FAIR AND ACCURATE ACCOUNT OF BATTALION OPERATIONS.
THE BATTALION HISTORY

The Battalion history from May 11th to May 31st covers the post-hostilities period of policing and occupying established areas in Austria.

On May 11th the Battalion was performing such duties in the area, with disposition as follows: "A" Company was located at AILZ (A1 26) with the 1st Reconnaissance Platoon attached. "B" Company was at GRASSENFELD (R24 61) with the 3rd Reconnaissance Platoon attached. "C" Company was at STAMS (R45 58) minus the 1st Platoon which was attached to Reconnaissance Company at UNTAKONG, RIETZ (R49 59). The Battalion CP and Headquarters Company were established at KIRCH (R49 59).

Until the 17th of May the Battalion was engaged with occupational duties such as, maintaining check-posts, foot and road patrols, a cage for PW's and suspected transients, liaison with adjacent units and the establishment of a military government within its assigned sector.

On the 13th of May the Battalion received verbal orders from the VI Corps that it was alerted for movement and would initiate preliminary inspections and conduct intensive maintenance operations to bring equipment into the best possible condition.

On the 17th of May the Battalion was relieved from duties within the assigned area by the 344th FA Bn, to enable swifter preparation for movement. On this date "A" Company moved to a bivouac area vicinity STAMS (R45 58). "B" Company assembled in position at GRASSENFELD and "C" Company assembled at STAMS, the 1st Platoon returning to the control. The 1st and 3rd Reconnaissance Platoons were relieved from attachment and assembled with Reconnaissance Company at UNTAKONG, RIETZ.

From 19th to 21st May the 85th Ordnance inspected the Battalion equipment.

On the 24th and 25th of May the Line Companies conducted practice fire with 75MM guns while Reconnaissance Company practice fired its 37MM gun.

On 29 May the Battalion was alerted for movement orders from the 7th Army.

An inspection was conducted by I. C. 153rd Infantry Division on the 31st May. Battalion was rated Excellent.

Throughout this period a daily training program was maintained, other-wise and recreational periods supplemented by scheduled competitive soft-ball games and the required hours of orientation talks.

AWARDS

AWARD OF BRAVEHEART MEDAL

Technician Fifth Grade Robert Lderbroom, 42026256, Field Artillery, Company A, 824th Tank Destroyer Battalion, from 30 November 1944 to May 1 1945, in France and Germany. Residence: Syracuse, New York.

Sergeant Alexander McIntosh, 32698450, Field Artillery, Company A, 824th Tank Destroyer Battalion, from 27 November 1944 to May 1, 1945, in France, Germany and Austria. Residence: Brooklyn, New York.

Sergeant Arthur S. Weissman, 39108631, Field Artillery, Company "C", 824th Tank Destroyer Battalion. For heroic achievement in action. During the period 22 and 23 December 1944, Sergeant Weissman kept vital communications intact as his company advanced in direct support of infantry elements in the attack on Fort Regent, France. Intense enemy artillery fire constantly disrupted communications, necessitating Sergeant Weissman's going forward under fire to repair the breaks. Communications were maintained adding immeasurably to the coordination between the Tank Destroyers and the Infantry. On 14 April 1945, near Ohr Heinriet, Germany, when placed in command of a destroyer during an emergency, Sergeant Weissman responded brilliantly by displaying outstanding leadership and assisting in the repulsion of a counterattack by the enemy. Sergeant Weissman's actions reflected the highest traditions of the military service. Residence: San Francisco, California.

AWARD, POSTHUMOUS, BRAVEHEART STAR MEDAL

Corporal John F. Gordy, 31695423, Field Artillery, Company "A" 824th Tank Destroyer Battalion. For meritorious service in connection with military operations against the enemy during the period 10 April to 4 May 1945, in Germany and Austria. Residence: Brooklyn, New York. Next of kin: Mrs Mary Gordy (Mother), 4307 Greenwood Road, Brooklyn, New York.

AWARD OF BRAVEHEART

Private First Class Carl A. Knoll, 3-299504, Field Artillery, Reconnaissance Company, 824th Tank Destroyer Battalion, France 1 December 1944. Residence: Mayville, Wisconsin.
