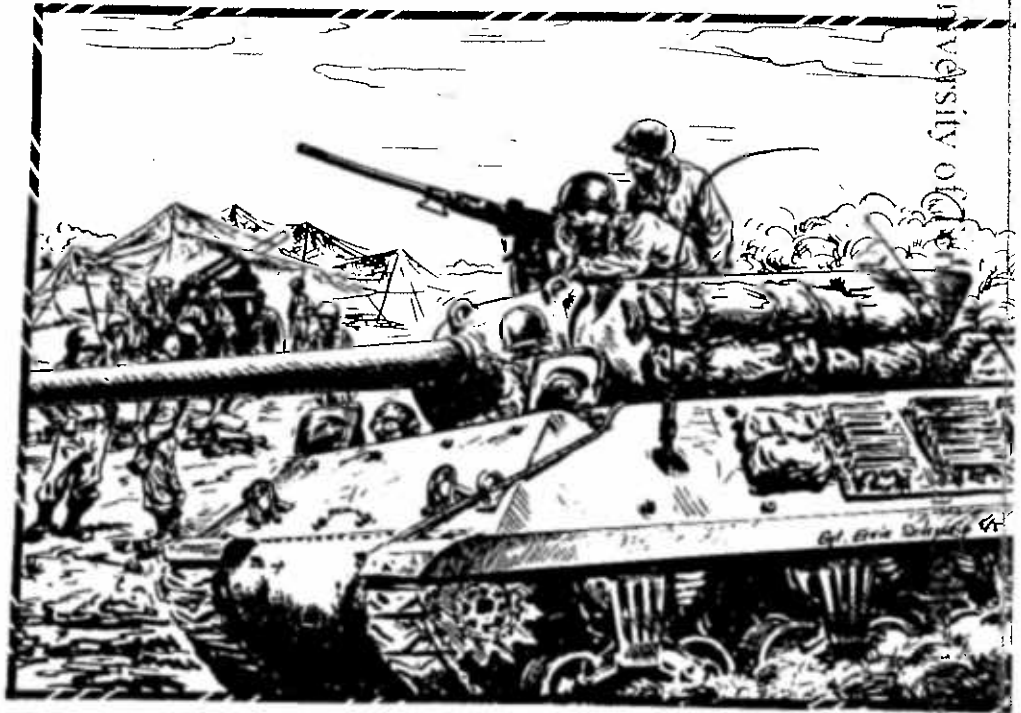

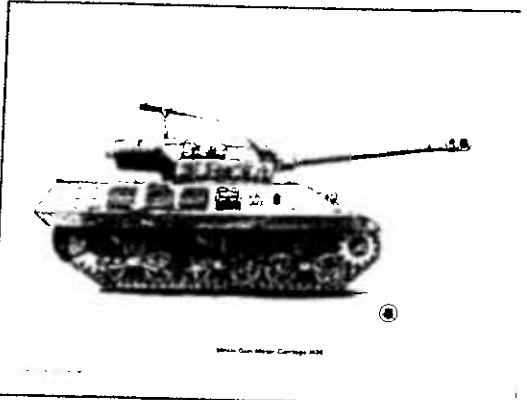

I was a zoo attendant in LA when I was drafted for 1 year in March 1941. Took basic training Coast Arty. at La Jolla, CA. Sent to Puget Sound, Fort Warden, near Port Townsend, WA when war started. Left Aug 7, 1942 for Camp Hood. Attended OCS Aug 17th to Nov 13, 1942 (Class #5). As 2nd Lt assigned to 128 Dec 1, 1942, then 610 Jan 20, 1943 at Camp Bowie. With 610 back to Camp Hood Feb 24. Mar 26 went overseas, assigned to Recon Co. 627 in Hilo in May. In Aug '43 was transferred to C Co. Made 1st Lt in Oct. About this time the Bn moved to Schofield Barracks on Oahu. In Dec '44 I returned to Camp Hood for Advanced Artillery Training. I returned to the 627th in Hawaii. I was discharged in Jan 1946 at Fort McArthur, Long Beach, CA. Married in March 1946 and went to Fairbanks Alaska. Spent the next 25 years as a civilian employee with the Corps of Engineers, most of the work being on military construction in Alaska. Retired in 1972. Now living in Oregon. JACK E STEGE, Portland.

I am a former TD having served with Recon. Co 773 from 41 to 43 at which time I was transferred to Co C 807 until wounded and sent back to England to the Hospital. I ended up with the 92nd Troop Carrier Squadron in the Air Force. ALBERT R. ALLEN

Thanks for the list of 603 men. I mailed 20 Xmas cards and received 12 answers. It was good to hear from some of them after all these

years. I hope to make the next meet at Ft. Hood and see some of them there. About the Silver Star There isn't much to tell. This particular day I guess just happened to be at the right place at the right time. The infantry was on our left flank and were supporting them. They called for tank support in a wooded area. The tanks moved in the edge of the woods. Ralph Steath, 2 medics and myself were in a large area watching. The 1st tank had gotten to the edge of the woods. The 2nd one got hit just before it got there. A couple of the fellows jumped out and got machine gunned. The 1st tank backed up to help them and got hit. I don't know just how many got out of it. I think some got out on the other side. A medic half-track went down to pick them up. The 2nd men got out with a litter and picked one of them up and just as they put him in the half-track one got hit. The other one jumped in the half-track and drove back up the hill. Two men were still on the ground. We were about 4 or 500' from them. The snow must have been 2 or 3' deep. I know it was cold. Finally those 2 started crawling. One was behind the other giving him a boost. One was shot in the leg and the one behind him would hold his hand out and the one in front would push himself as far as he could. Then the one behind him would move up again and he would push again. They were moving very slow. I asked the medics what they didn't go help them. One told me the Germans would shoot them so I said as me. I told them to give me Steath his helmet and we would get them. They wouldn't do that and Steath wouldn't go either. They said there was a machine gun between us and them. I didn't believe it. I got up and started toward them. I had gotten just about 50' when the machine gun opened on me. They knocked me from under my feet. I turned and fired at the 1st thing I saw. I know the good Lord was with me. After quieting the machine gun, I walked down to the 2 tankers. One said "Which one of you is the worst?" The one in back said, "I am." I picked him up and carried him back up to the crater where the medics and Steath were waiting. Then I went back where I left the other one. I asked how bad he was hurt. He said, "I wasn't hit, I'm just scared." I told him to get his butt up and get there and take off, and he did. I wasn't a hero. I only did what I thought was the human thing to do. We had a good outfit in C Co. GEORGE CREEK, Jacksonville, FL

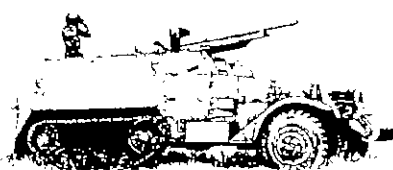

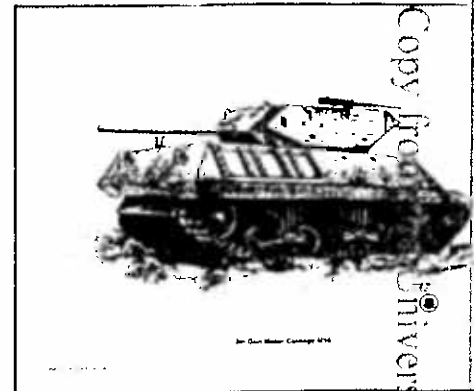
