AWARD OF THE BRONZE STAR MEDAL

By direction of the President, under the provisions of Army Regulations 600-45, 22 September 1943, as amended, the Bronze Star Medal is awarded by the Commanding General to the following for heroic achievement:

RICHARD C. ANTHONY, 32493867, Private First Class, Field Artillery, Battery "C", *** Field Artillery Battalion, for heroic achievement in action on 18 February 1945, in the vicinity of Auersmacher, Germany. Private First Class Anthony was ordered to bring forward a vehicle containing vitally needed radio equipment. Although under constant enemy artillery fire and pinned down completely on two occasions during the attempt, Private First Class Anthony succeeded in accomplishing his mission and enabled his forward observer section to maintain communications with the battalion. Entered military service from Canjoharie, New York.

EDWIN E. BLOOMFIELD, 36976645, Technician Fifth Grade, Field Artillery, Battery "B", *** Field Artillery Battalion, for heroic achievement in action on 19 February 1945, in the vicinity of Bliesguersviller, France. While under fire during the attack, Technician Fifth Grade Bloomfield assisted in adjusting artillery fire. After the objective had been taken, the enemy counter-attacked with armor and infantry. Although under heavy enemy fire, he continued to assist in directing the artillery fire which had to be placed close to his own infantry. His courage and disregard for personal safety initially aided in delaying the enemy counter-attack which was later repulsed. Entered military service from Lansing, Michigan.

LOAMIE S. BRESLER, 01321285, First Lieutenant, Infantry, Company "H", *** Infantry Regiment, for heroic achievement in action on 17 February 1945, in the vicinity of Bliesgersweiler, Germany. Although subjected to heavy enemy artillery and mortar fire, Lieutenant Bresler successfully located zones of fire for the machine gun squads, enabling them to move into position and fulfill their mission. Entered military service from Elm Mott, Texas.

MATTHIAS A. BROADHEAD, 34807035, Technician Fifth Grade, Medical Department, Medical Detachment, *** Infantry Regiment, for heroic achievement in action on 26 January 1945, in the vicinity of Jebensheim, France. As aid man with his company in an attack, Technician Fifth Grade Broadhead was wounded from mortar shell fragments. Although under intense enemy mortar and artillery fire, he continued giving aid to the wounded until all casualties had been treated, disregarding his wound and refusing to be evacuated. Realizing that he was the only aid man left, he rejoined his company and continued his duties. Entered military service from Yarbo, Alabama.

JOHN S. GRIM, 12102629, Corporal, Field Artillery, Battery "C", *** Field Artillery Battalion, for heroic achievement in action on 17 February 1945, in the vicinity of Auersmacher, Germany. Although under heavy mortar fire which pinned down part of his outfit, Corporal Grim, with utter disregard for his personal safety, moved vital equipment necessary to aid the infantry in taking and holding its objective. His action materially assisted in repelling the enemy counter-attack. Entered military service from Ithaca, New York.

WALTER A. CYBULSKI, 36163071, Private First Class (then Private), Infantry, Company "A", *** Infantry Regiment, for heroic achievement in action on 3 January 1945, in the vicinity of Aachen, France. On his own initiative, Private First Class Cybulski moved through intense enemy sniper fire to an abandoned French tank. Finding it in working condition but without fuel, he helped procure gasoline for it, exposing himself while doing so. He then assisted in manning the tank which was used to support the advance of his company. After his company gained its objective, he observed an enemy machine gun holding up the advance of Company "G". He helped maneuver the tank so as to bring fire on and destroy the enemy machine gun. Private First Class Cybulski was instrumental in aiding his regiment to attain its objective with a minimum of casualties, assisting in the capture of twenty-eight enemy and killing an undetermined number. Entered military service from Hemtremck, Michigan.

JAMES L. DAVIS, 33549991, Private, Field Artillery, Headquarters Battery, *** Field Artillery Battalion, for heroic achievement in action on 16 February 1945, in the vicinity of Auersmacher, Germany. Under intermittent enemy small arms fire, Private Davis continued his assigned mission of laying wire to the forward elements of the infantry, and its successful completion enabled the liaison officer to continually maintain communications with the artillery forward observer and the battalion fire direction center. Entered military service from Baltimore, Maryland.

JOSEPH S. DELANEY, 33795093, Technician Fifth Grade, Field Artillery, Headquarters Battery, *** Field Artillery Battalion for heroic achievement in action on 15 February 1945, in the vicinity of Bliesbrucken Woods, France. During darkness, prior to H-Hour, Technician Fifth Grade Delaney, upon becoming separated from his liaison section, proceeded to voluntarily service and repair several miles of wire. At times the wire lines were so swept by mortar fire that he had to run from cover to cover, repairing the lines as he moved along, never allowing himself to be pinned down by hostile fire. Entered military service from Philadelphia, Pennsylvania.

→ EDWIN E. GLENN, 01824852, First Lieutenant, (then Second Lieutenant), Infantry, Company "A", *** Tank Destroyer Battalion, for heroic achievement in action on 18 February 1945, in the vicinity of Hanweiler, Germany. During an enemy counter-attack, Lieutenant Glenn, although under concentrated small arms and mortar fire, made his way forward through withdrawing troops to a gun of his company and disarmed it by removing the breech block. When the enemy was forced to withdraw, he assembled the crew, and the gun was placed back in action without loss of life or materiel. Entered military service from Ypsilanti, Michigan.

NUMBER 55) AWARD OF THE BRONZE STAR MEDAL

By direction of the President, under the provisions of Army Regulations 600-45, 22 September 1943, as amended, the Bronze Star Medal is awarded by the Commanding General to the following for heroic achievement:

TIMOTHY J. MURPHY, JR., 12097246, Sergeant (then Private First Class), Field Artillery, Headquarters Battery, *** Field Artillery Battalion, for heroic achievement in action on 15 February 1945, in the vicinity of Eliesbrucken Woods, France. Sergeant Murphy, radio operator, was detailed to locate a wire crew and lead it forward during an attack on enemy installations. The crew could not be found and Sergeant Murphy, on his own initiative, repaired and maintained vital wire along a road receiving continuous enemy sniper and mortar fire. The aggressive determination displayed by Sergeant Murphy was largely responsible for continuous and necessary communications. Entered military service from Fordham, New York.

JAMES L. NELSON, 33645216, Private First Class, Field Artillery, Battery "A", *** Field Artillery Battalion, for heroic achievement in action on 17 February 1945, in the vicinity of Auersmacher, Germany. Although separated by darkness and fog from the main body of troops in attack, Private First Class Nelson continued to advance under the weight of a seventy-five pound radio until he joined his platoon at the top of a hill. From there, he established and maintained radio communications for two and one-half days under heavy artillery and mortar fire. Entered military service from Richmond, Virginia.

EDWARD A. OUGER, 6863417, Sergeant, Infantry, Company "I", *** Infantry Regiment, for heroic achievement in action on 15 February 1945, in the vicinity of Eliesbrucken Woods, France. During the attack on Eliesbrucken Woods, Sergeant Ouger, on his own initiative, proceeded through a draw where sniper fire was hitting his men. He succeeded in knocking out one sniper and was about to get another when he was wounded. All during the attack, Sergeant Ouger displayed magnificent leadership shouting words of encouragement to his men. His actions won the respect of the officers and men of his unit. Entered military service from Leavenworth, Kansas.

WALTER PLUMMER, 35092918, Technician Fifth Grade, Infantry, Headquarters Company, Third Battalion, *** Infantry Regiment, for heroic achievement in action on 17 February 1945, in the vicinity of Auersmacher, Germany. Technician Fifth Grade Plummer, radio operator, was wounded by a mortar shell during an attack by his battalion. Despite his wound, he continued to operate his radio for two days, providing the only means of communication. Entered military service from Columbus, Indiana.

→ HOWARD W. POLLARD, 0386196, Captain, Field Artillery, Company "A", *** Tank Destroyer Battalion, for heroic achievement in action on 17 February 1945, in the vicinity of Bubingen, Germany. Captain Pollard, without regard for personal safety, went forward of the front lines under enemy observation to reconnoiter gun positions and personally escorted guns into position, being subjected to heavy enemy fire on five occasions. Under his leadership, Captain Pollard's company materially assisted the infantry in gaining its objective. Entered military service from St. Louis, Missouri.

HAROLD V. SEAVEY, 01314066, First Lieutenant, Infantry, Company "F", *** Infantry Regiment, for heroic achievement in action on 19 February 1945, in the vicinity of Bliesgersweiler, Germany. At the beginning of an attack, one of the men was killed by a tree burst of mortar fire. As artillery fire was falling heavily and mutilating the body, Lieutenant Seavey recovered the body, bringing it to a safer area. Inspired by this act on the part of their platoon leader and with increased confidence, the attacking party continued its mission, reaching and holding its objective. Entered military service from Spokane, Washington.

DOUGLAS C. SHAHEEN, 37648501, Private First Class, Field Artillery, Battery "A", *** Field Artillery Battalion, for heroic achievement in action on 3 March 1945, in the vicinity of Gudingen, Germany. Although his forward observer party was subjected to terrific enemy artillery and small arms fire, Private First Class Shaheen refused to be pinned down and demonstrated magnificent courage and initiative in laying and maintaining wire for his party. He also made a valuable reconnaissance under terrific fire which enabled his party to rejoin its infantry company. Later in the action he administered first aid to wounded soldiers and remained with them until they were evacuated. Entered military service from East St. Louis, Illinois.

BERNARD M. STREHL, 36874748, Technician Fifth Grade, Field Artillery, Headquarters Battery, *** Field Artillery Battalion, for heroic achievement in action on 19 February 1945, in the vicinity of Auersmacher, Germany. During an attack by the infantry to which his forward observer section was assigned, Technician Fifth Grade Strehl was ordered to bring his communication vehicle forward at the earliest opportunity. In his first attempt to carry out his mission, he was driven back by artillery fire. During his second attempt, his vehicle was struck by shell fragments. In spite of this damage and continuous danger, he repaired the vehicle and, on the third attempt, successfully completed his mission and provided the means of maintaining communication. Entered military service from Detroit, Michigan.

JOHN P. WEISENSEE, 0551072, First Lieutenant, Infantry, Headquarters Company, *** Infantry Regiment, for heroic achievement in action on 17 February 1945, in the vicinity of Rilhingen, Germany. Lieutenant Weisensee led his twenty-six man patrol against three heavily defended enemy strong-points and within a period of two hours successfully eliminated them, destroyed three machine guns and two mortars and took forty-six prisoners, without a single casualty in his patrol. Entered military service from Sioux Falls, South Dakota.

HAROLD WICKHAM, 32511319, Sergeant, Field Artillery, Headquarters Battery, *** Field Artillery Battalion, for heroic achievement in action on 26 February 1945, in the vicinity of Auersmacher, Germany. Sergeant Wickham, with his wire crew, was ordered to lay a line to his liaison officer in the forward area. Soon after entering upon this mission, heavy enemy mortar fire was encountered. Sergeant Wickham directed his crew to remove the wire from the truck and to proceed on foot laying the wire by hand, although under continuous enemy fire. Sergeant Wickham's courage, initiative and outstanding leadership resulted in the completion of his mission. Entered military service from Middletown, New York.

FRED A. PACIFICCO, 32956131, Staff Sergeant, Infantry, Company "B", *** Infantry Regiment, for meritorious service from 13 February 1945 to 28 February 1945, in the vicinity of Sarreguemines, France. Entered military service from Glassboro, New Jersey.

FRANK J. TETTEMER, JR., 01290157, Captain, Infantry, Headquarters, First Battalion, *** Infantry Regiment, for meritorious service from 15 February 1945 to 8 March 1945, in the vicinity of Hanweiler, Germany. Entered military service from Howlett, New York.

HARRY G. VOTH, 01317449, First Lieutenant, Infantry, Service Company, *** Infantry Regiment, for meritorious service from 15 February 1945 to 8 March 1945, in the vicinity of Hanweiler, Germany. Entered military service from Moberly, Missouri.

AWARD OF THE BRONZE STAR MEDAL

By direction of the President, under the provisions of Army Regulations 600-45, 22 September 1943, as amended, the Bronze Star medal is awarded by the Commanding General to the following for heroic achievement:

HARVEY S. GENDEN, 01179406, First Lieutenant (then Second Lieutenant), Infantry, Company "K", *** Infantry Regiment, for heroic achievement in action on 5 January 1945, in the vicinity of Gros Rederching, France. The enemy attacked at night and broke through to the right of Company "K", endangering not only the company but the entire battalion. Lieutenant Genden's platoon was defending that flank; and by his constant circulation among his men, in spite of intense enemy fire, he inspired and controlled them. Lieutenant Genden coordinated the defense with such skill as to repel the determined enemy thrusts. Entered military service from Springfield, Massachusetts.

LAWRENCE W. JORDAN, 02049597, First Lieutenant, Medical Administrative Corps, Medical Detachment, *** Infantry Regiment, for heroic achievement in action on 20 February 1945, in the vicinity of Kleinblittersdorf, Germany. Notwithstanding enemy sniper fire, Lieutenant Jordan aided in saving the life of an officer by giving initial first aid and acting as litter bearer in removing him to safety. He constantly displayed outstanding courage and bravery under enemy fire in directing and assisting litter bearers in evacuating the wounded. His leadership and disregard for personal safety encouraged and inspired his men. Entered military service from Greenwich, Connecticut.

JAMES W. PATRICK, 35697958, Technical Sergeant, Infantry, Company "C", *** Infantry Regiment, for heroic achievement in action on 17 February 1945, in the vicinity of Auersmacher, Germany. Sergeant Patrick, with utter disregard for his personal safety, exposed himself to enemy fire and with limited knowledge of the German language succeeded in securing the surrender of twenty Germans occupying an enemy strongpoint. This action resulted in saving the lives of many men in his platoon and facilitated the taking of remaining strongpoints, thus permitting the advance of the battalion. Entered military service from Seymour, Indiana.

JOHN W. PLATTNER, 36978104, Private First Class (then Private), Medical Department, Medical Detachment, *** Infantry Regiment, for heroic achievement in action on 16 February 1945, in the vicinity of Hanweiler, Germany. Private First Class Plattner crossed the Saar River in an assault boat with the platoon to which he was attached. He helped with the treatment and evacuation of the wounded, carrying them to a point of safety although continuously exposed to intense enemy machine gun and mortar fire. Entered military service from Evanston, Illinois.

STANLEY R. SOMERVILLE, 35174559, Sergeant, Infantry, Company "C", *** Infantry Regiment, for heroic achievement in action on 3 March 1945, in the vicinity of Bubington, Germany. After having his squad reduced to two men, Sergeant Somerville placed his machine gun in position to cover the advance of an attacking platoon. During the attack, it was necessary for him to carry his own ammunition and man the machine gun under constant enemy observation and fire. His actions inflicted heavy casualties on the enemy, which assisted in forcing them to withdraw. Entered military service from Akron, Ohio.

IRA B. STEPP, 34922773, Sergeant (then Private First Class), Infantry, Company "K", *** Infantry Regiment, for heroic achievement in action on 4 January 1945, in the vicinity of Gros Rederching, France. On the night of 4 January 1945, a strong German attack broke through to the right of his company. Sergeant Stepp manned a light machine gun alone on the company's right flank. He remained there by himself all night, and his work was a major factor in repelling determined enemy thrusts which endangered the entire battalion. Morning disclosed five enemy dead within fifteen feet of his gun and many more at greater distances within his line of fire. Entered military service from Lake City, Tennessee.

→ JOSEPH P. TERESE, 38377306, Corporal (then Private), Field Artillery, Company "A", *** Tank Destroyer Battalion, for heroic achievement in action on 7 March 1945, in the vicinity of Pechingen, Germany. Corporal Terese, member of a gun crew having the mission of expelling the enemy from a strongly fortified position, after receiving an order to evacuate his position, with unflinching devotion to duty and complete disregard for personal safety volunteered to stay at his gun. He fired a total of sixty rounds under intense return fire from the enemy, then was forced to the rear by the heavy enemy fire. Corporal Terese returned under the same hazards and removed the breech block and the firing mechanism to render the gun unserviceable to the enemy and yet serviceable to his organization. Entered military service from New Orleans, Louisiana.
