SUBJECT: Action Against Enemy, Report After.

The Adjutant General, Washington, DC. (Through Channels)



- This is the third such report submitted by this headquarters.
- 2. This provisional Battalion was organized in September 1944 and operated through 30 September under the provisions of GO 51, Hq. V Corps. On 1 October 1944 GO 58, Hq. V Corps was published prescribing the operations of this Battalion and rescinding GO 51. On 5 October 1944, Circular 47, Hq V Corps was published for the purpose of clarifying the duties of this Battalion and Military Government Agencies in Division and Corps Areas. (Cir. 17 attached as inclosure 1).
- Throughout the month of November, the zone of responsibility of the Battalion remained stable due to the static tactical situation.
- Towns occupied by the Military Government Police Detachments during the 4. month were:

Butgenbach (K-913044) (K-887052) Neywertz Stavelot (P-728010) Malmedy. (P-790045) Sourbrodt (K-862098) Eupen . (K-796263)(K-919287)Roetgen

- 5. Due to the static situation and the return of civilians evacuated in October, the problems of the Military Government Police were largely solved. During November the mission of the Battalion remained that of patrolling the Corps Security Line. See overlay showing disposition of Detachments along Corps Security Line. (Inclosure 2).
- 6. There was considerable movement and replacing of Divisions in the Corps Area during November. Because of this fact, the Detachments in the Division areas greatly assisted the Military Government Agencies in handling the congested towns.
- 7. Due to manpower shortage in the Corps units and the routine operations of the Military Government Police Battalion, certain Detachments were relieved and sent back to their organizations. See GO 73, Hq. V Corps. (Inclosure 3). These Detachments were:
