SECTION _ - V

A. SUMMARY OF LESSONS LEARNED.

- 1. Long range radio equipment for Company necessary to communicate with higher or supported Headquarters such as 193 radio.
- 2. Infantry elements should remain a safe distance from tanks or tank destroyer when in assault as the armor draws heavy small arms and mortar fire. Foot troops accompanying tanks should be so placed that they can forestall any enemy suicide attempts to neutralize tank fire power, at same time be out of line of fire.
- 3. Thorough reconnaisance of route of approach and assembly or bivouac area for destroyers should be made in this theatre as much of terrain will not carry heavy tracked vehicles. When supported units select assembly areas, a reconnaisance group or representative of the Tank Destroyer unit should be consulted.
- 4. Training with units to be supported is desirous prior to committment. If not possible, competent liaison should be established and be continues to acqueint supported unit of the characteristics, capabilities and method of employment.
- 5. Command channels should be respected so that immediate commanders are familiar with the disposition of each Tank destroyer. Responsibility of control cannot be delegated unless this is practiced.

CHRONOLOGICAL REPORT

23 September to 29 September 1944 (Incl.)

Company received 8 half-tracks with T/E equipment: This period was devoted to preparing half-tracks for combat conditions, and to getting drivers and assistant drivers thoroughly conversant with their vehicles. Unseccessful attempts were made on a practice loading and unloading of L.J.T.'s due to fact that beach area assigned us was too shallow to allow L.J.T.'s to run up on shore. All vehicles were waterproofed during this period.

30 September to 9 October 1944 (Incl.)

This period was devoted to preparations for future operation, for which A Co. was officially alerted. Details performed included final check on all equipment, personal and organization, dissemination of censorship regulations, combat loading of vehicles, exercises in tracking and sighting, and moving of heavy vehicles to an assembly area on the beach.

10 October 1944

Camp broken and company and remaining equipment moved to beach assembly area. L.S.T. a landed and loading was initiated.

11 October 1944

Loading completed - vehicles made fast for water movement.

Company personnel boarded ship. (L.S.T. #458) Commendation from

Captain of ship received for conduct of troops and for efficient manner

of loading under extremely adverse conditions and inclement weather.

12 October to 19 October 1944 (Incl.)

This period absorbed by water movement from point of embarkation to task force objective. Ship beached at HUMBOLDT BAY, 12 October, unloaded some casual passengers, loaded one of two D-8 Bulldozers attached to company for landing operation. Convoy formed and moved off 13 October. During the interim of the voyage classes were held on orientation and nature of operation about to take place, including detailed terrain studies of area operation was anticipated in. A large portion of time was devoted to maintenance of equipment.

20 October 1944

A-DAY. Schedule for our landing 14th wave (H-hour plus 65) Due to nature of beach, landing of our ship as scheduled was unsuccessful. Although attempts to find a suitable spot for landing were made throughout the day, none could be found and personnel remained on board that night. L.S.T.'s received enemy fire from what appeared to be 15-maguing but our ship was not hit. Two air raids during

and continous until dark. No casualties. No enemy infiltration
into area during night. One air raid.

22 October 1944

Company moved forward to new area approximately 500 yds, east of Hill 522. Infantry perimeter just west of Hill 522. Firing thru out night by adjacent units. No enemy infiltration noticed. No ammunition expended by our men. One air raid during day.

23 October 1944

Lt Best reconnoitered new erea and Co. and Bn. Hqs., Recon. Co. moved into it, alongside Hill 522 on south side. Indeed fire in area from several sides which continued thru out night, also cross fire from adjacent units. 2nd Platoon elerted and moved to 3rd En. 34th C.I. to counteract possible enemy tank attack. Move to new area was slowed down considerably due to difficulty encountered with terrain. Area we left was partly rice patties. No bottom to ground, and Destroyers begged down easily. Thru out this whole area there is only one road for lines of communication, and this was heavily congested at all times with suprly and combat vehicles. Maintaining inter-unit control almost impossible.

October 1944

Several air raids today. Two Jap two engine bombers flew in low over our area. Cur A.A. fire was effective. One plane went down approximately one-half mile from us. Unable to determine whether it was from our fire only or fire from neighboring units. Complete Jap uniform with rifle and ammunition found just beyond perimeter in 3rd Platoon sector. Condition of clothing showed it had not been there for long. Eniper fire continues, always particularly heavy during air raid. Many natives in town and around our area - all are nervous jittery. Some have been hit by sniper fire - 4 were casualties from Jap booby traps placed in native house just beyond our perimeter. Battalion aid station treated these four casualties. One women died while at our aid station. We took about 200 natives into perimeter and special dismounted guard placed around them as cautionary measure.

25 October 1944

Numerous Jap air raids thru out day and night. Very little observed activity on part of our planes. Saw two of our land based medium bombers which were first army planes observed. Lt Tiderman with Platoon Leaders went to top of Hill 522 for observation of forward area in anticipation of future employment. Palo now completely held by our troops. 5 Jap snipers killed on hill within 100 yds of our 3.1. Sniper fire during air raids.

26 October 1944

Numerous Jap air raids thru out day. 3rd Platoon alerted and moved forward to join forward Infantry element, which was being held up by anti-personnel and tank mines. Lt Tiderman went forward to reconnoiter new area. Company moved to area just North of outskirts of PALO, in area with A Co. 44th Tank Bn., Bn. CP and Reconco. clso moved in this position. Friendly small arms, M.G. and mortar fire heavy thru out day. 3rd Platoon released - could not be used - returned to Co. 1525I. 2nd Platoon released by 3rd Bn. C.T. and returned to company at 1630I. Pvt George D meyers seriously wounded by wild or stray cal. 50, evacuated to Hospital. Source of shot not determined.

27 October 1944

Usual Jap air raids thru out day. They seem to be concentrating on beach or harbor. New s.C.P. on security measures issued by Bn. Mitchen joined company and B-rations replaced 10 in 1's. Combat patrols being sent out 3 times every day now to cover 500 yd. radius from palimeter. Special patrol sent out in search of snipers - neg. Sniper fire observed coming from hill approximately 600 yds away. Fire was delivered in our direction .50 cal. covered the observed rosition with fire. Received no more sniper fire from this point.

28 Cotober 1944

Our 3rd Plateon and a Plateon of M-4 Tanks went forward vicinity Canta he at 0630I to find Inf. elements. It Tiderman accompanied 3rd Plat. to report to forward Inf. C.O. and also to reconneiter for area closer to front lines, which have been advancing more rapidly last two days. Col. Fanning gave orientation on present situation to Officers and MCO's. Recon. and Mg Co. moved forward 1045I. — Co. moved forward 1126 I under Lt Best. We received orders to support 34th C.T. on direct fire alssions as ordered, and to counterast any Cap tank attacks which were expected. Taps had blown two medium sized bridges between our position and LauGallade. Distance traveled 11 miles when we entered assembly tree at last edge of AlaGallade. Completion of repairs on the two blown-out bridges delayed our move forward. Aighway littered with Tap equipment and dead. It fiderman joined Co. as it was moving into area. 3rd Flat. in AlaGallade to guard 54th C.F. C Co. moved into area. No sniters in vicinity.

29 October 1944

immediately to support 34th C.T. He and 3rd Platoon (Lt Bertram)
cont for and. Order was alerted - support not needed as was expectedand Flatoon ordered by 34th C.T. to remain at 1st bridge vibinity
C.MTLL on road on call in position of readiness. At Tiderman returned
to Co. Or at 13211. 3rd Platoen called on to front lines this side of
J.MO, but then ordered to return to Co. by duraness. At Bertram brought
his Platoen into Co. perimeter at 17501.



Rainy season evidently starting. Has rained for several days. This makes cross country movement by Destroyers impossible except on very solid high ground. Almost all terrain observed so far will not meet these requirements. At 1110I Co. alerted and cleared area in 10 minutes moving towards front lines at J.RO. Arrived JARO 1235I. Fighting about 500yds North of road. Received snijer fire. One Sherman tank hit in tube by Jap anti-tank gun. Went into assembly position in town. Sent observers forward and to flanks to watch for possible Jap tank attack. It Tiderman with assault unit. Our combat patrol returned with native report approximately 60 Japs one and one-half miles south causing trouble to natives, killing some. Iso 50 Japs reported by patrol three-fourths mile Sh of our position. Strong perimeter set up expect Jap night flank or rear attack. We composed outer perimeter to south for one sector. Sniper fire thruout night. No Jap attack.


31 October 1944

Several air raids close to us but no damage. 2nd and 3rd Plat. elerted. Lt. Best went with assault elements (2nd Bn. of 34th CT) to act as Lisison for company. Theeled vehicles sent back to En. CP. 1022I. 1st Platoon Elerted and attached to 3rd Bn., 34th CT for their operation against the enemy - working south and west of Highway 2. 4s nature of terrain restricted cross country movement by tracked vehicles - 1st Plat. remained on road in support by direct fire from that position. Lt Mc Lelland maintained contact with assault elements, thru 34th Cannon Co Liaison officer by F.m. radic. 2nd and 3rd Plats moved forward with reserves of 2nd Bn., 34th C.T. one round Jap mortar landed 25 yds to side of 3rd Plat - no damage. Infantry moved along fairly well until approximately 1100 when pinned down by Japs at a position in which they were well dug in and prepared to hold for at least a determined delaying action. Fighting was confined to strategic positions on road. Very little front. Infantry used some Sherman tanks, but due to nature of terrain only one could be used at a time. Japs employed anti-tank guns hitting two Shermans, one being disabled. It Tiderman came up to front lines in afternoon and C.O. 2nd Bn. promised to use our M-10's on next days operation. Lt Savacool relieved Lt Best with assault elements at 1600 and his Flat remained in forward area with the 2nd Bn. Lt Best brought 3rd Plat and C.P. vehicles back to JARO. Lt Tiderman remained forward until 1730I and then returned to Co. area with Lt Savacool and 2nd Flat. 1st Plat returned to Co. area 17001 were not employed.

1 November 1944

Native reported 50 Japs in Coconut grove 500 yds south of us.

Recon. patrol sent out to investigate with Filipino guide. No Japs
found here but petrol did sight about 50 Japs approximately 2 miles So.
along side of road. 19th C.T. was working this area. 2nd Plat
went forward 0730I to join 2nd Bn., and were committed in part. Lt.
Savacool in his No. 1 Destroyer went forward of Infantry lines into
Jap position, remaining there approximately 20 minutes and expending
56 rounds of HE ammunition by direct fire, mostly point blank range -



1 November 1944 (Cont'd)

- targets being pill boxes and machine gun emplacements and a column of Japs approximately 1500I yds N. and W., very good results were obtained the destroyer drew quite a bit of heavy machine gun fire. No casualties, this action was commended very highly by 2nd Bn. G.O.

2 November 1944

0600I Lt Tiderman went forward to front lines to get estimate of situation, and to pick an assembly area close to forward troops. Lt Best brought Co. (2nd Plat) forward at 0715I to assembly area at Tabo. Co. joined here by Bn. C.P. and elements of Recon vo. combat vehicles moved forward to C.P. established by Lt Tiderman in TUNGA. Total distance travelled 5 miles. Lt Mc Lelleand received orders to relieve 2nd Plat., which was with forward elements, and he took his first Plat. forward at 0849I. 2nd Plat returned to fuel up and take on ammunition. No. 1 Destroyer showed many scars from heavy machine gun and A.P. slugs, and 2 Moletov cocktails which went off on plates below deck of Destroyer but caused no damage as no fire reached engine compartment. Some of M.G. slugs remained in armor embedded as deep as 1 inch - the slug still in perfect shape. Infantry with our 1st Plat moved forward into CARIGALA - No resistance offered. Company followed Infantry into CaRICARA, leaving TUNGA 1550I, arriving CARIG-RA 1635I, and going into assembly and bivouac position. 1st Plat joined Co. 1650I. Distance travelled 6 miles. Terrain off road soft and boggy. Destroyer 31 has burnt out motor -

3 November to 5 November 1944 (Incl)

Remained in bivouac area in CARIGARA for this period. Air raids each night. 4 November, six Jap bombs dropped near area. Received three .50 cal. M.G.'s and four .30 cal. M.G.'s to complete equiping each half track with one .30 cal. and one .50 cal. 3 November fire broke out in one of kitchen ranges. Pfc Manthey burned and evacuated.

6 November 1944

Moved to new area 0925I joining Bn. C.P., C Co., and Recon Co. Area just West of CARIGARA. Distance travelled one and four tenths miles. Perimeter established. Patrols sent out reported non-contact with Japs but natives say lots of them in hills across rice patties to our 3.W. about 3500 yards. No enemy activity at night - some small arms fire from our own troops. Large reinforcements of Japs reported landed at ORMOC with heavy equipment including tenks and Artillery up to 150-mm rifles.

7 November 1944

S Sgt Montgomery shot in foot by accidental discharge of his carbine. No change in situation.

8 November 1944

9 November 1944

Same area. Report received 6 Jap Destroyers and APA ships cutside of Straits to CARIGARA BAY off BILLARIAN ISLAND and 300 berges via ORMOC moving north. Believed Japs planning landing CARIGARA BAY. Co. given mission of beach defense and areas reconnoitered for positions by officers and Plat Sgts. Received report fifteen P.T. boats sent cut to intercept Jap combat force.

10 November 1944

Same area. Situation unchanged until 1500I when Co. was alerted. Japs are reported moving this way from hills and mountains. All positions of defense reinforced and perimeter strengthened. No Jap activity at night as anticipated.

11 November 1944

Same area - No change in situation. In morning many of our planes overhead in formation, going toward ORMCC. (appeared to be over 300 in number - mostly or all Navy planes) Information received later reported large Jap reinforcement convoy demolished great number of Jays killed. Planes also reported strafing and bombing 15 mile long Jay column of heavy equipment, tanks and aftillery. Much damage done.

12 November to 14 November 1944 (Incl)

Same area. Situation unchanged. Destroyer 31 back to Co. Jap plane dropped many anti-personnel bombs which hit pontoon bridge close to us. Believed to be going after heavy artiller; near us. Cur artillery is pouring tremendous amount of fire into Japs.

15 November 1944

32nd Division moving up to front. Bn. Hes. and Co. C attached to 32nd Division. A Co. still attached to 22th Division and still on beach defense mission.

16 November 1944

No change. One Jap bomb dropped close to our eres.

17 November 1944

Situation same. Bn. Hc. and C Co. and Recon. Co. moved out of area and went forward to join 32nd Division. Perimeter closed. Pags bombed to east and west of our area.

18 November 1944

Jap plane over area again. Dropped tembs south of us. It Tiderman went on Accon. for new area, but acciditi a of roud, due to continual rain of last too weeks and heavy traffic, would not permit travel by our Destroyer vehicles.

19 November 1944

Company moved to new area on beach approximately 500 yds. north of old area. Still a beach defense mission.

20 November 1944

Company spent day on mioneer work improving road and making route of egress. Company alerted 1655I to move immediately to 32nd Division C.P., in vicinity of CAPOCCAN VILLAGE. Report that Japs broke thru. Company attached to 32nd Division per VCCG, X Corps. Arrived 32nd Div. C.P. 1905I in torrential rainstorm. Company was broken up and placed at strategic spots around C.P. perimeter, forming road blocks, beach defense and perimeter defense. No Jap attack that night as was anticipated.

21 November 1944

To remain with 32nd Division to be held as Division reserve troops. Some combat activity just south of Division C.P.

22 November 1944

Company alerted to have forward on 5 minute notice. 1022I Japs sighted on road east of perimeter. Alert called off. 1125I lst section, 3rd Platoon sent to guard Division emergency ration dump approximately one-half mile to the rear at 1445I. Heleased from this mission and returned at 1505I. Heasen for release: They drew energy printillery fire as soon as they ar ived at dump. West Glennon and C/Sgt halsh each in command of one half-track and combat crew left area at 0900I. Mission to protect wire laying teams moving forward. They killed 14 Japs and knocked out 2 M.G.'s, or mission. Remained with C Co. overnight as roads were too bad to permit their return. At 1730I, 2 Jap Artillery shells landed on edge of area. No casualties. Roads now are almost out of commission d e to heavy rains and traffic.

23 Lovember 1944

rad roast turkey for dinner. 1225I Jap shell landed about 100 yds. Takey in Div. U.P. Dome casusities. Enemy planes over orea several tiles during day.

24 Lovelaber 1944

Two der Artiller, shells landed in Bey about 100 yds from us. 17301 to 2001 four enomy planes came in over tree. I ree that down by round troops, one was that down by P-38. We received credit for one zero thish we got right over our area. Later in corning nev eralls, chiefly fell noor area to our west. Jay planes every end all ht. To be be dropped.

25 Ove Bor 1944

-ituation unchanged. Pay Arty. Shells londed near'u in Lay. Yne Day plane near area early in evening. Propped bombs in water and appeared to crash in Bay.

26 Movember 1944

At C700I lst section, 3rd Plat. sent to guard Div. Amergency ration dump. Drew no hostile fire this time. At 1230I two Jup plenes shot down over eres. One by P-38 and one by A.A. unit. Co. alerted to be on witch for Jup suicide troops. Three Jap transport planes landed behind lines with approximately 75 men. Planes found but no Jups. Jup forward observer discovered operating in disguised in native fishing toat in CARIGALA DAY. ...ore arty. shells in area.

27 November 1944

Jap shells landed just across road again. About 2300I, about eight Jap planes came over and dropped large incendary bombs along shore to our west.

28 November 1944 to 29 November 1944

No change.

30 November 1944

Japs dropped some bombs east of us at 0500I. Company ordered to move to B Co area at TUNGA. Wheeled column and half-tracks under Lt Best left at 1530I. Destroyer column under Lt Tiderman at 1600I. Can travel on beach at low tide only. Company closed into new area at 1826I. Distance travelled: 10.3 miles.

1 December 1944
