In compliance with Section I, Administrative Bulletin Number 71, Meadquarters, Special Troops, Twelfth Army Group, dated 34 October 1944, the following report is submitted:

## ILIYARI ...

Until 28 January 1945, Meadquarters, 825th TB Battalien remained in the City of Luxembourg with only minor changes occurring which are reflected in other pertient of this report. An advance detachment departed for Namur, Belgium on 21 January to prepare for the projected move of the organization to that location. On 288900 January this Meadquarters effected the change of station. Arrived at Namur, Belgium on 281600 January 1945.

Until 28 January 1945, Meadquarters Company, 835th TD Battalien remained in the City of Incombourg with minor changes as follows:

20 January 1945 Second Section, First Ron Plateon, meved from vicinity of Longwy France to Inxembourg.

21 January 1945 First Section, First Ron Plateon, moved from Rast of Luxenbourg to Imzenbourg.

25 January 1945 First Section, First Ren Plateon, departed Luxenbourg to visinity of Manur, Belgium. (Guard Duty).

28 January 1945 Headquarters Companyneved from Luxenbourg to Manur, Jelgium.

At the beginning of the New Year Company "A" was still attached to "T" Force with it's OP located in the vicinity of Maluedy, Belgium. On 060845 January 1945 orders were received from the Commanding Officer of the \$23rd TB Battalien that the Company would occupy positions proviously occupied by elements of the 823rd TP Bm and that the change would be effected within a ferty-eight hour period. At 1790 hours the third platoon of Company "A" moved to and took up positions in the vicinity of Malmedy. Prior to this movement plateon leaders and Capt. Joseph H. Dibert, Commanding Officer, Company "A" net with the plateon leaders of the 823rd Th Ba who were already holding the positions, and a thorough recommissance was made. Centact with supporting infantry was arranged when occupation of positions was offected At 2136 heurs the third platean reported position secured and communication establish ed. On 7 January 1945 the first and second plateons took up new positions in the vicinity of Malmedy. The company OP was moved to Burneville, Belgium on 8 January 1945; this same date the first plateon reported they had fired eleven (11) rounds of HE at an enemy GP and that the fire had been effective and objective destroyed. On 10 January 1945 the Rear Rebelon was relocated at St. Jeseph's School, S Miles Me of Muy, Belgium, and was joined by the Company OP seven (7) days later. Meanwhile Captain Bibert assembled his three (3) platoens at Neis, Belgins on 16 January and its tired to a rest area on 20 January in the vicinity of Seliers, Belgium.

Activities of Company "B" were confined mainly to the movement of small detached security units (with VHF radio stations) which are shown in detail below: Headquarters of Company "B" moved from City of Luxembourg to Namar, Belgium closing into new area at 311560 January 1945.

2 January 1945 Third Squad and one half of Security Section, Second Plateen moved from Laxonbourg to vic of Beaufays, Belgium.

4 January 1945 Second Squad and one half of Security Section, First Plateon moved from vic of Tongress, Belgium to Anthoit, Belgium.

18 January 1945 First Round of Third Plateon moved from Rockrei, France to vie of Genr, Belgium.

19 January 1945 Third Squad of Third Plateon moved from Reakrol, France to Chabreaber, Belgium.

20 January 1945 Third Squad and one half of Security Section. First Plateen Meved from City of Luxembourg to vis of Longwy, France.

21 January 1945 Second Squad and one half of Security Section, Third Plateon moved from vic of Stonbe, France to vic of Fraiture, Belgium.

21 January 1945 Second and Fourth Squade, Second Plateon moved from Gity of Luxenbourg to vic of Grunenvald, East of Luxenbourg.

27 January 1945 Meadquarters Section relieved of N-20 patrol.

27 January 1945 Fourth Squad, Third Plateon relieved of Guard Daty in the vie of Sandviler, Luxenbourg.

27 January 1945

First Squad, Second Plateen moved from Signal Comer in City of Laxonbourg to Nameur, Belgium and assigned guard duty Signal Comter.

29 January 1945 Third and Fourth Squads of First Plateen moved from City of Luxenbourg to Hamur, Belgium.

29 January 1945 Assigned Guard Buty at Magle TAC Air Strip, Temploux, Belgium,

30 January 1945 Assigned Quard Buty at Magle TAS Garage in Namur, Belgium.

31 January 1945 Company "B" Neadquarters plus fourth squad, Third Flateon moved from Gity of Luxenbourg, to Namur, Belgium.

In City of Luxenbourg on 6 January 1945, Company "C" assigned four men to guard Lt. Max Brahms and Lt. Joneph Michels at 37 Rue Joseph II. These officers were plased under strict arrest by order of Lieutenant General Bradley. They were legitimate allied Officers here incognite. Under the same conditions, four men were assigned to guard Lt. Emiel Kreip at 21 Rue Geethe. These Officers were turned over to GIO Representive Smith at 061730 January 1945. Orders were received to establish security for SHARF Mission on 9 January 1945, and six (6) men of this company were detailed through was reported Seuthenst of the City of Luxenbourg. The Company was attached.

te Task Force "REED" at Montofrt, Luxenbourg for operational control. Responsibility for the Security of SHARF Mission and functions of the Mmergency Recommissance Squad were assumed by the Commanding Officers of Company "B" and Headquarters Company respectively. Captain H. Townsend Rader, Commanding Officer of Company "O" reported to the Commanding Officer of Task Force "REED" who assigned him the mission of reconneiterin andoscuping primary firing positions for the purpose of covering all probable tank approaches, road mots, valleys, etc. from the Mast and Mortheast. The plan for the reconnaissance was to reconneiter for direct firing positions for one plateen in the vicinity of Miederanven on Mighway 1; to reconneiter for direct firing positions for ene section in the vicinity of Schutrange and Munsback; to reconneiter for direct firing positions for one section in the vicinity of Sechersize and to reconneiter for direct firing positions for one plateon in the vicinity of Getrange and Gentern. A reconnalsonnce was to be also made for secondary gun positions on a line from Montfort-Syren Weiler for coverage of probable tank approaches from the East and Southeast. The two northermost platoons were to occupy firing positions immediately after recommissance and the southern most platoon to occupy indirect firing positions 1 mile east of Octrange previously prepared by Field Artillery units for the purpose of performing secondary mission of indirect fire. The first and mesond plateens of Company "O" occupied firing pesitions on 11 January 1945, the first plateen in the vicinity of Senningerberg, and the second plateon 1 mile east of Octrange, Imxembourg. At 120830 January 1945 Company Headquarters and the third plateen departed the Spiscopal Convict, Luxenbourg to establish the Company CP two miles south of Sandweillor and eccupy gun positions at Schuttrange, Luxenbourg. Captain Hader rotated his plateons throughout the remainder of the month expending a total of 1461 rounds in harassing and interdiction indirect fire missions from the position east of Ostrange, Luxembourg. The second plateen fired their first rounds into German 11 January 1945. On 27 January 1945, the first plateen Company C was moved from its indirect fire position one mile east of Ostrange, Luxembourned The third plateen moved from its implaced positions at Senningersberg, Luxembourg at 1700 hours to positions on West bank of Moselle River at Manternach, Luxembourg, The second plateon moved from its positions one wile east of Ostrange to positions occupied by the third plateon covering the main approach to the City of Luxembourg from the Bast. The first and third plateons were subjected to intermittent artillery, mertar and machine gun fire until relieved of the mission. They received an estimated 125 round of artillery and 250 rounds of Nortar fire. Company #0" was relieved of its attachment to Task Force "REED" on 31 January 1945. The platoons were moved out of their positions. under cover of darkness, and theCompany assembled in the City of Luxembourg prepared to move to Hamur, Belgium the morning of 1 February 1945.
