AWARD OF BRONZE STAR MEDAL

Under the provisions of Army Regulations 600-45, 22 September 1943, as smended, the Bronze Star Medal is smarded following named individuals:

Technician Fourth Grade John F. Duche, 37246756, Field Artillery, Battery "B", 383d Field Artillery Battalion. For heroic schievement in action. On 23 April 1945 in Erkenbruchtsweller, Germany, Technician Buche, radio operator with a forward observer party, advanced through enemy lines after operating his radio from an exposed position. When two infantry companies were cut off from the battalion Technician Buche made his way under artillery and small arms fire to an exposed position and assisted in directing friendly fire which broke up the enemy counterattack, enabling the infantry to resume the attack. His actions reflected the highest traditions of the military service. Residence:

Sergeant Edward G. Sears, 36713986, Field Artillery, Headquarters Battery, 383d Field Artillery Battalion. For heroic achievement in action. On 25 January 1945 near Schillersdorf, France, when heavy enemy pressure forced an infantry command post to withdraw, Sergeant Sears and his section were cut off. He reorganized his section and continued to fight the enemy. After one of the men was wounded and many attempts to reach him were halted by intense enemy fire and further attempts would have endangered his section, Sergeant Sears led the remainder of his men to safety. His actions reflected the highest traditions of the military service. Residence: Benton, Illinois.

Staff Sergeent Orville W. Haberman, 37543630, Field Artillery, Battery "B", 383d Field Artillery Sattalion. For heroic achievement in action. On 23 April 1945 near Entembrechtsweiler, Germany, Serge ant Haberman, forward observer, advanced through enemy lines to direct artillery fire. When two infantry companie were out off from the Battalion, Sergeant Haberman made his way under artillery and small arms fire to an exposed position from which he directed friendly fire which broke up an enemy counterattack enabling the infantry to resume the attack. His actions reflected the highest traditions of the military service. Residence: Owstonna, Minnesott.

Private First Class Robert 0. Parks, 32945052, Infantry, Company "E", 410th Infantry Regiment. For heroism in action. On 22 April 1945, in the vicinity of Erkonbrechtsweiler, Germany, Private Parks, machine gunner, was given the mission of supporting attacking riflamon in clearing the town of Erkonbrechtsweiler. In the house to house fight that onsued, Private Parks, cognizant that he could give no aid from a covered position, ran into the streets of the town and fired his machine gun from the rip into the hostile emplacements. Private Parks' actions reflected the highest traditions of the military service. Seeidence: Potedam, New York.

Private First Class Milton Martin, 32878963, Infantry, Company "E", Allth Infantry Regiment. For heroism in action. On 16 November 1944, near is Bolls, France, when a platoon had crossed a stream to secure a bridgehead, Private Martin noticed his wounded platoon leader lying in an exposed position. Disre-

garding the enemy fire, he carried the wounded man to safety and administered first aid. Unable to find litter bearers, he continued on with the platoon leader until he reached the Battalian Aid Station. His actions reflected the highest traditions of the military service. Houldones: Brooklyn, New York.

Private First Class Hareld G. Kemp, 37326984, Infantry, Hoadquarters Conpany, Third Battalian, Allth Infantry Regiment. For hereism in action. On the might of 13 February 1945, while two plateons were raiding Nieffern, France, Private Kemp was assigned the mission to guard the only bridge across a stream so the raiding party could return. As he was an guard the enemy fired a concentrated mortar barrage and machine gun fire on the bridge, making him leap into the icy water for protection. While in the water Private Kemp repulsed two enemy attempts to take the bridge on which the raiding party safely withdrew. His actions reflected the highest traditions of the military service. Residence: Menanga, Mirmasota.

Private First Class Walter J. Kahut, 39343409, Infantry, Company "1", 41th Infantry Regiment. For heroic achievement in action. On 19 January 1945 near Sessenhein, France, when heavy enemy pressure forced his plateon to withdraw, Private Kahut observed a comrade lying wounded in an exposed position. Despite continuous machine gun, sniper and mortar fire, he made his way to the casualty and succeeded in dragging him to safety where he administered first aid. His actions were in accordance with the highest traditions of the military service. Residence; Woodburn, Oregon.

FIRST LIEUTEMANT ALBERT A. EAGLER, CA30232, Infantry, Company "L", Allth Infantry Regiment. For heroic achievement in action. On 19 January 1945, near Sessembeim, France, when enemy machine gum fire and a heavy mortar barrage forced his plateon to withdraw, LIEUTHANT EAGLER went to the aid of a wounded man. Disregarding the enemy fire he dragged the wounded man over 500 yards of open terrain to safety and then made a dash to secure litter bearers. His actions which enabled the wounded man to be given immediate medical attention reflected the highest traditions of the military service. Residence: Hazelton, Pennsylvants.

SECOND LIEUTENANT MOSE L. HUSKEY, 02007019 (then Staff Sergeant), Infantry, Company "G", 410th Infantry Regiment. For heroism in action. On 30 November 1984 near Nothelten, France, when part of his plateen and an attached machine gun section were cut off from the company by small arms fire, IMENTENANT HUSKEY voluntarily advanced through the hostile fire to his man. Observing numerous casualties, he organized three litter teams and evacuated seven wounded men. Guiding the new to the company, he then returned for the machine gun section and led it to the rifle plateons. His actions reflected the highest traditions of the military service. Residence: Wyandotte, Michigan.

Private Piret Class Loyd Kostreva, 36288448, Infantry, Company "L", 411th Infantry Regiment. For heroic achievement in action. On 19 January 1945 near Sessenhein, France, Company "L", 411th Infantry, was subjected to enany automatic wespens, sniper and morter fire, suffering many casualties. Private Kostreva, seeing a wounded man lying in an exposed position, disregarded the enemy fire and rem to the casualty's side and after four hours succeeded in dragging him to safety. His actions reflected the highest traditions of the military service. Residence: Pound, Wisconsin.

Technicien Fifth Grade Charles R. Hess, 39287025, Medical Department, Medical Detachment, 411th Infentry Regiment. For heroic achievement in action. On

field to evacuate the wounded. Realizing that to prevent additional casualties the field should be marked he entered the mined area and marked a route. When a company was forced to withdraw he remained and guided the men along the cleared route. His actions reflected the highest traditions of the military service. Residence: Arcadia, California.

Sergeant Robert A. Hussey, 35788997, Field Artillery, Battery "C", 383d Field Artillery Bettalion. For heroic achievament in action. On 16 March 1945 near Cundershoffen, France, when the forward observer was pinned down by small areas and artillery fire, Sergeant Hussey advanced over 800 yards of fire-swept terrain with his radio. As a result of his action, communication was established and artillery fire was directed upon the enemy inflicting heavy casuallished and artillery fire was directed upon the enemy inflicting heavy casuallies. His actions reflected the highest traditions of the military service. Residence: Smbins, Ohio.

Staff Sergeant Paul T. Devemport, 20655375, Field Artillery, Battery "C", 383d Field Artillery Bettalion. For heroic achievement in action. On 24 January 1945 near threatler, France, when the enemy laid down an artillery barrage preparatory to an attack the direct line from the CP to the Fire Direction Conter was broken. Sargeant Davemport on his can initiative and disregarding the enemy fire traced the line and repaired the break, actabilishing communications and enabling effective artillery fire to be directed into the enemy positions. His actions reflected the highest traditions of the military service. Encidence Nadison, Misconsin.

Private First Class Grover C. Black, Jr., 34,922132, Infantry, Company "D", 411th Infantry Regiment. For heroic schievament in action. On 16 March 1945 ness Gundershoffen, France, when a mortar and artillery barrage wounded Private Black and several of his comrades, he administered aid to all the casualties. Not until he was certain that all the wounded were cared for did he submit to evacuation himself. His actions reflected the highest traditions of the military service. Residence: Lylo, Tennessee.

Sergeant Edward S. Paxton, 36625112, Infantry, Headquarters Company, Second Battalion, 411th Infantry Regiment. For heroic achievement in action. On 15 March 1945 near Bothbach, France, when intense artillery, morter and small arms fire inflicted many casualties upon attacking troops, Sergeant Paxton volunteers to assist in the evacuation of the wounded. Disregarding the enemy fire, he guited his men over mined areas and successfully evacuated the casualties. His actions reflected the highest traditions of the military service. Residence; Chicago, Illinois.

Private First Class Peter J. Yamsek, 35068197, Infentry, Headquarters Company, Second Esttalien, Allth Infentry Regiment. For heroic achievement in action. On 15 March 1945 near Hothbach, France, when artillery, mortar and small arms fire inflicted heavy essualties upon our troops and the attached modical personnel were wounded, Private Yamsek volunteered to aid and evacuate the wounded. Despite the enough fire he crewled forward through a mine field to reach the side of a seriously wounded man. After administering first aid he assisted in the evacuation of the casualty. Private Yamsek's actions reflected the highest traditions of the military service. Residence: Warren, Chic.

Staff Sorgeant LeRey E. Ham, 34,575120, Cavalry, 103d Reconnaissance froop. For heroic achievement in action. On 21 April 1945 near Hegenlobe, Commany, when infantry units were pinned down by small arms and bazooka fire, Sergeant Ham drove his thinly armored vehicle forward in the face of the enemy fire.

Private First Class Lewrence E. Schustte, 35248860, Infantry, Company "H", Allth Infantry Regiment. For horoism in action. On 12 Documber 1964 near Woorth, France, when an artillery barrage pinned down a rifle company and severed a communications line, Private Schwette voluntarily crawled along the line to repair the break. Pinding that communications could not be reestablished he exposed himself to the enemy fire and relayed arm and hand signals from the plateen leader to the mertars. His actions enabled fire to be directed upon the enemy emplocements, completely neutralizing them, and reflected the highest traditions of the military corvice. Residences Napoleon, Chic.

KIRST LIEUTEMANT BORERT E. SCHUEIKE, 0545599, Infantry, Company "E", (then Company "C"), Allth Infantry Regiment. For heroic achievement in action. On 21 March 1945, near Bobenthal, Cormany, when Company "G", 411th Infantry was pinned down by machine gum fire and subjected to an artillery barrage, LIEU-TENANT SCHUELEE moved forward to chook the situation. While moving forward he was wounded in the arm and chest but continued on to contact the company commands When the order was given to withdraw LIEUTEMANT SCHUEIXE remained and assisted in supervising the withdrawal and the setting up of defensive positions. His actions reflected the highest traditions of the military service. Recidence: Groton, South Dakota.

Staff Sorgeant Edwin Wagner, 37326470 (tiden Sorgeant), Infantry, Company "M", Allth Infantry Regiment. For horoic achievement in action. On 25 April 1945, whon a quartering party, enroute to a enptured town, approached Bornstadt, Germany, it was discovered to still be in enery hands. Surgeant Wagner organized the quartering party and led the men into the town. Advancing shead of the colum, he demended surrender. Although 12 of the enemy surrendered, Sergeant Wagner ordered the town patrolled. Again advancing down the street, he demanded the surrender of the town, resulting in the taking of 120 prisoners. Sergeant Wagner's actions reflected the highest traditions of the military service. Residen es: -Nercer, North Dakota,

Staff Sergeant Hoyle H. Davis, 36856820, Infantry, Company "L", 411th Infantry Regiment. For heroism in action. On 15 March 1945, Company "L", 411th Infantry was clearing the enemy from Muhlhausen, France, when fire from an enemy machine gun killed and wounded several men. As the patrol reached a covered position to return the fire, Technician Formitz observed two medical sid men attached to the patrol pinned down in an exposed position about 200 yards to the rear. Without hesitation Technician Horwitz selzed a machine gun, ran the 200 yards to the position of the aid men and began spraying the enemy with fire. His daring and accuracy succeeded in destroying the enemy emplacement and allowed the aid men to rejoin the patrol unscathed. Technician Horwitz's outstanding valor reflected the highest traditions of the military service. Residence: Milwaukee, Misconsin.

FIRST LIEUTEMANT WILLIAM J. KASPER, 01314921, Infantry, Company "E", 411th Infantry Regiment. For heroism in action. On 16 November 1944, during the attack on La Bolle, France, LIEUTEMANT KASPER's platoon was subjected to direct artiller; fire from well-canouflaged enemy strongholds. LIEUTEMANT KASPER quickly deployed his men and continued on to ascertain the exact enemy positions. After a fire-fight in which four of the enemy were killed, LIEUTEMANT KASPER gained control of a house and called the platoon forward. Missing one man, he went out to locate him and found him in a shell-shocked condition. Thile carrying him to cover, he noticed a fire started by tracers in the rear of the building occupied by his men and evacuated them. LIEUTEMANT KASPER's actions reflected the highest traditions of the military service. Residence: New Bedford, Massachusetts.

Technician Third Grade Russell N. Gunderson, 17169803, Medical Department, Medical Detachment, 411th Infahrry Regiment. For heroic achievement in action. On 15 December 1944, near Climbach, France, when an extremely heavy enemy artillery and mortar burgage hit their area, Technician Cunderson, on his own volition, administered first aid and assisted the wounded to a defiladed position where the were evacuated. His actions which saved the lives of eleven contacts reflected the highest traditions of the military service. Residence: Burbank, South Dakote

Technical Sorgant Cordon E. Smith, 16MA109, (then Staff Sorgant), Infantry, Company *A*, Allth Infantry Regiment. For heroic achievement in action. On 15 earch 1945 near Mihlhousen, France, Sergeant Smith's plateon was pinned down by intense enemy automatic and small arms fire and his BaR man was seriously wounded. Then a medical aid man was not available, Sergeant Smith, disregarding the enemy fire, made his way to the casualty and administered first aid. His actions reflected the highest traditions of the military service. Residence: Maywood, Illinois.

FIRST LIMITEMANT LEGIEN P. GRECYNE, 01302868, Infantry, Company "M", 410th Infantry Regiment. For horoic achi evement in action. On 25 November 1944 durin an attack on Lasse, France, LIMITEMANT CHRONNE was leading his machine gun secti in support of a rifle company against determined energy resistance when he observe a plateon of an adjacent company pinned down by intense hostile fire. Desking to each machine gun, he ordered two of the squads to direct their fire in support of the pinned down plateon. He then shouted instructions for the plateon leader to withdraw his men. LINITEMANT CROONE's actions reflected the highest traditions of the military service. Residence: Forchstoula, Louisiana.

V - ATMRD, POSTRUCTS, OF BROKES STAR MCDAL. Under the provisions of Army Regulations 600-45, 22 September 1943, as amended, the Brokes Star Medal is swarded, posthunously, to following maned individual:

Technician Fifth Grade John H. Seay, 38/16691, Field Artillery, Battery "A". 928th Field Artillery Esttalion. For heroic achievement in action. On 2 December 1944 near Epfig, France, artillery fire held up a party on recommaissance for bettery positions. Technician Seay, radio operator, diregarding the expleding artillery shells, remained in an exposed position, asintaining communications with the tattalion. Technician Seay remained at his post until he was mortally wounded by an artillery burst. His actions reflected the highest traditions of the minitary service. Residence: Bryan, Texas. Next of kin: Mrs. John H. Seay, ("ife), 400 South Maswell Drive, Bryan, Texas.

VI -- A WRD OF BRONZE STAR MEDAL, REVOCATION. So much of Section III, General Orders 145, this Headquarters, dated 25 May 1945, as pertains to award of Bronze Star Medal to Sergeant Warl W. Brownell, 36231158, Armored, Company WHM, 781st Tank Battilion, is revoked.

VII - A WRD OF HERPLE HEART, REVOCATION. So much of Ceneral Order No. 72, this Headquarters, dated 27 February 1945, as pertains to sward of Purple Heart to Technician Fourth Grade Faul 7. Campbell, 14188410, Service Company, 410th Infantry Regiment, is revoked.
