Dear Albert and Betty,

I too have roots in Iowa. I was raised by my Grandparents who migrated to N. Dakota via team and wagon. That's the only back ground I have. I'm the eldest of four children, whose Mother passed away in Wisconsin. I was six at the time with one brother and 2 sisters.

My heritage is mostly Iowa and Missouri. My Grandfather's history the stories of mud in Iowa. He claimed the mud so deep a team couldn't pull the wagon. He put a tongue on the rear wheels put box on the axle and hauled the groceries with horses hitched to it. That was all I know of Iowa.

I always figured he was telling tall tales. In N.D. we didn't have

rain enough to make that much mud. The foregoing was before my birth so we enjoyed his tall tales. After the rains of this past summer anything is possible.

Albert, I enjoyed your experience of life on the farm. I have never seen a black faced cow. Our cattle were all sired by traveling Bulls so we had a hodgepodge of colors. My Grandfather's cattle were the renting someone's Homestead with cattle furnished, the rent was all the milk and cream and one-half of the increase so we had a variety of scrubs for our livelihood. The descendants of that first herd was still in evidence in 1935 when the drought forced my Grandparents off the farm and into retirement. I went into the C.C.C. for three years so that was their living. In then CCC my pay \$30 per month. I got \$5 and \$25 went home.

My Grandfather came from Iowa and My Grandmother from Missouri. I remember them speaking of Mt. Ayr, Ia., Shady Grove, Ia. and Hatfield, Missouri. My Granddad's Father was a Union Soldier and my Grandmother's Father was a Confederate. For us Grandkids the Civil War never ended. Grandma won because the last Civil War Veteran to die was a Confederate - finis Civil War.

I hope this finds you all in the best of health at least for people our age. Betty sure does a wonderful job as secretary for this outfit plus a whole lot of work out at the farm. I know Albert and her are very busy because over the years I have visited there a number of times. I think they both should have a standing ovation. Betty asks only one thing of us and that is "Please you Vandals send me a little news to make the Tiger Tracks possible."

I know all of you could write a book if we would only sit down, take a few minutes and do it. After all it is OUR paper that she and Albert spend THEIR time putting together. I am as guilty as anyone of you of neglecting to help her so today, I'll try to put my two cents worth in with something that happened back in 1945.

When the war ended on May 8, 1945 Bob DeHut, a couple other fellows and I ended up with an armored cavalry outfit which had just landed from state side. The old colonel from the outfit called us in one day and said "Soldiers I can't have you fall out mornings or give you any details because you've been over here too long now, however if you want to vol-

unteer for something I have a job that might interest you." Well you know how that went over. Volunteer in the Army!!! We went back in his office to inquire what the job was. He told us trucking coal from Cologne, Germany over the Autobon highway for the Army of Occupation until you get your transportation home. We trucked coal till October, five months after the War was over. We thought we were never going to get out of Germany. I'm sure Bob DeHut remembers this, he was one of the volunteers. It sure was good news the day we came in and were told there was a boat to take us back to the States.

We landed in New York a few days later, split up and went our separate ways. I was sent to Fort Meade, Maryland for discharge. I had only been there one day when I received a phone call. No one knew I was there so I said the call must be for someone else. I was wrong. It was my youngest sister who was working for the War Dept. at the time processing servicemen who were coming back to the states for discharge. She happened to be in ship to shore communications and saw my name and address so she knew it had to be me. She asked me to please come to Baltimore that night she was very anxious to see me. I agreed to meet her at the Camdam Railway Station. When I went into the service she was a chubby high school girl who after graduating became a slender rather good looking blue eyed blond. I got off the train, went in the staion walked all around looking for "chubby" but couldn't find her. I spotted this good looking blonde sitting on a bench, gave her a big smile, she smiled back, came over and asked if my name could possibly be "Barnard".

Can you believe I did not know my own sister? She passed away a few years ago but she always got a big laugh when she told someone how her own brother tried to pick her up in the railroad station in Baltimore, Md.

I'm sure a lot of you vandals have a story you could tell. Think about it, write it down and send it to Betty for the *Tiger Tracks*, it will make it a lot easier for her and Albert to get out the paper we all enjoy so much.

Lloyd A. Fikejs was born Sept. 30, 1913, at Traer, the son of James and Mary (Mochal) Fikejs. He received his education in a country school near Traer and then began farming with his parents.

He served his country during World War II with the 776 Tank Destroyer Battalion, seeing action in Africa, Italy, Austria and Germany. Lloyd was discharged with the rank of Tech 5 and received the Good Conduct Medal, the Meritorious Service Plaque and Battle Stars. Following his discharge he returned to farming with his parents near Hudson.

In 1962 he was married to Mina Ackerman. Following her death in 1975 he continued to live on the farm.

On Dec. 22, 1977, he married Evelyn Burroughs and they lived on the home place until Sept. 26, 1992 when Lloyd suffered a stroke.

# **Normandy Questions & Answers**

Q: I've heard that the Battle of Normandy Foundation, formed to build a wall in France to honor all soldiers who served in the European Theater during World War II, is in financial trouble because of possible misuse of funds and that some members of Congress who serve on its board have resigned from the board. Any truth to this?

## - Tom Peters, Dunwoody

A: You heard right. The Washington Times reported the story. Although the story did not make it onto the national wire services, some veterans and veterans groups have read it and are faxing copies to buddies across the country.

The Times story called Anthony Stout, founder of the Battle of Normandy Foundation, which solicited funds from veterans and their families nationwide, "a classic Washington clout merchant [who] for more than 20 years has been spending millions of other people's money on himself and the rich and powerful."

His Normandy project attracted the support of some lawmakers, including Sens. Bob Dole (R-Kan.) and Strom Thurmond (R-S.C.), and a slew of high-level French and American diplomats.

The newspaper reported that of the \$8.2 million collected from veterans - who paid \$40 to have their names inscribed on the wall - and interested parties as of Dec. 31, 1992, Stout sent a mere \$206,968 to Caen, France, to build the wall and

accompanying museum. The rest went for overseas travel for lawmakers, VIPs and other big donors; entertainment; Stout's salary; personal and business expenses; and hard-sell direct mail fund raising.

In brochures, Stout presented his "50th D-Day Anniversary Commission" as being a branch of the federal government, and with the help of lawmakers, he finagled a congressional contribution of \$3 million from the sale of U.S. Treasury D-Day memorial coins.
