regt on town of KIRKHOV-KIRKHOF P665457 and fired 22 rds HE, 3 rds AFC & 530 rds 30 cal, destroying one Mk V tank and one 82mm AT gun. Co A in via KIRKHOV P665473. Co B supported crossing of KIRKHOV river by 104th Inf Regt, platoons remaining via KIRKHOV P707450. Rem Co maintained security patrol of roads and bridges and manned OP's at P724448 & P630457. On 28th Dec, Co A in support of 101st Regt moved to KAUNOY P682482 & fired 60 rds HE, destroying one half track armored vehicle, one self-propelled gun and one Mk V tank and killing an estimated 40 enemy foot troops. On attack toward ROTHM 2d pl in support of attack destroyed one Mk V tank, killed 12 and took 7 prisoners. Co B in support of attack of 104th Regt east of KAUNOY fired 10 rds HE, 500 rds 30 cal and 500 rds 80 cal at en foot troops inflicting many casualties. Co C still in positions in and around GRODNOUS & KIRKHOV. Rem continued on road and bridge security patrols in Div zone. On night of 29 Dec, Ba alerted for expected enemy counter-attack from SE, which never materialized. 2d pl Co A destroyed one en tk Mk IV and one Mk V tk in via of ROTHM. 1st pl Co A moved to via RAVIGNE P645455. 3d pl destroyed one Mk V tk HE of ROTHM. On 29 Dec Div remained in defensive dug-in positions expecting heavy enemy counterattack with TD Co's in position. Co C 1st pl attached to 238th Inf Regt and moved to KIRKHOV P706448. 2d & 3d pl's took positions on N and S of KIRKHOV to cover road not to SE A L. Rem Co OP's maintained close observation for en armor. On 30 Dec 44, Co A remained in same positions. Co B 2d pl in support of attack of 104th Inf took up positions on hill overlooking ROTHM at P691500. One sec of 2d pl with 2d Rem Tr moved to RAVIGNE P645455. Co C 1st pl moved with 238th Inf Regt to via RAVIGNE P645456; 2d & 3d pl's moved to KIRKHOV. Rem Co continued manning OP's and securing roads and bridges in Div sector. On 31 Dec remainder of Co C 2d & 3d pl's attached to 238th Inf Regt at 0925 hrs and moved to via RAVIGNE P645455. 1st pl moved to KAUNOY P682483. Co A 2d pl moved to position at P691504. Remained of Co A no change, no action. Co B remained in same positions. No action. Known counter attack during morning but was repulsed. No armor was encountered. Rem Co 1st pl relieved from road and bridge patrol at 1700 hrs. 3d pl continued on road security patrol between Div & Regt's OP's. 2d pl manning OP's via KIRKHOV, KIRKHOF, & ROTHM.

B. Results: At beginning of period Co A supported 2nd Inf Regt around KIRKHOV when two forts were holding out. No Bryant surrendered. Co B & C supported rest of Div in its attack to KIRKHOV-KIRKHOF, providing anti-mechanized defense and supporting Inf Div with direct fire. No tanks were encountered. In KIRKHOVKA bridgehead, Co's A & C closely supported Inf Div with direct fire in the assault of pillboxes and houses to house fighting. During this period 1 pillbox, 2 houses & 5 MG's nests were destroyed and an unknown number of casualties inflicted on the enemy. Co B in support of 10th Inf Regt in DIVYATEN sector destroyed one en OP located in a town. During period that Ba was attached

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to 28th Inf Div besides providing an anti-mechanized defense in Div zone. Companies were in close support of Inf Divs and destroyed 3 self-propelled guns, 4 M4 tanks, 4 M47 tanks, 1 M47 tank, 1 82mm M7 gun, 2 half tracked armored vehicles, 1 full tracked armored vehicle, 1 wheeled vehicle, 1 M6, 1 mortar, and 1 fuel dump. Heavy casualties were inflicted on enemy and a number of prisoners taken. Only enemy armor encountered was 1 to 3 tanks with foot troops.

4. SUPPLY AND MAINTENANCE.

a. Summary of supply activity during period and factors affecting flow of supplies.

(1) During the time covered by this report the Battalion was attached to the 8th Infantry Division from the 1st of December to the 20th of December inclusive; and the 28th Infantry Division from the 21st of December to the 31st of December. Both Divisions operate ordnance with their attached units. The various supply agencies of the divisions supplied the BN with the exception of Ordnance and Ordnance Class II, which were obtained from the assigned Corps or Army installation. During the attachment to the 8th Infantry Division all Ordnance repair and replacement was handled by the 28th Ordnance Heavy Tank Company of the 193rd Ordnance Battalion. Ordnance requisitions and repairs were handled by the 28th Ordnance Medium Maintenance Company in all emergencies. The period of the 21st to the 28th of December all Ordnance was handled by the 52nd Heavy Tank Company of the 18th Ordnance Battalion. The remainder of the month the BN was assigned to the 22nd Heavy Tank Company of the 24th Ordnance Battalion.

(2) The above mentioned Ordnance units provided 3rd echelon maintenance. First and 2nd echelon maintenance was performed by the BN Maintenance pl and company motor sections.

(3) Rations for the month averaged 62% (10 in 1) and 22% "P". Rations were issued to the Co's daily. "P" rations were consumed by all companies when conditions warranted. All Co's consumed the same "P" ration for Christmas.

(4) Co's requisitioned on the BN for all supplies which were secured as rapidly as possible from the proper supply agencies. Motor Maintenance and parts supply was handled by the BN Motor Officer. The critical status of tires 7:50 x 20 for truck, 3½ ton G.C., ended up during this period. The BN has 100% of these type tires. The tires 6:00 x 16 for truck & ton 4x4 remained very critical, the BN is short 21 at this date. Four blankets were drawn and issued each individual in lieu of sleeping bag which has not been received.

(5) Ammunition: Basic load maintained by replacement as expended.
