I -- A"ARD OF GRONZE STAR MEDIAL. Under the provisions of Army Regulations 600-45, 22 September 1943, as smonded, the Bronze Star Medal is awarded to following named individuals:

Technical Sergeant Victor L. Campbell, 34574494, (then Staff Sergeant), Infantry, Company "N", Aloth Infantry Regiment. For heroic achievement in action. On 5 December 1944 near Selectat, France, Sergeant Campbell, acting as an observer for the heavy morter plateon, voluntarily crossed 200 yards of exposed terrain to cot up an OP in an advantageous position. Disregarding morter and small was fire, he stopped, hooked up his telephone and transmitted fire orders to the gun relation. His accurate direction of mortar fire forced the enemy into the open where our heavy machine guns inflicted numerous cascalties. His action reflected the industry institutes of the military service. Residence: Fairburn, Georgia.

Private First Class Harvey L. Whitenack, 6552514, Medical Department, Medical Detachment, AlOth Infantry Regiment. For heroic achievement in action. On 25 January 1945 near Schillersdorf, France, after Private Whitenack had dragged two casualties to safety, another call for an aid man was made. Disregarding small arms and machine gan fire, he left his covered position and running through an exposed oreherd resched the casualty and dragged him to the sefety of a barn, which was being used as a temporary mid station. His actions reflected the highest traditions of the military service. Residence: Wendal, California.

Private First Class Robert G. Angel, 35557136, Infantry, Headquarters Company, Third Battelion, AlOth Infantry Regiment. For heroic achievement in action. On 6 March 1945, Frivate Angel voluntarily lead a patrol into Noiffern, France, to obtain information relative to enemy dispositions. The patrol was forced to repeat its mission on two successive nights due to the nocalight which revealed its presence. On the third attempt; Frivate Angel, crawled to within 100 yards of an enemy machine gam position, probing the road for mines. The information obtained by him materially assisted in the later successful attack on the town. His actions reflected the highest traditions of the military service. Besidence: Elkhart, Indians.

Sergeant Charles R. Atkinson, 17169934, Infantry, Company "G", 410th Infantry Regiment. For heroic achievement in action. On 15 March 1945 near Engwiller, France, when his company was held up by enemy small arms, machine

gun and solf-propelled weapon fire, Sergeant Atkinson brought his median gun forward. After firing a few bursts, his gan jammed, but despite the enemy fire he sat upright and repaired his gun, then Sergeant Atkinson continued effective fire by gradling the gun in his lap. His actions reflected the highest traditions of the military service. Resdience: Mashington, Iowa.

Sprgment Willie R. Partin, 35706222, Infentry, Company "F", 410th Infantry Regiment. For horoism in action. On 15 March 1945 near Uhrwiller, France, after his squad loader was wounded, Sergeant Partin immediately reorganized the squad and continued the attack. When his squad was pinned down by artillery, machine gun and small arms fire he crowled forward 200 yards and throwing two hand grenades into a hostile emplecement, killed two of the enemy and forced eight more to surrender. His actions reflected the highest traditions of the military service. Residence: King, Kentucky.

Staff Sorgannt Garland V. Sharp, 36548760, Infantry, Company "E", 410th Infantry Regiment. For heroic achievement in action. On 22 April 1945 in Erkenbrotchswiller, Germany, Sorgant Sharp, alone in the attic of a house, saw the chemy forming for an attack. Leaving the House he made his way to the edge of town and disregarding machine gun fire, he fired into the enemy forces. When the enemy were less than 300 yards distant, he organized a group in a strong defensive position and withstood the attack. His actions reflected the highest traditions of the military service. Residence: Dearborn, Michigan.

Private Pirst Class Paul A. Foley, 31285580, Infantry, Company "D", AlOth Infantry Regiment. For heroic achievement in action. On 24 January 1945, near Mahlhausen, France, when the attacking enemy forced our troops to withdrow, Private Poley carried a sick commund 300 yards through enemy small arms and anchine gan fire to safety. He then remained behind covering the withdrawal of eight other soldiers. His actions reflected the highest traditions of the military service. Residence: Longhesdow, Massachusetts.

CAPTAIN EARL C. THOWAS, 01296938, Infantry, Headquarters 410th Infantry Regiment. For meritorious service in connection with military operations against the unemy from 10 November 1944 to 8 May 1945 in France, Germany and Austria. Residence: Enst Cresco, Iowa.

Tochnical Sergeant Bill Hodges, 34151064, Infantry, Company "I", 410th Infantry Regiment. For heroic achievement in action. On 25 January 1945 near Schillersdorf, France, Sergeant Hodges' platoon was pinned down in an open field by heavy small arms and automatic weapon figs. Disregarding the enemy fire, he contacted each man personally and directed the withdrawal, while furnishing covering fire. Only after the last man had withdrawal did he, bimself, withdraw. His actions reflected the highest traditions of the military corvice. Best denoe: Alexandria, Louisiana.

Sergeant George S. Kosmatka, 3654590k, (then Private First Class), Infantry, Company "L", Aloth Infantry Regiment. For heroic achievement in action. On

28 Fovember 1944 near Hohwarth, France, when a rifle company was ordered to wintdraw, Sergeant Komatka's plateon remained to cover the withdrawal. In the act of withdrawing himself, he heard the shouts of two wounded won. Returning to the casualties, he administered aid and hid them in the underbrush. After the casualties, he administered aid and hid them in the underbrush after remaining all night behind enemy lines, he led the two wounded men to safety of our own lines. His actions reflected the highest traditions of the military service. Residence: Detroit, Michigan.

Sergeant Ludwig K. Gauger, 31249101, Infantry, Company "I", AlOth Infantry Regiment. For heroic achievement in action. On 24 November 1944 when Company "I", AlOth Infantry was assushed near Lusso, France, Sergeant Gauger, lead secut, went forward, alone, to reconnecter enemy positions. Finding the enemy positions was assumed and gave the information to his company commander. Barly the next morning, during a fire fight, he protected a wounded man by shielding him with his own body. Sergeant Cauger's actions reflected the highest traditions of the military service. Residence: Winsted, Connecticut.

Private First Class William H. Smedley, 36410842, Chumlry, 103d Reconnaissance Treep. For heroic achievement in action. On 9 Pebruary 1945, near States, France, after a patrol had been forced to withdraw against accurate Unerach, France, after a patrol had been forced to withdraw against accurate methine gun fire, Private Smedley, discovering that a commade was missing, methine gun into the area. Socially the man pinned down by hostile fire, he advanced again into the area. FIRST LIEUTEMANT SHELDON L. THOMPSON, C435944, Field Artillery, Recommissance Company, 776th Tank Destroyer Battalion. April 1945 near Blaufelden, Germany, when self-propelled guns and a strongpoint
