## 661st Obstacle Course Includes Many Barriers

A newly-constructed obstacle course is helping to put the men of the 661st TD Battalion in fighting shape.

Designed to include almost every type of barrier normally to be encountered in combat, the course embraces barbed wire entanglements, hurdles, water hazards, rope climbing.

Starting the obstacle run, the soldier crosses a snarl of barbed wire staked low to the ground, in flying leaps, then descends a sharp decline to jump a five foot ditch. Crossing this, he ascends a sharp grade, crawling under a series of barbed wire entanglements on his way to the top. Then the course leads over half a dozen log hurdles, to a water filled ravine which is spanned by a narrow log.

Arriving it a gully the soldier grasps a long rope, and "monkey swings" himself to the opposite side. From there he crawls under a log barrier, scales a six foot wall, climbs a long rope hand over hand, and finishes the test by crawling along a horizontally stretched rope between two treetrunk supports followed by a sprint up a rocky slope to the end of the line.
