The 899th Tank Destroyer Battalion commanded by Lt. Colonel Maxwell A. Tincher, O20798, was originally activated at Fort Lewis, Washington, on July 1, 1940, and designated the 99th Infantry Battalion (Anti-tank). On July 24, 1941, it became the 99th Infantry Anti-tank Battalion, which on December 15, 1941, was redesignated the 899th Tank Destroyer Battalion (H) (SP).

Report of Operations - Month of January 1945

Jan. 1, 1945 - Battalion attached to 9th Inf. Div.

The Division, plus attachments continued to defend the area Nutzenich-Monschau-Hofen-Kalterherberg-Elsenborn. The Div. disposed as follows: 60th CP defending Nutzenich and vicinity; the 47th CP defending the area Monschau-Hofen-Kalterherberg; and the 39th CP defending the area South of Kalterherberg to vicinity Camp Elsenborn.

Report of Operations - Month of January 1945.

Jan. 1, 1945 - Battalion - No Change.

All units of V Corps staged local demonstrations and strong patrol activities during the day to keep reserves from going to the area of VII & XVIII A/B Corps which were attacking.

60th Inf. Regt. sent a strong patrol or pltn size into Konzen. The 47th Inf. sent a strong patrol into Menkerath. The 3rd Bn. 39th Inf. sent strong patrols toward Rohren and the 39th Inf. Regt. patrolled the area KohsMark (K946116). The patrols of the 60th Inf. Regt. ran into considerable small arms fire and were until nightfall getting out.

Co. C. 644th TD Bn. was attached to the Bn. at 1545 2000, 9th Inf. Div. The company is to remain in Div. AT reserve with one platoon to relieve one battery of the 413th AAA Bn. vicinity Mutzenich, Germany. Captain Lenox, CO, Co. C, reported for instructions and notified us that 2 of his pltns were enroute from Elsenborn, via Sourbrodt-Eupen-Mutzenich, and should arrive about 1900 hrs. The 3rd pltn was remaining in Elsenborn until relieved by a pltn from 612th TD Bn. Jan. 4, 1945. The Company (less 3rd pltn and plus one Recon. section and 1 Pioneer section) arrived in Mutzenich, Germany at 1930 hrs. The 2nd pltn relieved the battery of 413th AAA Bn., positions vicinity K910193. 1st pltn in assembly area vicinity K920197.

Co. A - No change in positions or assignments. 3rd pltn fired 57 rds HEMC and 38 rds HEBC on 3 night harassing missions.

Co. B - 1st pltn no change. 1st section, 2nd pltn, from positions vicinity K934223 fired 84 rds HEBC direct fire in support of a demonstration in Konzen by 1 platoon of the 60th Inf. Regt. 2nd section of 2nd platoon and 3rd platoon - no change in indirect fire positions, fired 97 rds HEBC and 38 rds HEBC on 5 harassing missions.

1. a. The enemy in our sector is holding positions in the Siegfried line protecting the approaches to the Roer River dams and the Rhine River.

In General, elements of the 246th Division are in position opposite our sector, reinforced with the Kampfschule from BERK, near SCHLEIDEN, and by the 164th VG Regt of the 62nd Div. The remainder of the 62nd VG Division is probably in tactical reserve in deeper positions within the enemy's defenses, while two regiments of the 246th VG Div are believed to be on the front of the Corps on our right, and not available for commitment in this sector.

Resistance is expected at ROHREN (K973177), and in the woods and on the high ground E and SE of the town. A line of pillboxes stretches from ALZEN to F001125 to WALLERSCHEID, and along the HOFEN-WALLERSCHEID road. The towns of SCHLEIDEN and GEMUND are important from a standpoint of terrain and because of the permanent defenses of the Siegfried Line, plus the community digging that the enemy has employed there. The town of DREIBORN is covered by a system of trenches that have been dug as field fortifications, and all the approaches are well covered by fortifications, because of the location of this town on commanding terrain. The pillbox line F107153 to F124203 was not occupied at last report, but could be occupied rapidly, if GEMUND and SCHLEIDEN are threatened.

The town of WOLLSEIFFEN (F073209) is also fortified, as indeed, all towns in the sector may be expected to be.

Artillery fire on main supply routes may be expected to be heavy, particularly in the Monschau Forest, where good roads are extremely limited. The rumored appearance of enemy rocket projector units opposite must be expected, in view of their probably withdrawal from the Salient, and in further view of the enemy's known intention to increase production of these weapons. The enemy is not expected to employ gas warfare, but any suspected use of chemical weapons on his part should be reported immediately.

b. V Corps atks H-Hour D-Day to seize area GEMUND - SCHLEIDEN and protect the left (north) flank of the First Army. The 9th Inf Div will attack on D+1 and seize initial objectives of ROHREN and vicinity (see overlay). The 78th Inf Div in conjunction with CCA 5th Armored Div, on the left flank of the 9th Inf Div, atks on D+1 and seizes EICHERSCHEID and on D+2 will attack and seize IMGENBROICH. The 2nd Inf Div atks on D-Day and seizes initial objectives vicinity KRINKELT in preparation for further atks NE to gain contact with the right flank of the 9th Inf Div vicinity K990130. The 99th Inf Div will atk and mop up woods between the 2nd Inf Div and the 9th Inf Div and reverting to Corps reserve.

ANNEX II - A-2 report of Operations for Month of January 1945.

The early part of the month found the enemy occupying defensive positions opposite the 9th Infantry Division. His SBN at this time was K950229 - K951201 - K952192 - K967161 - K97116 - K954094. While his intentions were not clear, it was still expected that the enemy might attack with infantry and armor to widen the base of the salient into the American lines that he had achieved during the month of December. The enemy identified on our front during the month consisted of elements of three infantry divisions, the 277th VG Division, the 246th VG Division, and at the end of the month, the 62nd VG Division appeared on our front following its withdrawal from the St. Vith sector. On one or two occasions black uniformed enemy troops appeared in the vicinity of Ingelbreich, but conjecture about the possible appearance of a Panzer or SS Division on our front did not bear fruit. No enemy tanks were encountered during the month. However, enemy track vehicles moving in the Houzen - Ingelbreich sector were reported as having been heard early in the period. Direct fire from tanks or AA guns on front line elements was reported in the same period, but none were observed, and they could possibly have been Anti-tank guns.

Known enemy losses inflicted by this battalion were as follows: three (3) HQ nests, one (1) fortified outpost, two (2) fortified houses, and one (1) CP. An unknown amount of damage to enemy material and personnel inflicted on the enemy by unobserved, indirect fire, on known enemy supply routes and installations, barracks, and gun positions.

No prisoners captured by this battalion during the period.

ANNEX III - Lessons Learned.

1. When the Tank Destroyer Company is in direct support of an Infantry Regiment, the Company Commander is enabled to coordinate the employment of his company affording the maximum of anti-tank protection and at the same time place his platoons in such positions so as to provide a base of fire (assault fire) in direct support of the infantry's advance, and also affording covering fire for the attached tank company of the Infantry Regiment.
2. By being in direct support the Company Commander becomes responsible for the close-in AT protection of the Regiment, together with Regimental AT Officer, and as such is enabled to coordinate this AT defense with adjacent regimental sectors providing the maximum of flank protection.
3. By being in direct support the Company Commander is in command of his company and can put depth in the AT defenses of the Regiment. And in the case of a large scale tank attack, can more effectively mass his company to meet the attack. When attached to an Infantry Regiment, and platoons further attached to Battalions, the Company Commander is deprived of his command functions and becomes excess baggage for everything but administrative matters. His experience and judgement are wasted.
4. When in direct support of an Infantry Battalion, the TD platoon leader becomes responsible together with the AT platoon leader for the AT defense of the battalion, and he can effectively employ his platoon according to the limitations and capabilities of the gun and terrain.
5. The M-10 is a tactical weapon and its correct tactical employment should have priority over all other considerations. The M-10 is a terrific moral factor to the Infantry and many times Infantry Commanders forget their tactical nature and put them where they can serve no tactical purpose.
6. Liaison is a must when in direct support, not only with the Company to Regiment, but also from platoons to Infantry Battalions. The liaison officer or sergeant must be able at all times to inform Regiment and Battalion Commanders where the TD's are and what they are doing; and also to advise the respective commanders as to the tactical employment of TD's. The Liaison Officer or Sergeant must have direct radio or telephone, or both, communication with his company or platoon. Liaison Officers or Sergeants must also know where his Company or Platoon Commander is at all times.

7. Radio and telephone communication with Regiments and Battalions being supported is a must, so that an alternate means of communications is available at all times. In many cases radio communication with Infantry Companies is highly desirable. For radio communication between Company and Regiment, the SCR 608 with the Company Liaison Officer is sufficient. Radio communication with the supported battalion is most

7. (Cont'd.) satisfactory with the SCR 300, borrowed from the Infantry Battalion. If radio communication with Rifle Companies is desired, the SCR 300 and SCR 536 are highly satisfactory. Wire should be laid as soon as the tactical situation permits.

8. Nothing can take the place of foot reconnaissance. If time permits, every man must know on the ground just exactly where they will go and what they will do when they get there. They must know what the terrain ahead looks like and the most probable target areas.

9. Appreciate the enemy's knowledge of the terrain, and in particular, in so far as it effects the employment of tanks. Try to ascertain the enemy's most logical AT defenses. Existing AT defenses provide one of the main bases of fire to support an enemy tank attack or to hinder or stop our own advance.

10. Make the maximum use of poor weather and poor visibility to conceal your movements.

11. Coordinate your fire plan with the Infantry and make it known to each of your destroyers when fire is to be lifted. Your fields of fire must also be known to the Infantry so that fire can be called on targets with the certainty that the fire can be given without undue delay. Each (Inf. & TD's.) should know the others plan of action.

12. Sufficient OP's should be manned, with direct radio communication to every destroyer, to cover the entire sector and flanks with interlocking fields of vision. Recon. Company personnel are trained in this work and should be used to the maximum. They are the eyes and ears of the TD Company and should be used as such.

13. During the initial planning and reconnaissance stages before an attack, make arrangements with the Regimental Combat Engineers to sweep the roads or routes you intend to use.

14. A very definite need exists for direct radio communication to coordinate movements and support between Tanks and TD's within the Regimental sector. During a fire fight, liaison channels at Regimental Hdqrs. are usually too slow to secure the immediate support of one another. The SCR 300 has been used satisfactorily.

15. Tanks and TD's should work as a team. Each should know what the other is doing and where he is at all times. The TD's should provide a base of AT protection to cover the employment of the tanks.

16. The Reconnaissance agencies of the TD Bn. should be made available to the tanks as well as the TD companies.

17. It must be remembered at all times when in support, that the desires of the Infantry Regimental Commander is the command of the T.D. Commander.

18. The Reconnaissance Company and platoons must keep constant reconnaissance in adjacent sectors and must be prepared at all times to guide TD platoons into the adjacent sectors to repel an armored attack.

19. Cooperation and confidence that the attack will succeed should exist between all units and, when the attack is over and the objectives won, each can pat the other on the back and say "well done".

20. During operations in deep snow, steel track vehicles are not satisfactory, however with the addition of homemade grousers welded on the blocks, so that 4 grousers are on the ground at all times, satisfactory performance results.

21. During operations in deep snow, and heavy tracked vehicles become damaged by enemy mines, recover vehicle before it settles of its own weight or because of thaw, otherwise additional mines may be exploded.
