AWARD OF BRONZE STAR ! TEDAL

Under the rovisions of Army Regulations 600-45, 22 September 1943, as amended, the Bronze Star Medal is awarded to following named individuals:

FIRST LIEUTENANT GEORGE F. HOAGLIN, 01308820, Infantry, Company "G", 409th Infantry Regiment. For heroism in action. On 8 February 1945, LIEU-TENANT HOAGLIN led his platoon in a night raid on Kindwiller, France, with the mission of taking prisoners. Approaching to within 50 yards of the village, before being discovered and subjected to machine gun and small arms fire, he led his men against the enemy positions, destroying the hostile machine gun emplacements with hand grenades and automatic weapon fire. LIEUTENANT HOAGLIN led his men into several houses, captured seven of the enemy and then, remaining behind as the men withdrew, directed the evacuation of the wounded. His actions reflected the highest traditions of the military service. Residence: Scott, Ohio.

FIRST LIEUTENANT RAYMOND P. RUPPEL, Ol081672 (then SECOND LIEUTENANT), Infantry, Company "G", 411th Infantry Regiment. For heroism in action. On 14 January 1945, near Cetingen, France, two platoons of Company "G", 411th Infantry, attacking enemy positions on high ground, were pinned down by enemy machine gun and small arms fire coming from the flanks and high ground. After deploying his men to secure the test cover and concealment, LIEUTENANT RUPPEL, although wounded, crawled through the intense fire to a forward observer and pointed out the hostile positions. He then returned over the exposed terrain to his men, reorganized the platoons and successfully withdrew under cover of our artillery. LIEUTENANT RUPPEL's actions reflected the highest traditions of the military service. Residence: Beaver, Pennsylvania.

FIRST LIEUTENANT JACK O. GRACEY, 01318973, Infantry, Headquarters Company, Third Battalion, 411th Infantry Regiment. For heroic achievement in action. On 21 april 1945, near Schorndorf, Germany, when resistance from an enemy platoon prevented the battalion vehicles from following advancing riflemen, LIEUTENANT GRACEY returned to the rear, organized and led a small force against the entrenched enemy. After placing his men in a covered position, he personally went forward to demand the surrender of the enemy force who immediately opened fire with small arms and automatic weapons. LIEUTENANT GRACEY maneuvered his small force, and directing fire into the hostile position, forced thirty of the enemy to surrender. His actions which opened a route of supply

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reflected the highest traditions of the military service. Residence: Breck-enridge, Texas.

Private First Class arthur R. Meyer, 32866724, Infantry, Company "G", 409th Infantry Regiment. For heroism in action. On 8 February 1945, in a night raid on Kindwiller, France, Private Meyer, disregarding enemy machine gun and small arms fire, made his way into a house from which the fire was coming. After throwing a concussion grenade into the basement, he rushed down the stairway demanding that the enemy surrender. His bold actions resulted in the capture of seven of the enemy. After the signal had been given to withdraw, Private Meyer remained behind to aid in the evacuation of the wounded. His actions reflected the highest traditions of the military service. Residence: Hollis, New York.

SECOND LIEUTENANT DELOS H. YANCEY, 02011785, Infantry, Headquarters Compeny, Third Battalion, 411th Infantry Regiment. For heroism in action. On 22 April 1945, near Lindorf, Germany, when additional ammunition was needed for front line troops, LIEUTENANT YANCEY voluntarily went forward to reconnition a safe route for the vehicles. Discovering the only route available to be mined, he dismounted and personally began to remove the mines. Despite constant enemy sniper fire and a heavy mortar barrage, he cleared the road and then organized and led a group of drivers forcing the enemy to withdraw. LIEUTENANT YANCEY's actions which opened a supply route to forward elements reflected the highest traditions of the military service. Residence: atlanta, Georgia.

Sergeant Gordon E. Wright, 31253494, Infantry, Company "C", 409th Infantry Regiment. For heroic achievement in action. On 30 April 1945, in an attack on Scharmitz, Austria, Sergeant Wright and several other men of Company "C", 409th Infantry were wounded. Although suffering from painful wounds, Sergeant Wright refused medical attention and assisted in evacuating the more seriously wounded men across a turbulent stream and an open valley, which were covered by enemy sniper and heavy machine gun fire. Not until all the wounded had been cleared from the field, did he submit to evacuation. His actions reflected the highest traditions of the military service: Residence: Chelsea, Vermont.

FIRST LIEUTENANT RAYMOND H. FURBEE, 01325154, Infantry, Company "C", 409th Infantry Regiment. For heroic achievement in action. On 4 May 1945, near Zirl. Austria, when the First Platoon, Company "C", 409th Infantry was pinned down by the enemy small arms and 20 millimeter automatic weapons fire, LIEU-TEA/AT FURBEE, executive officer, rushed to the men and encouraged them to rove on in the attack. Under his leadership the platoon moved on, seized its objective and inflicted numerous casualties upon the enemy. In the attack that followed LIEUTENANT FURBEE personally killed an enemy sniper and moved from platoon to platoon encouraging the men. His outstanding leadership reflected the highest traditions of the military service. Residence: Akron, Ohio.

FIRST LIEUTENANT EDWARD BRAY, 01322418, Infantry, Company "K", 411th Infantry Regiment. For heroic achievement in action. On 24 April 1945, as

Company "K", 41th Infantry, advanced on the town of Honau, Germany, it was halted by intense enemy machine gun, rifle and mortar fire. LIEUTENANT ERAY moved into an area completely exposed to enemy fire in order to relay the position of the enemy to the artillery. He fearlessly remained in position successfully directing and calling more accurate directions to the artillery resulting in the complete neutralization of the hostile strongpoint. LIEUTEMANT BRAY's actions reflected the highest traditions of the military service. Residence: Houston, Mississippi.

SECOND LIEUTENANT NOBERT LURIE, 0546870, Infantry, Headquarters Company, Second Battalion, Allth Infantry Regiment. For heroic achievement in action. On 26 November 1944 in the vicinity of Saulcy, France, LIEUTENANT LURIE, Ammunition and Picneer platoon leader, advanced with attacking infantry elements constantly checking the status of the ammunition supply. When he found that the supply was running low he proceeded back to the battalion supply point which necessitated his wading through the icy waters of a swift stream. Having located the supply point he quickly organized a five man team to haul the ammunition to the brink of the stream. Under constant enemy fire he transported the ammunition across the river braving the icy stream many times. This accomplished, the ammunition was hand carried for a distance of one kilometer at which point LIEUTENANT LURIE personally distributed the vitally needed ammunitions to the companies. LIEUTENANT LURIE's actions reflected the highest traditions of the military service. Residence: Long Beach, New York.

MAJOR "TILIAM E. TILIS, JR., 0291451, Infantry, (then CAFTAIN), Headquarters First Battalion, (then Headquarters Second Battalion), Allth Infantry Regiment. For heroic achievement in action. On 18 March 1945, in the vicinity of Longensulbach, France, MAJOR "TILIS, in the command of the rear command post of the battalion, received orders changing the original plans of the battalion's advance. Cognizant that the plans must reach the battalion commander without delay MAJOR "VILLIS went forward with meager knowledge of the battalion's location as all communication had been lost due to the swiftness of the advance. Encountering an eight man enemy patrol along the rute MAJOR WILLIS skillfully cutmaneuvered them and escaped undetected. After a laborous and hazardous four hour search he located the advance battalion command post and delivered the vital information. His actions reflected the highest traditions of the military service. Residence: Franklin, North Carolina.

CAPTAIN JOSEPH N. CREINER, 0488796, (then FIRST LIEUTEMANT), Infantry, Headquarters Second Battalion, (then Company "F"), 41 th Infantry Regiment. For heroic achievement in action. On 22 November 1944, in the vicinity of Les Coures, France, one platoon of Company "F", 41 th Infantry, in the advance, was cut off from the rest of the company by intense enemy artillery fire. CAITAIN CREINER, realizing that communications must be reestablished, made a hasty reconnaissance under intense fire to determine the best route of approach. The route selected, CAITAIN CREINER returned to the company and with the aid of a forward observer made his way with the necessary wire over 900 yards of fire-swept terrain. Contact established, communications were relayed to the artillery which ultimately neutralized the enemy emplacements. CAPTAIN CREINER's actions were in accordance with the highest traditions of the military service. Residence: New Orleans, Louisiana.

GO #143, He 103d Inf Div, dtd 23 May 45 AWARD OF BRONZE STAR MEDAL (Cont'd)

FIRST LIEUTENANT HRUCE E. HAMIL, O1823437, Field Artillery, Company "C", 824th Tank Destroyer Battalion. For heroic achievement in action. During the period 3 December 1944 to 15 April 1945 in France and Gormany, LIEUTENANT HAMIL skillfully and carefully made reconnaissances of enemy territory for all missions. Always at the lead of his men, no matter how dangerous the mission, LIEUTENANT HAMIL added immeasurably to the successes of the platoon. In many instances during particularly savage fighting he moved from destroyer to destroyer in order to be assured that the maximum in efficiency and fire power was being expended. His heroic actions were a source of inspiration to those about him and reflected the highest traditions of the military service. Residence: Chicago, Illinois.

Sergeant Arthur E. Weissman, 39108631, Field Artillery, Company "C", 824th Tank Destroyer Battalion. For heroic achievement in action. During the period 22 and 23 December 1944, Sergeant Weissman kept vital communications intact as his company advanced in direct support of infantry elements in the attack on Fort Regeret, France. Intense enemy artillery fire constantly disrupted communications, necessitating Sergeant Weissman's going forward under fire to repair the breaks. Communications were maintained adding immeasurably to the coordination between the tank destroyers and the infantry. On 14 April 1945, near Obr Heinriet, Germany, when placed in command of a destroyer during an emergency, Sergeant Weissman responded brilliantly by displaying outstanding leadership and assisting in the repulsion of a counterattack by the enemy. Sergeant Weissman's actions reflected the highest traditions of the military service. Residence: San Francisco, California.

FIRST LIEUTENANT MARLIN N. KENEE, Gl296384, Infantry, Company "I", 411th Infantry Regiment. For heroism in action. On 15 March 1945, in the vicinity of Muhlhausen, France, LIEUTENANT KENEE was informed that the forward regimental liaison officer had been seriously wounded by a mine and that he was to assume his duties. The only approach to the forward observation post was through a heavily mined field but oblivious of personal danger, he proceeded through the mine field on foot. During his trip across the field, enemy fire was severe adding immeasurably to the dangers of the hidden mines. Encountering several wounded men lying in the field LIEUTENANT KENEE made repeated trips from the scene of the wounded to the aid station to direct their evacuation. When all the wounded had been cleared LIEUTENANT KENEE went forward and assumed his duties as liaison officer. His actions reflected the highest traditions of the military service. Residence: Duncannon, Pennsylvania.

I -- A TARD OF SELVER STAR. Under the provisions of Army Regulations 600-45, 22 September 1743, as smended, the Silver Star is awarded to following maned individuals:

Staff Sergeant Jack P. Wilburn, 20831949, Infantry, Company "C", 410th Infantry Regiment. For gallantry in action. On 23 April 1945 after two plateons had entered Bohringen, Cermany, the third plateon was subjected to heavy small arms and machine gun fire from the edge of town. Although wounded, Sergeant Wilburn opened fire with his sub-machine gun and knocked out one enemy machine gun. Lying on the ground, he urged his squad to continue and directed its attack on two other machine gun nests, succeedfully neutralizing them. His actions which prevented the enemy from attacking the rear of the company reflected the highest traditions of the military service. Residence: Adh, Oklahoma.

Technical Sergeant James T. Alson, 36552191, (then Sergeant), Infantry, Headquarters Company, Second Battalion, 411th Infantry Regiment. For gallantry in action. On 10 December 1944 near Gundersheis, France, Sergeant Tilcon and his squad went forward with attacking elements to lay nines. Then artillery, mortar and sniper fire were directed upon the crossroods where the mines were to be laid, he had his men dig in. Disregarding the enemy fire, he, alone, proceeded to lay the pattern of mines and returning to the equal placed two bezooks teams to cover the crossroods. Forced to remain in their positions for 12 hours because of enemy fire, they later assisted in the capture of six enemy snipers. His actions reflected the highest traditions of the military service. Residence: Dearborn, Michigan.

SEDIND LIBUTEMANT B. PELTON BIGHT, 02005992, (then Private First Class), Infantry, Company "G", 411th Infantry Regiment. For gallantry in action. On IC January 1945, the First Platoon, Company "G", 411th Infantry, spearheading the attack on Octingen, France, was suddenly subjected to intense enemy artillery, smehine gas and small arms fire. Arming himself with a bascoka, LIENTENATT "RICHT rese to a standing position and disregarding the intense fire, coelly fired five rounds into the enemy ampladements reducing the enemy fire sufficiently to enable most of his platoon to withdraw. His bascoka ammunition exhausted, LIENTENATT "RICHT continued firing with his carbine until the entire platoon withdraw to safety. Only then did he withdraw to join his company. LIENTENANT "RICHT's actions reflected the highest traditions of the military service. Residence: Austin, Texas.

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Technician Fifth Grade Everett R. Marihugh, 36412676, Medical Department, Medical Detachment, 411th Infantry Regiment. For gallantry in action. (n 1 March 1945, in the vicinity of Schillerscorf, France, Company "H", 411th Infantry, came under an intense enemy shelling. Technician Marihugh, aid man, standing in an open courtyard was injured severely along with several other soldiers. Notwithstanding his bwn wounds, Technician Marihugh rushed to one of the injured man and dragged him to cover. He ran into an adjacent building for his aid kit just as a second shell landed nearby. While working on the wounded man Technician Marihugh collapsed from the pain of his wound. His outstanding devotion to duty reflected the highest traditions of the military service. Residence: Harbor Springs, Michigan.

SECOND LIEUTENAMY RICHARD W. MEYER, COOLITSA, (then Jechnical Sergeant), Infantry, Company "F", Allth Infantry Regiment. For gallantry in action. On 21 March 1945, in the vicinity of Nieder Schlettenbach, Germany, LIEUTENANT MEYER, leading his plateen in the attack, observed the forward elements of the assault plateen pinned down by enemy fire coming from several well fortified pill boxes. Cognisant that the only means of overcoming the pill tox was by direct assault, LIEUTENANT MEYER overwhelmed two of the strongpoints amid a bail of small arms fire, forcing 37 of the enemy to surrender. Then a third pill box still effored stiff resistance LIEUTENANT NYMER quickly erganized and led a four man patrel to the rear of the fortification, forcing the 10 enemy occupants to surrender. His actions reflected the highest traditions of the military service. Residence: Chicago, Illinois.

Private Pirot Class Edward P. Hordin, Jr., 18073775, Infantry, Company "F", 410th Infantry Regiment. For gallantry in action. On 15 March 1945 near Uhrwiller, France, Company "F" was subjected to intense artillery, mortar, automatic weapons and small arms fire, suffering massrous cosmulties. Frivate H rdis on his bwn initiative carried most of the wounded through the heavy enemy fire to sefety. Returning to the platoon and finding it without leadership, he made his way to an adjacent platoon for orders. Receiving instructions, he returned, coupletely reorganized and deployed the platoon so that the company's line could be held. Although wounded during the attack, he remained until all his orders were properly executed. His actions reflected the highest traditions of the military service. Residence: University City, Missouri.

Staff Sergeant Robert S. Mizell, 18201579, (then Private First Class), Infantry, Company "L", 410th Infantry Regiment. For gallantry in action. On 22 November 1944 near Marslay, France, when two squads were pinned down by small arms and artillery fire, Sergeant Mizell ran across open terrain to inform the leader of the support small of the situation. Leading the squad in a flanking novement, he assaulted the hostile position, killing four and capturing 11 of the enemy. His actions reflected the highest traditions of the military service. Residence: Fort Worth, Texas.

Technical Sergeant Barl P. Hale, 18231629, Infantry, Company "G", Alth Infantry Regiment. For gallantry in action. On 10 January 1945 near Octingen, France, Sergeant Hele, following behind an attacking platoon, observed the men infiltrate through barbed wire entanglements to assault an enemy strongpoint. The enemy allowed them to clear the entanglements and then opened up with an

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intense barrage of mortar, machine gun and small arms fire. Realizing that withdrawal was the only solution, Sergeant Hale crawled 75 yards to the barbed wire and, completely exposed to enony fire, cut a route of escape for the trapped plateon. Sergeant Hale's actions reflected the highest traditions of the military service. Realdence: Markham, Texas.

Staff Sergeant Robert M. Crun, 12170306, Infantry, Company "K", 410th Infantry Regiment. For gallentry in action. On 23 April 1945 near Outenberg, Cornany, when enemy emiper and besocks fire forced one squad to withdraw, Sergeant Crun hald firm and protected the flank of the company by emplacing two BARs and opening fire. Immediately after the company had taken its objective and were rearganizing, it was counterattacked on the flank. Sergeant Crun, seizing one of the BARs, himself, and ordering a gunner to follow, ran through small arms and machine gun fire to put his guns into position, breaking up the attack. His actions reflected the highest traditions of the military service. Residence: New Britain, Connecticut.

Private First Class "illian R. Mright, 37475368, Infantry, Company "L", 410th Infantry Regiment. For gallantry in action. On 15 March 1945, when Company "L", 410th Infantry, attacking the enemy in Gumbrechtshoffen, France, was stopped by a blown bridge which was covered by artillery fire, Private Wright secured several beards and planks from nearby wreeings and constructed a footbridge. Although now subjected to small arms fire from the enemy near the opposite bank, he completed the bridge and then led the assault across the river. Friwate Tright's actions reflected the highest traditions of the military service. Residence: Burwell, Mebraska.

FIRST LIBITEMANT JAYES V. LAURO, 01691704, (then SECOND LIBITEMANT), Chamical arfare Service, Headquarters and Headquarters Company, (then Company "D"), 83d Chemical Mertar Battalion. For gallantry in action. On 16 October 1944, near Jussarupt, France, when a call was received for a forward observer from advanced infantry elements, LIENTEWAY LAURO made his way forward in the face of enemy 170 millimeter and norter fire. Upon reaching the infantry observation post, the enemy simultaneously launched a counterattack supported by tanks and self-propelled weapons. Berrowing a radio, he crewled several hundred yards to an isolated company under heavy enemy fire and directed mortar fire to within 200 yards of his own position. Neavy pressure forced the withdrawal of infantry units and he again exposed himself to bring direct fire upon the enemy, knocking out one tank and forcing two others to withdraw. His actions reflected the highest traditions of the military service. Residence; Ocone park, New York.

Private Piret Class Edwin A. Brown, 20756529, Infantry, Company "D", 410th Infantry Regiment. For gallantry in action. On 17 January 1945 near Sessenheim, France, when enemy tank fire disorganized his heavy machine gun squad and killed his squad leader, Frivate Brown, despite the intense fire, thok command and reorganized the squad. Observing a hostile counterattack, he assisted in setting up his machine gun and directed accurate fire into the enemy. Although wounded in the hand by shrapped, he remained at his gun for three hours until riflemen successfully drove the enemy back. Fix actions reflected the highest traditions of the military service. Residence: Mariana, Arkangas.

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FIRST LIEUTEMENT VERNON E. DAVIS, 01323670, Infantry, Company "E", 410th Infantry Regiment. For gallantry in action. On 23 April 1945, LIEUTEMENT DAVIS leading a small group fought his way into Erkenbrechtswiller, Germany, after a rifle company had been surrounded there. Refusing a demand of surrounder he exposed himself to enemy fire placing his men in strategic positions. Locating the area in which the enemy was forming for the attack he disregarded mortar and artillery fire and ran to the artillery observer pointing out the exact location of the attacking enemy. The resultant artillery fire aided in breaking up the attack. His actions reflected the highest traditions of the military service. Residence: Rogana, Kentucky.

Technician Fifth Grade Wesley J. Brockhouse, 36716268, Field Artillery, Headquarters Battery, 382d Field Artillery Battalion. For gallantry in action. On 23 April 1945, while delivering fire missions on machine gun positions in Erkenbrechtsweiler, Germany, enemy pressure forced the entire observation post group to take cover. Although machine gun fire forced him to the ground and mortar shells dropped nearby, Technician Brockhouse remained exposed operating his radio. His actions which enabled our artillery to silonce the machine gun emplacements reflected the highest traditions of the military service. Residence: Oak Park, Illinois.

FIRST LIEUTEMANT BONN RUOTCLO, 054.7923, Field Artillery, Battery "B", 928th Field Artillery Battalion. For gallantry in action. On 23 April 1945; near Homau, Germany, when the advance of the Third Battalion, 41th Infantry, was halted by enemy small arms, sniper and machine gan fire, LIEUTENANT RUOTCLO crawled forward 150 yards to a position from which to direct artillery fire into the enemy positions. Remaining exposed and disregarding the enemy fire, he directed accurate fire forcing the enemy to withdraw. His actions which permitted the battalion to continue its advance reflected the highest traditions of the military service. Residence: Newark, New Jersey.

Sergeant Anthony W. Hagland, 32698443, Field Artillery, Company "B", 824th Tank Destroyer Battalion. For gallantry in action. On 4 April 1945, in the vicinity of Unter Bisenheim, Germany, Sergeant Hagland using his tank destroyer to draw enough fire in order to ascertain the source for advancing infantry elements moved his vehicle into the open, immediately drawing a barrage of enemy mechine gun and self-propelled weepon fire. Tithout hesitation he opened fire with his 76 millimeter gun and fired 11 rounds directly into the enemy strongpoint. Investigation showed that Sergeant Hagland had destroyed three enemy machine gun nexts and had crippled a self-propelled gun. His actions reflected the highest traditions of the military service. Residence: Brooklym, New York.

FIRST LIEUTEMANT DONALD E. PAULSON, 0545592, (then SECOND LIEUTENANT), Infantry, Company "I", 410th Infantry Regiment. For gallantry in action. On 6 January 1945, given the mission of taking prisoners near Kerbach, France, LIEUTEMANT PAULSON led his plateon to within 300 yards of the enemy. Then leading his assault group forward, he deployed his men, caught the enemy by surprise and neutralized a hestile automatic weapon. By careful naneuvering during a 30 minute fire fight, LIEUTEMANT PAULSON and his men captured several

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of the enemy, inflicted numerous easyalties and safely withdrew under the fire of his covering force. His actions reflected the highest traditions of the military service. Residence: Sleepy Eye, Minnesotte.

private First Class Estel D. Combs, 37250409, Infantry, Company "N", 411th Infantry Regiment. For gallantry in action. On 14 December 1944, near Pfaff-enbronn, France, after a temperary motor pool had been established near a road block, the enemy attacked under cover of darkness. Frivate Crobs, disregarding small arms and machine gun fire, secured a bazocka and moved forward toward the enemy. Spotting a mazzle flash from an enemy machine gun, he fired his bazocka into the emplacement, killing one of the enemy crew and forcing the remainder to withdraw. Pursuing the enemy, he personally captured four of them. Frivate Combs' actions reflected the highest traditions of the military service.

Residence: Linthium Heights, Maryland. Next of kin: Mrs. Buby S. Tise, (Mother), 309 "Y. Greenwood Ecod, Linthium Heights, Maryland.

Private First Class Sammy P. Schinglione, 36550042, Medical Department, Medical Detacment, Allth Infantry Regiment. For gallantry in action. On 10 January 1945, in the vicinity of Porbach, France, attacking elements came under a terrific barrage of enemy machine gun, morter and small arms fire inflicting severe canalities. Private Schinglione, aid man, with complete disregard for his own safety ruched into the fire-swept terrain to administer first aid to the wounded. Completely oblivious of the intense fire that raked the area he coolly and efficiently tended the wounded men until he fell mortally wounded.
