# NAVATIVE ACCOUNT OF BASTALL IN OPERATIONS HEATH OF JANUAR 1945

At the beginning of the year the CPs of the Battalian were located as follows: Battalian CF - MATERIONS, France (9685 440), "A" Company CF - MUDWALLER, Germany (9277 655), "B" Company CF - MAI REDEF, France (6687 571), "C" Company CP - MCHENESIG, France (9710 462), Rear Echelon - SCHOOL, France (9706 400).

On the last day of 1964, while "A" Company was with the 106th Cavelry Group at 1996/114 R, Germeny, the number one can of the 3rd plateon commended by Sgt Mc Intosh was fired upon by enemy 88mm direct fire. A shell struck the squad's half-track, disabling the vehicle and billing the graner and half-track driver. Endangered by enemy infantry and forced to withdraw, the sun crew put the sun out of action before shandoning it.

Ol January. The Pattalian minus "A" Commany continued op retions under the 100th Infantry Division. "A" Company was attached to the 106th Cavelry Group. The 3rd platoon as a result of enemy action, was placed in temporary reserve in the vicinity of 50 AVOLD. The lat and End-platoons recommittered for indirect fire positions. In "" to sary, the lat platoon revolutions North of white OH, France (4666 900). The 3rd platoon received enemy artillary fire. Indeed of "C" Company at the mailroad crossing in 4 5 100, whose the driver, a sentence of a security squad, was killed and the vehicle completely destroyed.

"O" Commany reconnoitemed for positions for possile furture occupation, to provide support and depth to "E" Company's positions.

CP Journey. The enemy offensive action of previous day having frought them up to positions in wichdity of Balant HAL, about 2 to 3 killowaters from AURIT, constituted a threat to our rear installation. The situation warranted immediate withdrawal and at CPCO hours OF January the installation cleared WARM in its displacement to new quarters in FURBAUT. The placement tooms of TAT Company had displaced removerd, I see of lat plateon and the Ind plateon took up positions for indirect fire. The subsequent period was characterized by relative inactivity with generally few charges for TAT and TOT Companies.

3 January. The 3rd pistoon of the Somman moved into indirect fire positions. Oue to enemy threat the 2nd platern was forced to displace to a new position. The CH and all platerns of """ Common sustained heavy satisfier. One community resulted from this action.

MATZWILLIAR, France (4637 395) on 04 January. This was in keeping with change of division boundaries when the 36th Division took over part of the sector.

From the 5th of January to the 10th of January, "A" Company fixed herassing and interdictory fire missions expending a total of 1500 rounds of HE on these missions. "U" Company, 1st and 3rd platoons received intermittent artillery fire with the 2nd platoon weathering intensive more tar and artillery fire. Three quarter-tons were disabled from this enemy action.

Ob Jamuary. The 2nd and 3rd platoons of "B" Company again received herasting enemy mortar fire.

O7 January. The Division Artillery called upon "B" Company to fire a mission of illuminating shells over FREUDENBERG FARMS (9750 513) which were part of the Maginot defenses. The success of this mission was marked by a call of TUT fire by the forward observer.

OS Jamuary. The 2nd platoon of "P" Company suffered two casualties from enemy direct fire. The 3rd platoon fired 48 rounds of APC, hit and knocked out one tank. One casualty was sustained as a result of enemy fire, which was also responsible for knocking out one three inch gum. Düring the morning the withdrawal of friendly treops from the vicinity of 2nd section of the 2nd platoon forced the abandonment of the two gums, which were later retrieved.

O9 January. The 2nd platoon of "B" Company fired on two enemy half-tracks and knocked them out. An undetermined number of enemy personnel were in the vehicle. All platoons of "B" Company were under intensive mortar and artillary fire. The guns that were abandoned on OS January by "B" Company, now 300 yards forward of the front lines, were extricated during the hours of darkness and aided by blowing snow. The danger involved in retrieving guns resulted in awards of Bronse stere to personnel responsible. (See Azmex E).

10 January. The 2nd platoon of "B" Company moved out of GUISING, France (9657 528) and took up new AT defense positions in vicinity (9655 508). The 3rd platoon moved into positions of readiness in the vicinity of RCHRHACH, France. The company CP moved to RIBING, France (9646 488). "C" Company's lat section of the lat platoon moved into AT defense positions Northwest of SIERSHHAL (9716 495). The Battalian GP elected out of MATZHELLLER, France and opened DIEMPRINCEN, France (9600 365).

11 January. "A" Company was released from the 105th Cavalry Group and attached to the 14th Division to operate under the 775th Tank Destroyer Battalion. "A" Company relieved "B" Company of the 614th Tank Destroyer Battalion. The company CP opened at SARREGUENINES. Platoens were exroste to new positions.

12 January. All guns of "A" Company had occupied AT defence positions.
"B" and "C" Companies maintained and improved their positions.

13 January. "A" Company CF moved to SARRINGHING. The 3rd platoon occupied direct fire positions at CMCS REDERCHING (Q522 424) to cover likely tank threat approaches. "P" Company, let and 2nd platoons received energy rocket and artillary fire, including air bursts.

15 January. The number 2 gum of the 3rd platoon of "A" Company prepared to move under cover of darkness to direct fire positions which were prepared by Division Engineers (C612 539). In preparation for this undertaking the gum commender, part of the crew, and a detail from the planear platoon platoon of the 776th Tank Destroyer Battalian enroute to afteresentioned position to make further improvement prior to escupation, ran into an unguarded minefield. The vehicle struck a mine and drew friendly fire. The incident resulted in three casualties. The number 2 gum, 3rd platoon of "B" Company moved into alternate position to perform illuminating shell fire mission on call from 100th Division Artillery.

16 January. The third platoons of "A" and "B" Companies were alerted for possible energy thrust and attack at GROS REDERCHING, the probable energy chiestive (based on PW reports). At this time the Rettalion started plans for training men on SPs with the 776th Tank Destroyer Battalion.

17 Jamery. The lat gum of the 2nd platoon of "A" Company took up new AT defense position (Q537 582). One gum of the 3rd platoon fired 18 illuminating shells during the night.

- 16 James, The number 2 gum of the 3rd plateon of "B" Company moved into ry indirect fire position (9631 471) and registered in on base point (96586, 5542) accoring 5 hits cut 12 and routed the enemy cut of house counting possible communities. The first plateon was under heavy artillery fire during the period.
- 19 James, Is conformance with chift of Division boundaries to the East, "B" Company reconncitered for new positions in vicinity of South and East of SIERSTHAL (Q717 494), ENCHENDERG (Q710 460) and LAMBACH (Q725 485). Company "C" reconncitered for new positions in the visinity of HOLBACH (Q725 510) and KLEINERHL (Q700 528).
- 20 January. "A" Geopany moved a gum from Q527 583) to vicinity of BINING (Q662 491) to perform indirect fire missions. "B" and "C" Companies prepared new positions for ecompation. The 3rd platoon of "B" Company moved into indirect fire positions (Q660 480) establishing its own FDG and providing general support to Division Artillery.
- 21 Jemmary. The ecompation of new AT defense positions by "B" and "C" Companies was completed and improvements begun. "B" Company's 3rd platoon was surveyed in by Division Artillery and the guns registered in. "A" Company in LAth Division sector performed unabserved harmoning and interdistory fire missions with one gun from 2nd and 3rd platoons. For the period of

- 21 29 January these two guns fired nightly missions in support of AAAA Division Artillery with a total expenditure of 1068 rounds HE, 28 rounds of anoise and one illuminating shell.
- 22 January. At the request of the 397th Infantry, the number 3 gam of the 2nd plateon was moved under cover of darkness to a position from which direct fire could be brought to bear on enemy position at RETERSWILLER (44.90 760). After firing 18 rounds of HE at an enemy OP and other probable enemy concentration points, the gun was hastily withdream under a hail of enemy mortar fire. The 3rd plateon of "R" Company, now in support of the 100th Division Artillary, performed indirect haracsing night fire missions which were to continue until 12 March prior to the 100th Division offensive action against Germany.
- 23 January. The day was a relatively inactive one for all plateons not engaged in indirect fire missions. The 2nd plateon of "B" Company sustained heavy energy mortar and artillary fire.
- 24 January. The number 2 gun of the 2nd platoon, "A" Company was attached to the 156th FA for operations and moved cut of indirect fire positions at BINING (0644 487) to 0633 498). Positions remained static with the 2nd platoon of "B" Company again receiving heavy enemy artillary and mortar fire.
- 25 28 January. Two gums of PA" Company and the 3rd platoon of "B" Company engaged in night interdictory and harassing fire missions. There were no changes in dispositions and missions of all Battalion elements in this period.
- 29 Jamery. On verbal order from the Commanding General of the IV Corps, confirmed by the 5th Tank Destroyer Group, "A" Company was released from attachment to the 776th Tank Destroyer Battalian. "A" Company coved out of positions to take up now AT defense on the 100th Infantry Division right flank, relieving "B" Company of the 65kth Tank Destroyer Battalian (attached to 100th Inf Div) under cover of darkness. Positions were taken up in vis North and East of Lemberg, France in the vicinity of GOLTZENERUCK, SARREINS—REEG, Southeast and East of ALISENHAL and SOUCHT, France. "A" Company CP was established at S. 10003 (9724 431).
- 30 January. Occupation of AT defense positions on Division right flank and relief of 654th Tank Destroyer Battalian was completed with the assistance of lat Recommaissance platoon. And and 3rd platoens of "C" Company received light enemy artillery fire resulting in damage to one quarter—ton vehicle.

The last day of January found all compenies disposed along the 100th Infantry Division from maintaining AT defense positions at likely avenues of approach for enemy armor. The compenies continued to improve their gum positions. The 3rd plateon of "B" Company fired indirect fire harassing missions throughout the day, expending a total of 400 rounds of RE.

Recumelacence plateons attached to companies provided invaluable support to companies. Among the activities were the assuing of OPs, recommendating recess of ingress to gum positions and elearing suspected roads of mines. Ouring encertails. Regard in constant road recommissance of all routes of ingress and agrees to positions. Maintained active liaison with all front line friendly elements and adjacent units on Division flanks. Acted as read guides during movement of gums, recommendated for alternate positions in compliance with Divisional eviers and assisted gum orans with use of demplitions in the emosystion and preparation of gum positions.

During the month "A" and "B" Genpanies Lant effective support to the 105th Gevalry Group and 44th Division and 100th Industry Division respectively in indirect fire harassing interdictory missions and illuminating shell missions with a total expenditure of 4,624 rounds of HE and 89 rounds of illuminating shells. Five PWs taken during the month.

The Battalion has coordinated the AT defences of the division. This included lieseen between the regimental AT officers, keeping a situation map of AT defences in the division and acting as an advisor to the Commanding General on AT defences and making recommendations for employment of gums.

For heroic achievement in action on 8 January 1945, in the vicinity of Guining, France. When an enemy attack pushed back our line of infantry, crews of two tank destroyers were forced to withdraw, abandoning their weapons which were frozen into position. On the following night these men, under the leadership of Sergeant Ready, advanced three hundred yards in front of our lines and, despite energy infantry and tanks emplaced on high ground covering the area, succeeded in extricating the frozen weapons and withdrawing them to safety, thus salvaging valuable equipment at great risk to their own lives.

FREE FICK W 0100NHOR, 32692307, Sergeant, 824th Tank Pestroyer Bettalion, for heroic achievement in action on 8 January 1945, in the vicinity of Rimling, France. When extreme enemy pressure forced back our line and exposed the left flank of his position during a hostile counterattack, Sergeant O'Connor, in command of anti-tank gun crew, refused to withdraw, and by his determination and personal courage inspired his men to maintain their position. As a result of his action, our lines were restrored to their former positions and two enemy personnel carriers attempting an enveloping movement were put out of action. Entered military service from Jamaica, New York.
