Upon your retirement I wish to extend to you the grateful appreciation of our Commander-in-Chief, our Secretary of War and the Army of The United States for your long and faithful service.

It is especially gratifying to me to be accorded this privilege, because I knew you many years ago as a young and promising, but inexperienced soldier of fine character during the first days of your service. The intervening years have more than justified the faith your comrades then had in you and have wrought many changes in practically all of your soldierly qualities except that of "Character" which was of the highest from the outset.

To-day, you are not an inexperienced young soldier; you are an outstanding, seasoned Infantry veteran, skilled in the profession of Arms. You are one of our outstanding Pioneers in the Tank Destroyer Branch of World War II.
