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**MEMORANDUM**  
**8th TANK DEFENSE BATTALION**

3 March 1945.

**SUBJECT: Action Against Enemy Reports After/After Action Reports.**

**TO : The Adjutant General, Washington 25, D. C.**

1. In compliance with AF 343-103 the following report is submitted for the month of February:-

1 Feb - Co A moved 0900 H via HERN.

Co B moved 2nd Inf Div via HERN.

Co C moved 99th Inf Div East of HERN.

All companies occupied AF positions and were well dug-in with overhead cover.

2nd platoon of Co A was ordered to move into positions via HERN. The area which they were to occupy being completely covered with AF mines, secondary positions were immediately established.

The 2nd platoon of Co A moved to a mobile reserve position via Co CF.

2 Feb - Co B moved to an assembly area via HERN.

Co A lost one (1) soldier in a minefield via HERN. 1st platoon occupied AF positions via ALLEN.

3 Feb - The Bn received orders relieving it from the 99th Inf Div and attaching it to the 3rd TD Cp in Corps Reserve.

Co A moved to an assembly area via HERN.

Co C relieved from the 99th Inf Div, moved to an assembly area via HERN.

Two (2) M of Co A washed by enemy anti-personnel mines.

4 Feb - The Bn moved to an assembly area via HERN. Orders received from First Army attaching the 8th Tank Defense Battalion to the Ninth Army, further attachment to the XIX Corps.

5 Feb - While in assembly area, care and cleaning of equipment was the primary function. Moving pictures were shown to personnel in the evening.

6 Feb - No change in situation.

7 Feb - The routes of march and march orders were given to the Company Commanders. All identification was removed from vehicles. The Battalion passed the IF at 1900, destination, vicinity ACHEN.

8 Feb - The Battalion moved in an assembly area, via of SOH, Germany at 0230. All troops were billeted in houses, vehicles were well dispersed in areas.

The Battalion CO received orders from the 2nd TD Group regarding installing plans for a forthcoming operation.

Company Commanders were ordered to make reconnaissance in assigned sectors for anti-tank defenses.

9 Feb to 17 Feb - During this period the personnel of the Battalion were occupied with the care and cleaning of material. Mines were requisitioned and small arms and anti-tank weapons were fired.

The Company Commanders and Platoon Leaders constantly made reconnaissance for anti-tank positions to complete the concerted plans the Battalion had made for future operations. Special reconnaissance was included.

On the 17th of February, the CO of the 2nd TD Group ordered reconnaissance for indirect firing positions to support Corps Artillery. The Battalion CO, S-3 and the Company Commanders made this reconnaissance and located positions in the area of ALDRECHEN.

18 Feb - 19 Feb - Construction of indirect fire positions with emplacements and fire direction centers were begun and lined with sand bags. Tripflares and lights were laid to each battery.

20 Feb - Each company placed the gun and crew in position for the purpose of registration. As a result of the mission to support the 50th Infantry Division B and C Companies, the 2nd Infantry Division. All fire missions were to come from Corps Artillery.

21 Feb - A, B, and C Companies occupied the indirect fire positions. Tripflares and guns were installed in the positions at thirty minute intervals. The forward CP set up in ALDRECHEN. B and C Companies expended 24 rounds each.

22 Feb - Co A registered, expending 11 rounds each.

23 Feb - A schedule of fire was received from Corps by the 2nd Fire Control Center and broken down for the Company Fire Direction Centers. The 2nd CO to fire 200 rounds per hour from 0800 to 1200. However, at 0800 B Company was to be prepared to support the 29th Infantry Division in its area. In this unit, B Company was ordered to "close station, hold order" at 0800. Four (4) "shots" were issued by the 2nd FA Bn to pull guns from positions. Companies A and C continued scheduled until 0730, at which time, Company went on a schedule of 100 rounds per hour until 1600, while Company C fired 20 rounds per hour until 1600. Company B, though prepared to support the 29th Infantry Division, as ordered, was never called upon to execute order and was released from the 29th Division at 1600 but remained assigned.

An order received from Corps April way for a firing to come at 1600. All 3rd BN assets should have been ready by command of Army CG.

24 Feb - Orders received from 2nd TD Group to reposition anti-tank positions on the east side of the river near to houses. The anti-tank defenses in the Corps zone of action. Company Commanders were assigned sectors and designated units. At 1600 hours coverage coverage from the Company Commanders were consolidated and a plan was immediately drawn and submitted to the CO, 2nd TD Group.

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1. Action against enemy, reports after action reports, 5 March 1953.

At 0800 the Battalion was alerted to the 115th Cavalry Group (attached to 20th Infantry Division).

19 Feb - The Battalion less Co. C occupied the Bear River in the 20th Infantry Division Zone. Co A occupied positions of all defenses in the vicinity of HEDDERSHOF, the Battalion right flank with fields of fire to the east and southeast. Co B occupied positions in the vicinity of KUNTHAUSEN, the southern flank of the Division Zone, which also affected both Co A. Co C remained in mobile reserve in the vicinity of FIER.

20 Feb - Co B occupied anti-tank positions along highway between WITTEBACH and HEDDERSHOF, with fields of fire to the northeast.

Co C moved across the Bear River and occupied anti-tank positions east of HEDDERSHOF, where one man was seriously injured by an enemy mine.

27 Feb - Co C moved to vicinity of STINNEBACH and occupied anti-tank positions with the mission of direct support to the 115th Cavalry Group. The 1st Platoon occupied original indirect fire positions with the mission of placing fire in the town of HEDDERSHOF, shellacked upon by the 115th Cavalry Group.

Co A moved to assembly area in the vicinity of OUSTEN and was placed on alert for immediate support in direct support of the 115th Cavalry Group.

Co B moved to positions covering road blocks in the vicinity of OUSTEN.

28 Feb - About 0130 patrol from the 115th Cavalry Group reported HEDDERSHOF was taken by the enemy. At 0200 hours Co A occupied anti-tank defense positions in the vicinity of this village.

Co B moved to the vicinity of FRANKENHOF and occupied indirect fire positions. At 1500 they received orders to change to direct fire positions. No mission were received until in secondary role.

Co C alerted the 1st Platoon to move into positions in the vicinity of HEDDERSHOF. The 2nd Platoon was alerted to move in the vicinity of LIP.

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
