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# ATTER ACTION REPORT TOR THE MANTH OF APRIL 1915

#### I SUISARY OF OPERATIONS

## 1. Phase I: Operations Against the "Ruhr Pocket".

a, Having been detached from the 29th Division Artillery on 31 Morch 1965, the 821st Tank Destroyer Battalion was attached to the 29th Infantry Division for operational control. The Battalion remained attached to the 29th Infantry Division until 6 April 1965. On 6 April the Battalion was detached from the 29th Infantry Division and was attached to the 29th Division Artillery. The Battalion remained attached to the 29th Division Artillery through the period ending 30 April 1965.

b. During the period 1 April to 30 April 1915, the 821st Tank
Destroyor Battalion moved from the east bank of the Rhine River to the west
bank of the Elbe River. A variety of missions were performed and a variety
of activity engaged in on the move between the Rhine and the Elbe. Company
"B" was committed in the fighting on the north of the "Ruber Pocket", the
entire Dattalion participated for thirteen days in year area security and
military government, the Battalion made a 210 mile motor march, ordering the
Heser River, to the Division assembly area near the Elbe River, arriving in
time to take part in the final morping up of ensay resistance in the towns
and on the roads leading to the west bank of the Elbe River.

- g. On 1 April 1915, Company "B" plus the 1st Recommissance Platoon was attached to the 116th Infantry Regiment for operations against the pocket of enemy resistance which had been surrounded by the 9th Army on the north and the 1st Army on the South. The enemy resistance was in the Industrial Euler Valley, referred to as the "Ruhr Pocket".
- (1) In six days operations, 1 April through 6 April 1915, Company "3" plus the 1st Recommissance Plateon moved east and south, in general support of the 116th Infantry Regiment, from the vicinity of Kol Brassert, map coordinates 550100, the 1st Plateon to the vicinity of Kilinghausen, map coordinates 762268, the 2nd and 3rd Plateons to the vicinity of Grambauer, map coordinates 501333.
- (a) As elements of the lifth infantry Regiment pushed forward to assigned objectives, Company "B"'s Destroyers provided close in support against enemy foot troops with .30 and .50 .cal machine gam fire. Then objectives were secured Co "B"'s Destroyers would immidiately assess anti-mechanized defense positions against possible enemy counter attacks.
- (2) On 6 April 1965 Company "B" was relieved of their operational mission and served to the Battalies assembly area.

#### 2. Phase II: Kilitary Coverment.

a. The dattalion; less Company "d" until 6 April, remained in ascending position from 1 April to 8 April 1945. Un 8 April the Buttalian assumed responsibility for the security and Military Covernment functions or an area bounded on the east by the Coesfeld, (map coordinates 6172) Il Roken (map coordinates 5255) railroad, on the south by the Kl Relean, Or Relam, (map coordinates 5200) Reiden (map coordinates 1559) highway, on the west by the Heiden, Velon (map coordinates \$366) highway and on the south by the Velen, Coesfeld highway, to include all towns mentioned.

- (1) on 8 April 1915 Companies of the Battalion moved into areas as shown on inclosed Military Government Overlay No. 1. Sack Company maintained guards for routes of communications, bridges, hospitals, factories displaced persons camps and all civilian installations of military important in their assigned sectors. Road Blocks were set up to collect displaced persons and allied prisoners of war.
- (2) The Battalion expouted security missions and military government functions in the assigned area until 19 April 1945. During this perisi a total of 827 Displaced Persons and a total of 1169 Allied Prisoners of The word colinated and cared for-

### 3. Phase III: Advance to the Elbe River.

a. In 18 April all elements of the Extalion were relieved of their security and Military Covernment mission by the 17th Airborns Infantry Division. On 19 April the Battalian moved by administrative motor march from the vicinity of Heiden, map coordinates 1859, to an assembly area in the vicinity of Helmerkamp, map coordinates 7517.

b. The 5th Armored Division, in its repid advence to the Elbe River, by-passed many pockets of energ resistance. The 29th Infantor Division, following in the path of the 5th Armored Division, sopped up these by-passed pockets of registence and relieved elements of the 5th Armored Division on their objectives. Companies "A" and "B" plus the 3rd and lat Reconnsisonnce Platoons were attached, on 19 April, to the 116th and 115th Infantry Regiments, of the 29th Infantry Division for the mapping up operations. Company "C", in division reserve, followed close behind the some of action and maintained defensive positions on the Division's right flank.

c. The Battalion, having been relieved of their operational missions on 24 April 1945, remained in division reserve until 27 April. On 27 April the Battalion assumed responsibility for rear area security and Military Covernment functions for the area as shown on inclosed Military Covernment Overlay No. 2. Quards were maintained on routes of communications, bridges, hospitals, factories, displaced persons camps and all civilian installations of military importance. Road blocks were set up to collect displaced persons and allied prisoners of war. The Battalion continued to provide rear area security and operate as Military Covernment through the end of the period, 30 April 1945.

## II BATTLE CASCALTIES

- 1. As a result of enemy action the following casualties were suffered:
- g. Five enlisted non were killed in action by energy anti-tank mines.
  - b. One officer was wounded in action by enemy small arms fire.
  - c. Two enlisted men were wounded in action by enemy AAA fire.
- d. One officer and thirteen enlisted men were wounded in action by enemy anti-tank mines.
  - o. One enlisted men reported missing in action.
