FIRE ORDERS

- I. Camp Regulations. -- All officers and enlisted men of first three grades will be familiar with the provisions of Sec. XII of Camp Hood. Regulations dated August 12, 1942.
 - 2. Battalion Fire Marshall and Assistant Fire Marshal.
- a. The Battalion Executive Officer is hereby appointed the Battalion Fire Marshal. He will make regular inspections of the entire area for hazards. He will direct all fire fighting operations until the arrival of the Post Fire Chief.
- b. The Officer of the Day is hereby appointed Assistant Fire Marshal during his tour of duty.
- 3. Location of Fire Alarm Boxes. -- All personnel will be familiar with the location of fire alarm boxes in or near the battalion area which are located as follows:
 - a. Park Ave. and 68th St. Dispatchers Office
 - b. North Ave. and 68th St. Rear Gate of Motor Park.
 - c. Battalion Ave. and 69th St.
- 4. Battalion and Company Fire Alarms. -- The battalion fire alarm will consist of fire Call sounded by the Bugler of the Guard, and the ringing of the alarm by all companies. After sounding Fire Call, the Bugler of the Guard will report to the Fire Marshal or Assistant Fire Marshal at the scene of the fire.
- 5. Action by Person Discovering Fire. -- In case of fire, the person discovering the fire will immediately:
- a. Give the alarm by calling and repeating "Fire" as loudly as possible.
- b. Make sure that all occupants of the building are awake and aware of the fire.
- c. Go to the nearest fire alarm box or, if closer, to the nearest telephone and call 100 or the Fire Department by name.
 - d. Report the fire, saying slowly and distinctly:
 "This is Private John Jones, Co. "A" 829th TD Bn.
 reporting a fire at Building Number
 Street, Block
- c. Remain nearby, and upon arrival of the Fire Department apparatus direct it to the scene of the fire.
- 6. General Instructions. -- Immediately on the alarm being given, whether a fire occurs of for fire drill:
- a. The Fire Marshal, Assistant Fire Marshal or, in the absence of any Fire Marshal, the senior officer present will take charge.
- b. All battalion headquarters personnel will report to battalion headquarters and remain there until recall is sounded.
 - c. All medical personnel will report to the dispensary.
- d. Battalion Surgeon will report to the Fire Marshal at the scene of the fire with three medical aid men and the ambulance, to render first aid.
- e. Battalion Commander will be notified immediately by the Battalion Duty Officer or Battalion Sergeant Major.
 - 7. Special Inscructions to Companies.
- a. Each company will surnish a board with special instructions typed and pasted thereon for the information of the Charge of Quarters. (See annexes attached). The Charge of Quarters will be required to read, these instructions daily.

b. Special details are assigned to companies as listed below, and detailed instructions will be found on the "Company Instruction Board", furnished by the Battalion Fire Marshal.

Fire Fighting Detail - Co. A 2 NCO'S & 20 men. (1)

(2) Traffic Control Detail - Co. B 2 NCO'S & 20 men. (3) Salvage Detail - Co. C 2 NCO'S & 20 men. (3) Salvage Detail

c. The Charge of Quarters, upon hearing the Fire Alarm sounded, will:

(1) Have his company fire alarm sounded.

(2) Turn out all men in the hutments and have them form on the

usual company parade ground under command of the senior NCO present.

(3) Dispatch special details which his company is required to furnish, under an NCO to the Fire Marshal at the scene of the fire--ON THE DOUBLE.

Fire Drill

At least one fire drill per month will be held. a.

Arrangements with the Post Fire Marshall be made at least six ₽. hours in advance of time desired to hold the fire drill.

Fire Hazards.

a. All personnel will be instructed at once by company commanders as to the manner of turning in an alarm, location of telephones, and fire alarm boxes, location and use of fire ladders, extinguishers and other fire fighting equipment.

b. All extinguishers will be filled or changed at once if required

and checked weekly.

Company "A" will furnish the FIRE FIGHTING DETAIL.

1. Charge of Quarters will direct some one to sound company fire

- 2. Charge of Quarters will turn out the entire company on the usual company parade ground. He will direct the senior noncommissioned officer present to fall the company in quickly in company formation, and stand by for orders.
 - 3. Charge of quarters will then issue the following orders:

"You two NCO's fall out (Selecting two)

Select tem men each, quickly!" (NCO's select men) b.

c. "Send your details on the double for their gas masks and leather working gloves and then take them on the double to the scene of the fire and report as FIRE FIGHTING DETAIL TO THE FIRE MARSHAL."

d. "Move out - quickly!

NOTE: If there are not enough men in the company for these details, send what is available and then send a runner to Hq. Co. (if not available then to (Rcn Co.) with the following instructions: "Go on the double to Hq. Co., have them send (No.) men with gas masks and working gloves on the double to the scene of the fire reporting to the Fire Marshal as FIGHTING DETAIL". "HOVE OUT:"

- FIRE INSTRUCTIONS FOR COMPANY "B"

Company "B" will furnish the TRAFFIC CONTROL DETAIL.

1. Charge of quarters will direct some one to sound company fire alarm vigorously.

2. Charge of Quarters will turn out the entire company on the usual parade ground. He will direct the senior noncommissioned officer present to fall the company in quickly in company formation, and stand by for orders.

a. "You two NCO's fall out, "(selecting two)

"Select ten men each, quickly! "(NCO's select men)
"Take your details on the Double to the block in which the fire is located. Post two men at each intersection to control the traffic going in the direction of the fire and turn all unauthorized vehicles back. Cooporate with the fire department in protecting their hose. Cooperate with Military Police upon their arrival in the control of traffic. Dispatch two runners to the scene of the fire reporting to the Fire Marshal that the Traffic Control Detail is at their post. The runners will remain with the Fire Marshal at his disposal."

Annex 3 to GO #9, FIRE ORDERS, 829th TD Bn, 4-5-43

FIRE INSTRUCTIONS FOR HEADQUARTERS CO.

1. Charge of Quarters will direct some one to sound company fire alarm vigorously.

2. Charge of Quarters will turn out the entire company on the usual company parade ground. He will direct the senior noncommissioned officer present to fall the company in quickly in company formation and stand by for orders

3. Charge of Quarters will then send three (3) runners to the scene of the fire to report to the Fire Marshal or Assistant Fire Marshal that the company is standing by for orders. The runners will remain with the Fire Marshal at his disposal.

FIRE INSTRUCTIONS FOR RECONNAISSANCE CO.

1. Charge of Quarters will direct some one to sound company fire alarm vigorously.

2. Charge of Quarters will turn out the entire company on the usual parade ground. He will direct the senior noncommissioned officer to fall the company in quickly in company formation, and stand by for Orders.

3. Charge of Quarters will then send three (3) runners to the scene of the fire to report to the Fire Marshal of Assistant Fire Marshal that the company is standing by for orders. The runners will remain with the Fire Marshal at his disposal.

FIRE INSTRUCTIONS FOR COMPANY "C"

Company "C" will furnish the SAVAGE DETAIL.

1. Charge of Quarters will direct some one to sound company fire alarm vigorously.

2. Charge of Quarters will turn out the entire company on the usual Company parade ground. He will direct the senior noncommissioned officer to form the company quickly in company formation, and stand by for orders.

3. Charge of Quarters will then issue following orders:

a. "You two NCO's fall out. (selecting two)

5. "Select ten men each, quickly!" (NCOIs select men)

c. "Send your details on the double for their gas masks and leather working gloves and then take them on the double to the scene of the fire and report as SAVAGE DETAIL to the Fire Marshal.

d. "Move quickly!

4. "NOTE: If there are not enough men in the company for these details, send what is available and then send a runner to Reconnaissance Company (If not available then to Hq. Co.) with the following instructions: "Go on the double to Reconn. Co., have them send (No). men with gas masks and working gloves on the double to the scene of the fire reporting to the Fire Marshal as SALVAGE DETAIL.



INTERIOR GUARD

1. The guard posts Number 3 and 4 (Bn Motor Park) outlined in diagram attached to General Orders No. 12, this Eq., dated May 3, 1943, are changed as follows:

a. Guard Post #5 is the main gate on park avenue. The guard will act in the capacity of a "watchman", and will not be required to carry arms. His duties are to remain in the immediate vicinity of the dispatcher's office and check vehicles going in and out for authorized usage.

h. During the hours 0600 to 1800 the guard, at the gate on North avenue will remain in the immediate vicinity of the gate to check for authorized usage vehicles. From 1800 to 0600 the Guard on Post # four will make a complete round of the En. Mtr. Park, keeping the area to his left. During this period he will be armed.

2. In addition to the four posts assigned, Post No. 5 in 829th TD Ba. Officers Quarters will be instigated over each week-end. The Guard will be posted each Saturday at 1800 hours and be relieved at 0600 hours the following Monday. The purpose of this guard is to be present at all times to answer the phone and keep unauthorized persons out of the barracks. The Company furnishing the Guards for the week-end, will include in their guard detail six (6) additional privates to man this post.



SECTION 1 - GENERAL

- 1. In order to facilitate emiral and obviate the issuance of unnecessarily long orders, the operating procedure herein, setting forth a normal operating routine for the various elements in the field, will be followed by all units in the battalion.
- 2. A similar procedure will be developed by each company comforming to the principles laid down herein.

SECTION II - COMAND AND STAFF

- 1. In order to insure coordination, cooperation, and control on the part of all elements to include the indivial soldier commanders will though command channels, keep all unit personnel informed of the general and special situation, mission of the unit, and any important change in the situation that occur. With this in view, each member of the organization will be required to give the following imformation without futher questioning upon receiving the order "Report" from proper authority.
 - 1. Name, rank and unit.
 - 2. Mission of this unit.
 - 3. His job.
 - 4. Mission and general dispositions of next higher units.
 - 5. Location of enemy, as known.
 - 6. CP of his immediate commander.
 - b. The immediate superior will be held responsible for failure of any individual to make a correct and full report.

2. One command post vehicle of each headquarters will carry a flag l'X l' as Follows:

Battalion Command Post

Yellow with a black center

Medical Detachment

White 4.

Headquarters Company

Yellow

Company "A"

Red

Company "B"

Green

Company "C"

Blue

These flags or guidens will be displayed from the vehicle when in bivouse, a position of readiness, rallying position or alternate rallying position, when they cannot be observed by hostile air and ground observation.

- 3. Staff Officers duties in combat areas are prescribed in FM 101-5 and FM 16-5. In addition to the above duties, staff Officers will perform certain duties as follows:
 - s. Battalion Execuite.

1. Exercise general supervision over command post.

2. He makes a check to insure the adequacy of security measures taken by units of the battalion when in bivouac, position of readiness, or rallying position.

3. When the battalion is on march, he normally marches at the head of the command post group and conducts the march of the main body when directed by battalion commander.


4. He supervises the prepration of the battalion for any march or movement issues the necessary warning order, and arranges for its execution.

5. During combat, he normally remains in the vicinity of the battalion command post and keeps

the commander of higher headquarters informed of the situation.

6. In the event the battalion commander becomes a casualty the executive efficer designates the next senior officer at the CP to take his place. He then proceeds to the location of the battalion commanders party and assumes command.

by The Adjutant (S - 1)

1. When not engaged in routine duties, assist the battalion executive in such manner as may be required.

2. Arranges for reliefs of command post personnel.

- 3. Maintain contact with the rear echelon when the command post is seperated from the rear echelon.
- 4. He normally takes the place of the battalion executive when the executive is absent from the command post.

The Intelligence Officer S - 2

1. Submits reports of prisoners captured.
2. Keep file of intelligence and observers reports.

- 3. Transmit information of armored, air and gas attacks.
- 4. Keep close contact with reconnaissance platcoms.

d. The plans and training Officer S - 3

1. In combat accompanies and advises the commanding officer.

2. Directs the battalion in case the battalion commander becomes a casualty until the arrival of the battalion executive.

e. The Supply officer S - 4

1. Provides sketch of supply installations and location of higher echelons supply on map in battalion CP.

2. Keep all supply at full quota at all times.

- 3. In cooperation with the battalion surgeon, checks for water supply point for adequate water supply for battalion unit.
- 4. Work in conjunction with battalion transportation officer in the moving of supplies.

5. Work with S-1 to prepare strength reports of battalion

6. Has a complete picture of battalion supply situation at all times for the information of the battalion commander.

f. Personnel Officer

Prepares casualty reports

2. Assist the commanding Officer, headquarters Company in the functioning and the security of the rear echelon when the combat echelon is seperated from the rear echelon.

Communication Officer

1. Operates the NCS of command and liaison nets and responsible for maintenance of air-ground contact.

2. Imposes and lifts radio silence as directed.

3. Report indication of enemy activity.

4. Strictly monitor radio nets to make certain of security of information.

5. Supervises radio maintenance and repair.

6. He is responsible for salvage of radio sets from the disabled vehicles that are to be destroyed.

h. Transportation officer.

1. Work in close contact with S-4

2. Keeps constant check on all vehicles within his platoon.

1. Maintenance officer

1. Keeps S - 4 constantly informed in the status of vehicles within the buttalion

2. Contacts and maintains liaison with 3rd schelon repair shop.

3. Supervises the operation of the recovery team and provides for their security.

j. Battalion Surgeon.

1. Maintain an aid station with rear echelon and CP.

- 2. Medical personnel is allotted to companies at all times during combat, and remains with the battalion command post.
- 3. In cooperation with executive officer keeps all personnel informed of the location of battalion aid stations,

4. Checks water DPs with S-4.

4. At night one battalion staff officer remains awake and on duty at battalion CP. He knows where each member of the battalion staff is sleeping. Similarly, one member of each battalion headquarters section remains on duty. Battalion staff officers, on leaving the CP report their destination and expected time of return to the message center.

SECTION III - LIAISON

- 1. Liaison by communication of paracoal contact with units to which attached and with units whose zones sectors tank destroyer units are operating, will maintained at all times.
- 2. Liaison with supported units will be directed by the Battalion Commander. 3. a. Liaison officer habitually remain at the CP of the unit to which sent. He rejoins the battalion to make importment reports, or transmit information or orders, but teturn to his post without delay.

b. If available at the time a motorcycle messenger will accompany the liaison officer, before his departure, he verifies the fact that radio communication with the battalion is assured. He will keep his radio set on the battalion command net unless

otherwise directed.

- c. Liaison officers continually furnish the battalion with information of the enemy and our troops, and available, information of the terrain. They immediately report importment developments, including any contemplated or ordered movement of the CP to which are assigned. Upon completion of such movement, they insure that the battalion knows the new location of CP in question.
- 4. Within the Battalion.

a. All units commanders will keep their command post personnel informed of their whereabout as all times. Company officers report the their whereabouts to their company CP.

b. A representive of a unit Commander will be on duty at the command post of the nest higher unit during active operations. In the case of platoons and companies, this representive may be a qualified enlisted man.

c. Company Commanders, each accompained by proper security and when practicable, a radic, will report to the battalion CP immediately after their arrival in a bivouacs or rallying position. Company executive will establish company in area.

d. Each company or separate plateon will always report to higher headquarters.

(1) When it starts on a mission.

(2) When the mission has been accomplished.

(3) When unforseen conditions delays, alter, or prevent the unit from accomplishing its mission.

When the battalion is alerted for movement or change of position, company commanders report to battalion CP, and platcon leaders to company CP. Tent will be struck, equipment loaded on vehicles, and men remain in vicinity of their vehicles, ready to move out.

SECTION IV - RECONNAISSANCE AND SECURITY

1. Reconnaissance:

The reconnaissance plateons are charged with recommendating and at times, with the selection of routes along which the battalion is to move. In addition, the recommaissance plateous may be directed to select bivouse areas and rallying positions for the bettalion. Preliminary recommissance will be made by the S-2 when the situation permits.

One platoon of reconnaissance is kept in reserve when the battalion is in bivouacs or intermediate position, prepared to guide the battalion into position, in case

of a sudden move.

c. When the battalion moves from one position to another the reconnaissance platoon commander will mark routes by posting guides equipped with battalion sign, up to the point where companies branch off to their company area. From this point company

guides will direct companies.


d. Upon arrival at the destination the reconnaissance commander causes a reconnaissance to be made with a view to recommending to the battalion Commander, on his arrival, the necessary measure local security. His march outposts are established by leading element of his platoon. He also causes such other reconnaissance to be continued or executed as indicated by the tactical situation.

S-1 with site guides of various company as quartering party, precedes the battalion to a new bivouse, in the rear of advanced reconnaissance elements. He is particularly charged with selecting areas in which various companies are to be located and with the detailed disposition of the various elements of the battalion

Destroyers Company Commanders causes reconnaissance to be instituted immediately for antiaircraft gun positions for defense of company area, as soon as they arrive in position where units are to be haulted for an appreciable time.

Far flung combat reconnaissance is performed by elements of division or other

higher units.



Then the Company Comma er reports to the battalion CP upon arrival at bivouac or position of readiness he will be accompanied by his reconnaissance sergeant driver and another enlisted man as his security in a 1/4 ton vehicle. At all times he will dismount at least one hundred feet from the battalion CP Cause his vehicle and security vehicle to take cover and move on foot to the battalion commanders position.

If the battalion commander decades to move forward to reconciter gun positions the company commanders will be accompanied by their security and after definite areas have been assigned to the companies by the battalion CO the reconnaissance sergeant will return to company position and bring forward to a position directed by his company commander the following detail if available:

Reconnaissance Sergeant
Three platoon Co manders
Six Sections Sergeants
Three Platoon Security Sergeant
Six 1/4 ton vehicles

i. Immediately upon arrival in bivouac or intermediate position, company, platoon and vehicle commanders reconnoiter position. When necessary these are marked. Routes for movement forward, to the flanks, or to the rear are sought.

Security

As soon as occupied, bivouac positions will be organized for all around defense. Restroyer Companies will normally be on the perimeter of the area with supply and administration installations in the center. The recommissance platoon is located conviently with respect to the principle exit from the position. Recommaissance will cause listening posts to be installed be fore the battalion moves into the area. The relief of these posts will be the responsibility of the Recommaissance Officer however he must have one platoon ready for forward movement at a moments notice. Combat companies post security for the defense of their segiment of the position, covering routes of access both with tank destroyer guns and designated security groups. Antiaircraft security is likewise posted. The battalion executive coordinates these dispositions at the earliest practicable moment

6. The Tollowing apply to all combat positions and tactical bivouacs:

(1) Concealment from air and ground observations fundamental. Vehicles located near main roads must be particularly well concealed. It is prefered to have no vehicles witjin 100 yards of main roads.

(2) Security from ground attack the exploiting of other obstacles. Trip wires and other devices for decting infiltration of hostile elements will be utilized to supplement the action of outguards and patrols. Particular attention will be given to the protection of the command post, both day and night.

(3) Preparation to move out of the area with minimum notice, without lights and without assembly on or near the routes of egress.

(4) During hours of darkness, some*vf the use of lights will be held to a minium and will be screened when utilized.

(5) Gas and air alarm sentries will be posted by each company.

(6) Tentage will not be pitched or left standing during the hours of daylight.

(7) On the march, all vehicles equipped with weapons for antiaircraft fire will keep at least one antiaircraft observer on the alert.

(8) In bivouse, crews of anticipants.

(8) In bivonac, crews of antiaircraft weapons will be given specific instructions concerning the conditions under which fire may be opened.

(9) In situations where combet is likely and the conditions and the conditions where combet is likely and the conditions.

(9) In situations where combat is likely, one man in each destroyer company and each destroyer squad and one man in each platoon and company headquarters will be awake and on the slert at all times.

(10) hen such weapons are available and the situation warrants, the battalion commanders party and the battalion CP are protected by a security section and a destroyer section. The rear echelon is similarly protected when units and reapons are available

(11) The Commanding officer, Headquarters company, is charged with the security of the rear echelon.


Section V - Marches

Non tactical Marches.

a. Instructions on non-tactical marches will be found in FM 24-10 paras 50 to 71

Tactical Marches

a. So far as practicable, the provisions of the preceding paragraph are complied with.



- b. General instructions and normal march formations in tactical marches are specified in FM 18-5.
- S 1 with one NCO and 1/4 ton vehicle and driver and two basics constitute the normal quartering party from each company. This party precedes the main column by one hour at least, when practicable, and is prepared to guide units to their own areas when they arrive at release point.
- The battalion is divided into march units normally as follows: (In order of March)

1. Reconnaissance platoons;

2. Quartering party, battalion com and post plus headquarters Company less service echelon;

3. Comapny "A" less service echelons: 4. Company "B" less service achelons

5. Company "C" less one platoon and less service echelon

6. Kitchens, fuel, ammunition, supply trucks and one platoon of Co. The battalion transportation officer commands the rear security elements, he acts as battalion accident investigating officer. He carries the necessary

forms for investigating accidents. The duties of the rear security are:

1. Prevent the doubling of column.

2. Investigating accidents

3. picking up guides and signs.

- f. When an accident occurs, the nearest officer makes a hasty preliminary investigating He assists the injured until the arrival of the medical officer. Posts guards at both ends of the stoppage to warn traffic. Obtains a list of witnesss, allocates uninjured men with their equipment to me rby vehicles, leave a guard over damaged vehicles and sees that the column resumes its movement. He remains at the scene of the accident until investigating officer arrives. The latter conducts a complete investigation and makes a formal complete written report to the battalion commander as soon as possible after the conclusion of the march.
- g. Unless otherwise prescribed, the distance between destroyer companies is two minutes. When considerable traffic is anticipated and interference by other units is expected, no distance is allowed initially between march units; the battalion, morever, follows without distance the unit it has been directed to follow. After the battalion has cleared the conjected area, distance will be gained.

h. March locations will be reported in terms of the distance that the head of the unit is from the initial point expressed in miles. Example: Head of Roger 24.8 at 0805" to indicate that the head of Company "A" at 0805 was 24.8 miles beyond the initial point.

Distance between march units during blackout marches are reduced.

. The leading vehicle of each unit in a blackout will be a of ton truck.

 \overline{k} . At all halts, in combat zone during clear night marches, all vehicles will take cover off the road whenever practicable.

In halting, vehibles do not close up unless ordered to do so. When cover is available, subordinate unites may be signaled to close up.

W)

m. In marches during daylight or at night with lights, when infiltration by individual vehicles is not being used, drivers will never loss distance to the point where the vehicle ahead is enrecognizable.


Then the combat echelon moves out of bivousc area, leaving the rear echelon there, the supply sergeants reports at once to the commanding officer, headquarters company for orders.

c. Kitchens, ammunition, and fuel trucks to accompany the combat echelon only when expressly ordered.

On entering any combat position or bivousc area, all vehicles will immediately clear the route of march in order that succeeding or march units may continue to their position without delay

On movement likely to end in combat, the recommaissance officer advances along the the route of the battalian. He causes the route to be marked, principally by signs. At points where there is considerable danger of the battalion going astray, he posts a

Thile in any assembly position or bivouac area, each lettered company will designate as alternate route guides, five men other than the regular reconnaissance personnel. These new men, together with one vehicle, will be held in readiness in case the battalion is required to move without the usual route recommaissance agencies.



SECTION VI

Ceneral

(1) During combat, the capabilities of all element of the battalion are employed as directed by the battalion Commander depending on the situation, mission and

(2) When the time and situation permits, the battalion commander will indicate plans well in advance of the action, for employment of the battalion. These include contingent plans. He will assign areas to companies, and indicate the priority of the plans of action. In accordance with these priorities, company and plateon Commanders will formulate their own plans and reconnoiter throughly as eldiazoq.

b. Reconnaissance .-

(1) Reconnaissance is vigorously maintained before, during and after engagement with the enemy. Contact is gained and kept. The Reconnaissance platoon and detachment from the security sections are employed.

(2) Destroyer units also assist the battalion Commander to picture the action by reporting

importment enemy moves.

o. March Security

(1) The foward security element will normally consist of reconnaissance plateons

- Flank security elements when used will be drawn from the center destroyer company, unless the situation dictates otherwise.
- (3) The battalion Commander's party will usually march well to the front.

d. Combat Security

(1) Companies and platoons will habitually employed their security sections to protext the destroyers from enemy foot troops. The security screen must be sufficiently distant from the positions to prevent enemy surprise fire.

(2) In position the security screen is maintained covering the front and flanks and so disposed as to be able to give timely warning. Radio locouts will operate well

to the front,

(3) The security system of the battalion will include numerous machine guns sited

to provided interlocking bands of fire.

(4) Antiaircraft defense will be conducted by all units. The antiaircraft machine guns on the prime movers will be manned and ready at all times during combat. Where the prime movers have uncoupled, they will be place so that their antiaircraft field of fire are not impaired and drivers will remain on the alert manning the machine guns.

(5) When the battalion is subjected to air attack every man in the battalion will fire at the planes with what ever weapon is available to him. The first man to identify the attacking enemy will give the alarm and open fire. The psychologival effect of such massed fire on the enemy as well as our troops will be

indoctrinated.

o. Readiness.

(1) Companies and phatoons will maintain a continious alert during movement into combat and engagement with the enemy,

(2) All vahicles crews will be alert and in proper positions for action during the movement into combat. Men are not permitted to relax their vigilance during lulls in action.

(3) All gun crews will make a thorough check of their ammunition, weapon, and vehicles to isure their proper functioning and servicesbility just prior to entry into combat. During lulls in combat, when additional ammunition is not immediately available, units leaders will redistribute ammunition with in their units.

f. Miscellaneous.

(1) In compat area all vehicles and equipment will always be camouflaged with particular attention to reflecting surfaces.

(2) All personnel will be ready to destroy all documents, maps, and unit marking to prevent their falling into enemy hands.

(3) Vehicles or individuals forced to fall out for any reason will rejoin the nearest unit as soon as possible and proceed to their proper unit when situation permits. When disabled vehicles or equipment must be destroyed, the crews will salbage what arms and ammunition they can before abandining.

Section VII Signal Communication

General

(a) Whenever possible the transmission of information and orders will be by personnel interviews between the persons concerned.

(b) All messages transmitted by messenger or by radio will be as brief as possible and still contain essential information.

2. Radio

 (a) For diagram of radio nets, call signs, and frequencies, see SOI.
 (b) The name of the place or localities, or the word "Tank" or "Tank Destroyer" will not be used over the radio. Places or localities will be designated by map coordinate code or combat position nome clature.

(c) During an attack no messages will be sent by radio that can be deferred orsent by other means, or that are not necessary for the success

tactical eperation.

(d) Normally, radio nets are opened 30 minutes before the time when radio communication is required.

(e) When radio silence is in effect, each company will keep all recievers turned to battalion net frequency.

(f) The battalion communication officer is charged with monitoring traffic, preventing unnecessary transmissions and infractions of procedure, and secrecy precautions.

(g) Company radio electricians become members of the company vehicle recovering team during combat, making repairs to damaged radio equipment, or salvaging equipment from vehicles that must be destroyed. Electricians of the communication platoon of headquarters company performed simular duties as members of the battalion recovery team.

3. Messengers.

(a) Upon arrival of battalion in bivouac, each company will send two runners to the battalion command post. One is sent back to the company after accertaining the location of the CP.

(b) Priority will be given to motorcycle messengers by drivers and car commanders of all vehicles, especially when passing on narrow, dandy and slippery roads and while driving at night without lights.

Section VIII

l. General.


(1) All maintenance functions must be based upon the general princples of flexibility, aggressiveness, and priority. Priority will be given to combat vehicles.

(29) Haintenance personnel will not rest in the field while vehicles, wespons, or radios that can be repaired require attention. They work all night if necessary to repair a vehicle.

(3) At the end of the march or conclusion of a days operations, each driver inspects his vehicle and makes such repairs as are his responsibility. He reports to motor sergeant and defect t at he is unable to remedy.

(4) The company maintenance performs all work of which it is capably within the limit of time, trained men, tools and supplies. The battalion section performs work that is beyond the capacity of the company section. Thhe battalion maintenance officer evacuates all vehicles to higher echelons for maintenance that the battalion is unable to perform.

(5) In both tactical and non-tactical situations, vehicle crew, if situation permits, deliver disabled vehicles to a point designed by the battalion maintenance officer. We a disabled vehicle cannot be moved, the vehhicle commander gots its location and indicates the maintenance required to the battalion maint manon section, directly or through platoon or company headquarters.



Section IX Supply

1. General

(a) Rations.

1. The ration cycle begins with supper unless otherwise prescribed.

2. Rations will be drawn from railhead or distributing point by the battalion. supply Officer and delivered to the companies, or issued at the battalion distributing point, as the situation dictates.

5. Each vehicle in the battalion willlcarry sufficient (normally three days) field

ration, C & D and water for the vehicle crew for the contemplated action,

(b) Water

1. The battalion S-4 will locate and designate water supply sources for the battalion.

2. Water will be delivered or companies will haul their own, depending on the situation and available source of supply.

3. The battalion surgeon will inspect all available sources of water supply of the battalion

C. Fuel and lubricants

1. The fuel lubricants will be distributed by the gas and oil section of the transportation platoon.

2. Replacement will be made by an exchange of 5 gal. can to provide for rapid refueling.

d. Class II. III and IV supplies (less ammunition)

a. Requirements for these supplies will be made by units to the S - 4 who will issue same direct to companies in position.

C. Ammunition

1. Combat vehicle will carry their full load at all times.

2. S - 4 will arrange credits at higher headquarters distributing points and distribute ammunition to the aompanies.

Section X Evacuation

The battalion medical detchment as not equipped to serve as a collecting agency. and during the evacuation of the sick and wounded is a problem of major concern. The following procedure will be observed in the care of the sick and wounded during combat injured personnel will be given immediate first aid by members of. their own vehicle crew using such facilities as are at hand. As soon as the situation permits, wounded will be given additional first aid by the aid men attached to their companies. Men who are able to do so will remain with their vehicle until their unit reaches the rallying position where the battalion surgeon will arrange for their evacuation.

(a) The battalion surgeon will arrange with the nearest collecting agency for the reremoval of seriously injured to the rear. Vehicles and personnel will be made

available if possible.

(b) The battalion medical detachment will establish an aid station at the battalion CP and rear echelon.

(c) Company aid men in 1/4 ton trucks are assigned to each company. They render first aid and notify the battalion surgeon of the location of wounded or injured men left in sheltered locations.

(d) Medical personnel will march in the rear of the column attending to sick and wounded or evacuating them.

e) Water purification is a responsibility of the medical detachment.

 (ℓ) Sanitary inspection of areas is the responsibility of the medical officer

1. All provious orders and instructions pertaining to Interior Guard Duty are rescinded and the following substituted therefor, effective immediately:

Motor patrols will supplement their actions by foot reconnaissance particularly in the Motor Park areas. These vehicles will be furnished by the company on guard, with the driver considered as a member of the guard.

c. Uniform and equipment: Men detailed for guard duty will be armed with their indivadual weapon. Equipment consists of web belt, suspenders, Uniform will be khakis, no tie, leggins and helmet liner.







UNIT FIRE REGULATIONS

- Each company Fire detail is charged with the protection of all tents, equipment and supplies under its immediate supervision. Headquarters Company fire detail will be responsible for the Battalion Motor Park, Battalion Headquarters, Motor Shop and Officers quarters Area. Company "C" fire detail will be responsible for the enlisted men kitchen and kitchen supply tent. Company "B" fire detail will be responsible for Officers Mess and installations pertaining there-to.
 - 2. Each company will organize and train the following fire details.




