SUBJECT: Battalien History.

1. The following is the Battalion History of the 822d Tank Destroyer Battalien per Circular Number 22, Paragraph 2, your headquarters dated 25 October 1944:

BATTALION HISTORY

"IMPELIE OBSTANTIA" - Overcome Obstacles, this is the Battalien Metto and has served us well in training and at the front. This motte is a challenge to all and we make it our bywerd.

The Battalien was activated 25 July 1942 at Camp Garson, Colorade, and LT COL JOSEPH L. FRASER was the first Commanding Officer. From 14 Nevember 1942 to 23 February 1943 LT COL JOSEPH M. LOVELL commanded the Battalien.

On 23 February 1943 the present Commanding Officer LT COL SEWARD L. MAINS
JR assumed command of the battalien. This event took place at Camp Bewie, Texas and under his able leadership the Battalien began an intensive program of training;
Missien - Combat.

From the time of activation until 27 August 1942 new arrivals continued to swell the strength of the Battalien. Later with only half of its authorized strength the unit was ordered to Camp Livingston, Louisians where on the 11 January 1943 the Battaliens strength was increased to its authorized quota.

Normal training was held at Camp Livingston, Louisiana until 12 January 1943 when the Battalien entrained for Camp Bowie, Texas, where more advanced training was pursued in earnests. At this time the 822d Tank Destreyer Battalien left for Camp Heed, Texas and arrived there 5 April 1943.

At Camp Hood the Battalion set excellent records in their training at Hood. In these days the Battalion was established as one of the outstanding Tank Destroyer (Tewed) units in the country. Frim here the Battalion moved to Camp Breckinridge, Kentucky where it was put through some extensive training and firing practice.

One of the highlights of the Battalien History was the period between 29 January and 27 March 1944 when the 822d participated in Tennessee Maneuvers, valuable training was gleaned from this maneuver. From the Maneuver Area the Battalion was moved to Fort Jackson, South Carolina, where it did considerable firing and was moved to Camp Atterbury, Indiana for one month of maneuvers and firing with an Infantry Division.

When the Battalien returned to Fort Jackson, preparations for everseas was begun in earnest. On the 13 November 1944 the Battalien entrained for Camp Shanks, New York and shortly thereafter were on the high seas heading for England.

In Southern England the Battalien received their equipment and vehicles. On the 20 January 1945 the Battalien bearded LST's and landed in France a few days later. Two weeks were spent in a rear area before orders were received assigning the Battalien to the 7th Army. Several days later the Battalien reported to the 7th Army and was attached to the 63d Infantry Division. On the 7 February 1945 the 822d Tank Destroyer Battalien moved onto the line.
